Circuit Assembly

Jehovah's Witnesses in this area are cancelling all local meetings September 2 through 4, for their circuit assembly in Altus, Oklahoma City Auditorium.

Alfred Ferguson, presiding minister of the witnesses in Levelland, said these semi-annual training programs are part of our mode of worship and we encourage all witnesses and goodwill companions to attend these assemblies.

He said the rooming situation at Altus presents more of a problem than usual; the local congregation in Altus began a house to house canvass of the city on August 7 in an effort to secure rooming accommodations for 600 delegates expected from 19 congregations in Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma.

The Texas Circuit No. 9 assembly in Altus carries the theme, "Seek Peace and Pursue It". Ferguson said, "Training at this assembly is designed to improve peaceful relationships with our fellow servant and fellow creature."

He further stated that, "The Apostle Paul in 2 Corinthians 13:11 expressed the goal we hope to attain, 'Be of one mind, live in peace; and the God of love and peace shall be with you.'"

The summit of the assembly will come Sunday 3 P.M. when the District Supervisor, R. L. Anderson, speaks on the subject, "Finding Peace in This Troubled World".

News Of Ropes Public Schools

The Ropes Public Schools opened their 1960-61 session Monday morning with a total enrollment of 514. O. V. Fuller, superintendent of schools, stated there would be another hundred of normal enrollment, plus the number to be gained during the harvest season.

This would give the school a total attendance, normally, of about 614.

Of this number 113 are enrolled in high school; 127 in junior high; 231 in elementary school; and 43 attending the colored school.

Mr. Fuller stated a new bus which had been ordered has not arrived yet, but is expected any day. He also said that the school year had made a smooth start, with teachers and patrons working together.

Terry Redford, principal of the elementary school, said his enrollment will gradually increase until it hits its peak during the cotton gathering season. "We got off to a smooth start," he said, "with a few changes in our schedule which will have to be ironed out. I am well pleased with my teaching staff, and believe it among the best we have had."

Ropes schools are classed among the best on the South Plains and offer exceptional educational advantages to its students. Under the guidance of Mr. Fuller, assisted by his principals and splendid staff of teachers, it is always kept in the forefront.

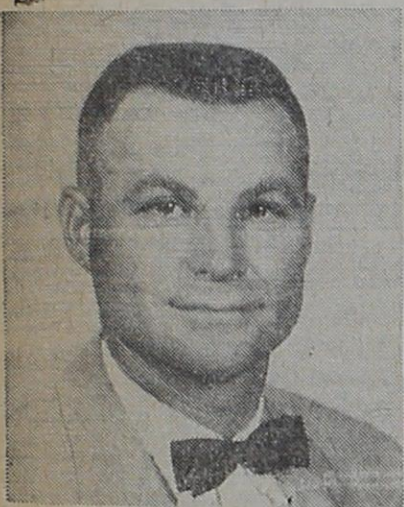

Jno. 8:32
