## Eighth Grade To Present Biographies

Mr. Patterson's 8th grade class is preparing a short biography of America's presidents in their study of United States history.

Beginning this week and in the weeks that follow, as the presidents are studied, these brief histories will appear in the Ropes Plainsman.

**GEORGE WASHINGTON**

George Washington was born February 22, 1732, on a farm near Wakefield, Virginia. His father's name was Augustine and his mother's name was Mary Ball. Washington didn't get much education other than simple arithmetic and the ways of farming. After his father died, he was sent to live with his half brother. When Washington got older, his relatives were sorry he couldn't read or spell very well so they sent him to private schools. He also had two tutors which taught him the arts of war. When Washington was twenty-seven he moved his family to Mount Vernon. He worked very hard on this farm until the beginning of the Revolutionary War. Washington didn't like the way things were going so after some encouragement he was ready to fight if necessary, to protect his liberties. Then, Washington became a soldier and became very popular with the people after winning battles in the war. He became so popular that after the war he was elected president of the United States. Washington belonged to the Episcopal Church and married Martha Dandridge Austis who was a wealthy widow with two small children. Washington didn't have any children of his own.

George Washington held three positions which were very important to the people of America. First, he served as the Commander-in-Chief of the first American Army. This army fought to win American independence from Great Britain. Second was that of president of the Constitutional Convention. In this position he played an important part in joining the separate states into a single united nation. Under the new Constitution he was elected the first president of the United States of America. Many important things happened during Washington's term of office. Since there was a new government, the Supreme Court met for the first time, the first ten amendments were added to the Constitution, and the first cabinet and national mint were established. Also, three states, Vermont, Kentucky and Tennessee were added to the Union and the Whiskey Rebellion, the first challenge of Federal authority.

On December 14, 1799, the whole of America mourned the death of Washington.

Which presidents were elected without opposition? Washington, twice; Monroe, 1820.

Which presidents signed the Constitution? Washington; Madison.

### MRS. BOB THOMAS' FATHER IS ILL

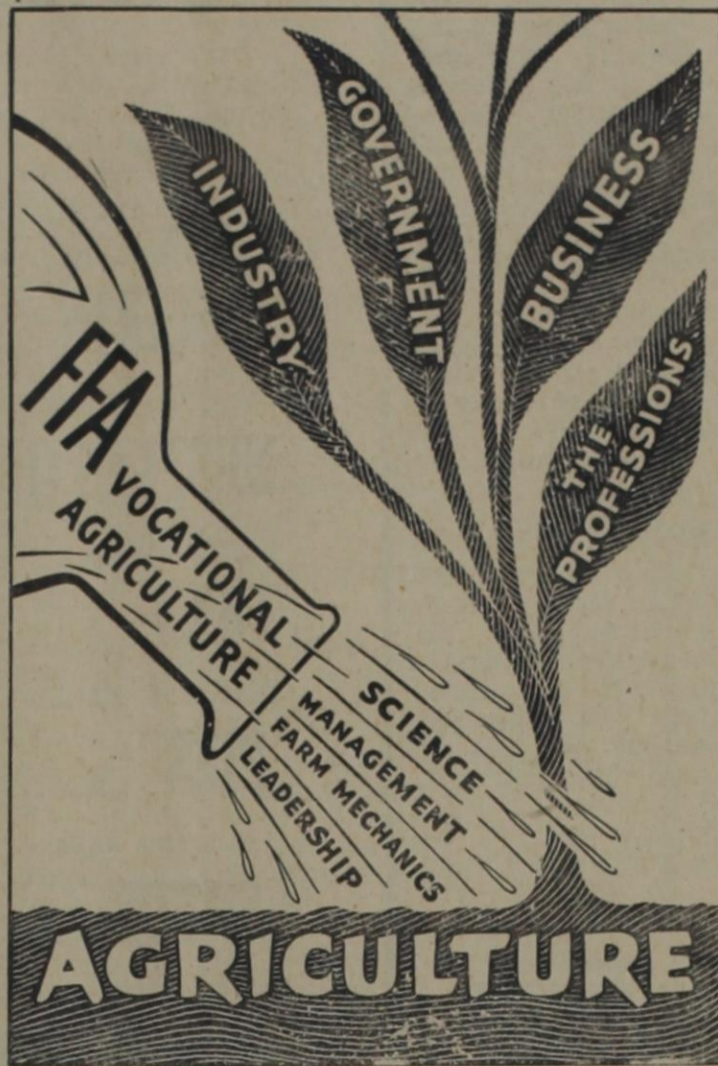
M. F. Whitten, father of Mrs. Bob Thomas and George Whitten, has been reported to be ill at his home in Rule. Latest reports state he is improved.

