## Darlene . . . .

Last rites were conducted at 1:00 p.m. Wednesday, August 21, 1968 from the Rose-Neath Funeral Home Chapel in Shreveport, Louisiana for Mrs. Russell (Darlene) Robertson, 21, who was a resident of Shreveport.

Darlene Mae Shanklin Robertson was born September 23, 1946 in a Lubbock hospital and was a resident of Ropes. She attended school at Frenship Schools in Wolforth and was a graduate of a high school in Shreveport. She was married to Russell (Pete) Robertson December 6, 1963.

Darlene was the victim of a tragic head-on collision of two automobiles Sunday, August 18 on Louisiana State Highway 9 near Homer, about 50 miles from Shreveport. They were returning home from Arkansas where they had been visiting relatives.

The accident occurred as the Robertson car came over the top of a hill and was met headon by another car driven by a 19 year old Negro who was in the process of passing a semi-truck on the hill in a no passing zone. Both cads were reported as traveling about 60 mph.

The crash was so violent the cars were moulded together, and the use of a torch was needed to separate the vehicles. None of the occupants were thrown from the cars.

Darlene was pronounced dead at the scene of the accident, while her husband, Pete, received at least two severe breaks in his left leg, and several broken ribs which punctured one of his lungs, causing it to collapse. He underwent surgery Wednesday and is reported to be out of danger although latest word is that he is now suffering from pneumonia in the injured lung.

Their oldest son, Vance, about two and a half years old, received a severe laceration on his head, but was released from the hospital Wednesday. An 8 weeks old son, Randall, received internal injuries and a skull fracture. He was released from the hospital last Saturday and is doing quite well now. A nephew riding with the Robertsons was injured slightly and was released from the hospital Tuesday of last week.

The Negro was traveling alone, and is reported in critical condition at this time.

Survivors include her husband, Russell (Pete); two sons, Vance and Randall, all of the home; her mother, Lela Shanklin of Bossier City, Louisiana; her father, R. W. Shanklin; one sister, Mrs. Jack (Winona) Cavanaugh of Bossier City; four brothers, Wesley, Troy, Roy and Stanley Shanklin of Bossier City; her maternal grandmother, Mrs. Troy Morris of Ropesville; and her paternal grandparents, Mrs. Edna Shanklin, and Mr. Alan Shanklin, both of California.

Our great Father in Heaven needed another angel to brighten His Kingdom, and selected our beautiful Darlene to fulfill His purpose on earth.

We go along from day to day with daily problems, and cares, happiness, and are reminded with a suddenness that we are made humans, placed on earth to carry out our Father's plans in this world. The air we breathe and the steps we take are granted by our Father.

The big brown eyes are forever closed; the constantly smiling lips will smile no more. The lithe step of youth has ceased. No more will she run to see about her babies.



A beautiful, useful young wife, mother and daughter exists no more. Fidd what purpose we cannot even begin to understand. No doubt while we live on this earth we will never see any reason for this. We can only accept the will of God.

You cannot, in a case like this, say "It's for the best," for "She was suffering, or she is better off."

When reason returns to the living after the suddenness of a tragedy, we know in our hearts that Darlene is better off than we. She now dwells in a land where there is no sorrow, no pain, no worries and definitely no end to existence.

When the Spirit arises to the Heavenly Kingdom, it sheds the earthly body that has known both sadness and joy. From then on no more sadness is known.

Our family has always been one of closest ties. Our children raised together, to the point that cousins are more like brothers and sisters, and nieces and nephews more like sons and daughters. When one member suffers a loss, it is shared, and each pang of sorrow cuts the hearts of all.

We were all around Darlene from babyhood on. We considered her one of the great beauties of the family. She always fascinated us with her speech of a Texas drawl with a Nebraska accent. Her personality and sense of humor would be hard to compade. She always had a mind of her own, but used it with good sense and consideration.

We pay our final tribute to our beloved Darlene. Our hearts ache, and the vacant spot will never be filled. But we accept with humbleness the decision of our Creator, and pray for strength and guidance to lead us, in this world where we are allowed to walk for a while, remembering that our days are numbered, and ask for grace that no bitterness ever enter our hearts against our fellowman, for he walks only on this earth for an allotted time also.

We would that it were possible to bring forth words from our typewriter to ease the heartbreak in our family right now. But in our mind is a picture of the Grim Reaper as life is shut off for a young mother, who only a few days ago was so happy and satisfied with her little family.

We feel so inadequate. There now stands two vacant chairs in our family circle, never to be filled. But the circle in a better land is increasing, which we must all join someday. Until that day arrives, we must go on, with the phrase constantly in our minds that life is for the living, and regardless of what we suffer, the sun sets each day to bring hope for a happier and better tomorrow when time alone can ease the broken hearts.

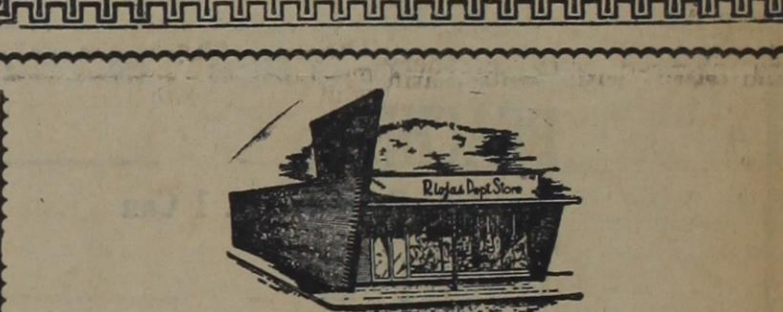
