(By Mrs. Geo. E. Biggerstaff) Mr. A. A. (Dug) Hart of Crescent. Oklahoma, brother of Jess Hart whom he has been visiting in the Griggs Hospital at Baird, and also a brother to Jess and Jim Hart, deceased, Mollie Hart, now Mrs. B. F. Massie, and Bertha Hart who first married O. F. Wagley, brother to Mrs. George Anthony. Mr. Wagley died several years ago and she is now married to Mr. W. I. Gaargh. Both sisters reside in Fort Worth. Mr. .A. A. (Dug) Hart, as he was called by old friends-some who have passed on, recalls a number of citizens and incidents of the Putram territory He recalled F. P. Shackelford, A. L. Biggerstaff, Jim Heyser who passed on, and S. W. Jobe, John Cunningham and others who are still living here. Mr. Jobe says he came to Callahan county in "81" and remembers Mr. Hart. "Dug" as he called him, was one of the youngest range riders and an exceptionally good "roper"-and he still could rope on a former visit to a Putnam rodeo.

Mr. Hart, when about 21, eloped (as they often did in early days) with Miss Smith, daughter of Mr. H. V. (Shoe Sole) Smith, proprietor of the Smith Hotel, where the old Putnam hotel row stands. In those days Mr. A. L. Jobe was one of the early pioneer Baptist preachers of Callahan county. Mr. Hart's mother and father built the old double log house, and the first school house in north Callahan county, known as the Hart school house