### \$650,000 College Bond

#### Election Carries

With about three hundred voters going to the polls Saturday, the South Plains College bond election asking for \$650,000 for the erection of a science building, etc., carried two to one. In Ropes voting was 67 against and 8 for.

Voting was light for the reason the publicity it should have had. It was railroaded through. Notices were not published in newspapers in full, and what was published was only three days before the election. Notices explaining what it was about and what the money was to be used for were posted. In Ropes one was posted in the high school building where the only voters were teachers and caretakers—it was several pages long and if one had wanted to read it they would have to stand and go through it. The way it was handled it appeared the sponsors were doing their best to hide it, as if they didn't want the voters to know what was going on.

An informed public is an intelligent public—in a democracy the public is supposed to be informed and not sent blind to the polls. In fact, if they are blind to the propositions being voted on they usually don't vote. We do not think there was any need to hide this election—we think if it had been brought out in the glare of the noonday sun it would have carried, but there was a reluctance to give the people time to discuss the matter. There was haste. And in the haste mistakes were made. One mistake was the failure to open a voting box at Smyer.

This box was not opened until 11:40 a.m. and would not have been opened then if the Plainsman had not called Lavern McCann and told him the box was not open. We asked Lavern if failure to open this box would invalidate the election and he said it would not, that if the people there wanted to vote they could vote in some other box.

The mistake caused by haste was the fact that the name of Hockley County did not appear on the ballot, but it read, Hartley and Cochran Counties. We imagine the folks of Hartley County will be surprised to learn that the voters of Hockley County saddled them with a \$650,000 bond issue. We don't know where the ballots were printed, but we do know that such a glaring mistake is unexcusable. Whether the authorities want to believe it or not, this one error lays the election open to contest.

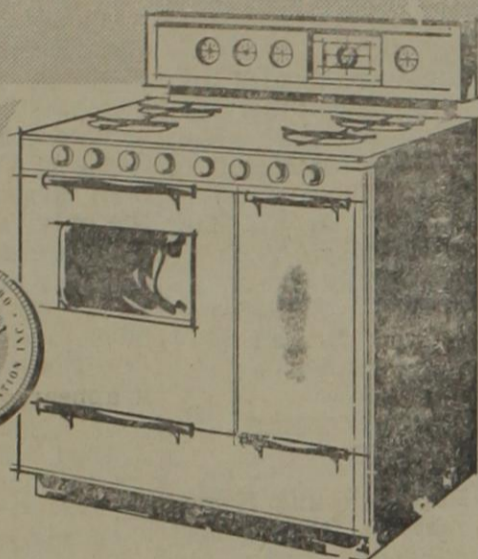
### FLU IS MAKING APPEARANCE HERE

These wrecks accounted for 2 persons killed, 11 injured and a property damage in the amount of \$6,450.00.

The Highway Patrol Supervisor pointed out that rural motor vehicle traffic acci-

dents in the 29 county North Texas district have declined slightly during January, 1963, as compared with the same month last year. Seven deaths were chalked up last month as compared to 9 that were recorded in January, 1962, 137 injuries compared to 147 for January, 1962. A total of 216 rural traffic accidents were investigated as compared to 217 for January, 1962. The Veteran Patrol Supervisor reminded motorists the

law requires all Texas registered motor vehicles to have valid inspection stickers displayed by midnight April 15.
