

Livestock Show **Cotton Dusted** Ranger Mar. 18-19 shows increase In Production

Call to cotton farmers-Don' forget your poison material this year. From all indications of cotton planted this year for there will be a large acreage of cotton planted this year. For Thrips, aphids, flee hoppers or boll weavils alone or in combinations is the 3-5-40 mixtures. This is 3% gama benzene hexachloride, 5% sul phur. 20% clorinated camphens with 40% sulphur is also a good dust. Early season dus ting is a good investment to where flee hoppers, aphids and insure early fruiting in areas boll weavils and thrips do damage. The first dusting should be made soon after the cotton has been chopped and plowed and the last dusting of the Early Season Control Program should be made before the crop starts blooming. Poison cotton after the bloom appears should be followed with caution.

Tests that were made by the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station during 1944 and in 1947 showed that cotton dusted with the 3-5-40 made on an average of 511 pounds of seed cotton per acre more than untreated cotton.

Coach Jack Everett Faces Stiff Task In Grouping Athletic Department; New Set - Up To Benefit 1400 Students



DETROIT, Feb. 26. - A new method of bonding the brake lining to the brake shoe that has already proved itself in more than 3,000,000 brake assemblies has been announced by W. F. Armstrong, general manager of the Chevrolet Motor Division.

The statement included the disclosure that the development already has been installed on 1949 passenger cars. Chevrolet is the first major manufacturer to adopt for its full passenger line a type of brake constructoin that has been the object of laboratory research for several years.


