Ennis Qualls Gets 350 Lbs. Cotton As Average Per Acre

Ennis Qualls living about five miles north of Putnam in the Undays ago and reported he would gather 14 bales of cotton off of 21 acres. He said the bales would average considerably over 500 pounds per bale. Figuring on an average of 525 pounds per bale this would qpual 7,350 pounds of lint or about 350 pounds of lint per acre.

The Putnam territory will average more than one-half bale per acre which is the best average we have had in years. This increased production is the result of plenty of moisture and generally better farming. The higher the lint the less it costs to produce a bale of cotton. The Putnam gin had turned out 616 bales of cotton to close of business Saturday night. This was 63 bales for the week or an average of ten bales per day. Cotton is selling for about 12:50 to 13 cents and seed is selling for 37 dollars per ton. 

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
