The defensive unit again must be credited for coming up with big plays to stop Roosevelt's offense. Three times Roosevelt moved inside the Tiger 20 yard line only to be held off or thrown back. Roosevelt began one series first and two from the Tiger two yard line, only to find themselves with a 4th and 18 three plays later.

Absentee Voting Dates Set for Proposed Revision of Texas Constitution Election

County Clerk, Raymond O. Dennis, announces that **absentee voting** for the **November 4, 1975 proposed revision of the Texas Constitution Election**, will begin in his office on **Wednesday, October 15th**, and will continue through **Friday, October 31st**.

Voting hours are from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Monday thru Friday, during the absentee voting period.

Any qualified voter of Hockley County, who expects to be absent from the county on **Election Day, November 4, 1975**, may vote absentee by personal appearance, in the County Clerk's office, during the above specified time.

If a person, otherwise qualified to vote in this county, is already absent from the County, and will still be absent from the County on election day, they may make a **written request**, by mail, to the County Clerk, requesting that an absentee ballot be mailed to them. If a person is not ill, or physically disabled, he, or she, has to be (outside) the County, if they request an absentee ballot by mail.

Those persons otherwise qualified to vote, that are confined to their homes, hospital, or nursing home, due to illness, or physical disability, may request an absentee ballot by mail, whether they are inside the county or not. But, those persons do have to be registered voters, and claim permanent residence in Hockley County.

All requests for **absentee ballots**

by mail, must be made to: Raymond O. Dennis, County Clerk, (or) County Clerk, Hockley County, P.O. Box 1209, Levelland, Texas 79336.

The information that the County Clerk needs, is your (official) "registration name", as it is listed on your "Voter Registration Certificate", your "voting precinct" number, (or) location of voting place, and your return address.

All requests for absentee ballots by mail, must be made "separate, signed "separate", in the same signature that is on your voter registration certificate. A husband and wife should make requests for an absentee ballot on a separate application or letter and sign the request in their "registered name". Requests for ballots, by husband and wife, may be mailed in the same envelope. All persons living in **Anton, Ropesville, or Sundown**, and the surrounding areas of these cities, who are qualified voters, may vote absentee, at the **City Hall** of their respective cities, subject to the above dates, times, and procedures, that are normally carried out, in the main office of the County Clerk in Levelland.

Persons desiring to vote at the "Temporary branch office absentee voting" locations listed above, may do so by **personal appearance only**. Applications by mail, must be addressed to the County Clerk's

Deer Chili

How about a menu for one of the best dishes in Texas, using one of the most popular meats, venison. Here's our recipe for deer chili. 1/2 lb. pinto beans, 5 cups tomatoes, 1 lb. chopped green peppers, 1 1/2 tbs. salad oil, 2 crushed garlics, 1/2 cup chopped parsley, 1/2 cup butter, 2 1/2 lbs. venison, 1 lb. ground pork, 1/2 cup chili pdwr., 2 tbs. salt, 1 1/2 tsp. pepper, 1 1/2 lbs. chopped onions. Wash beans and soak overnight, then cook and don't drain. Add tomatoes and simmer 5 min., add onions and cook until tender. Add garlic and parsley, mixing in browned green peppers. Brown meat in skillet and stir in chili powder and cook 10 minutes. Add all this with beans, mix in spices, and simmer for 1 hour, cook uncovered for 30 minutes. Take it from me ... it's great.

Maybe, just maybe, Texas Tech might well employ the services of Kal Segrist in the off season. Kal, if no one is that badly informed, is the Red Raider baseball coach.

In baseball, batters and pitchers make use of an item known as a resin bag. They dust their hands and/or bats with the powdery substance and it makes it possible for them to get a better grip on (1) the ball or (2) the bat.

In the case of the Tech footballers, there is no employment of bats, so it would be a little ridiculous in that instance. But in the case of hands, it might not hurt.

Perhaps, with approval of the officials, the center could have a small sack tied to his waist. Just before a play, preferably in the huddle, the quarterback, other backs and ends could dust their hands. That would serve the same purpose as in baseball.

Another possibility that is entirely repugnant to all true Tech football fans would be for the Raiders to punt on first down. This would avoid the necessity for any back to have to touch the football, except for snapper and kicker.

If one didn't know better, one would suspect that backs and ends at Raiderland are all Jewish and they are forbidden to touch pigskin in any form.

Barring all of the above mentioned cures for the plague of fumblyitis, maybe there's a demon in the football that Tech uses. If that is so, maybe Tech officials could have the footballs exorcized. It's cheaper than losing a scholarship player.

The ultimate, of course, would be to hold a player who fumbles out of the succeeding game, or being made to play in a junior varsity game instead.

I'm sure that someone will come up with a solution, but it probably won't be this year. Graduation might be the only answer.

Oh, yes, football. Well, sir, the Aggies move in this week and anything can happen when two teams play. The safest bet is that one will lose, except in the case of Baylor this year.

The Aggies used to fumble. They don't anymore and that eliminates one bright hope. The Raiders, when they hold onto the football, can march—except that no one has done much parading on the Aggies. A&M has been ferocious on defense.

Defensively, Tech improved against Oklahoma State, obviously, after allowing an average of 26 points a game. But the Aggies might be tougher even than Texas and that's saying a bunch.

I dunno if it's seniority on the team, Tom Wilson or what, but the Aggies have been moving the ball. And when the opposition can't score, it makes it tough to win. The Raiders are in a definite underdog role. Still, it should be a good game.

The two league championships probably will have been decided by the time this is printed and with the Red Sox and Reds winning the first two games, they probably will be meeting in the World Series that gets underway Saturday.

Regardless, I'll take the Reds. They appear to have better pitching and they have power, maybe no more than the Six, but strong and consistent. It ought to be a great series and could go the full seven games.

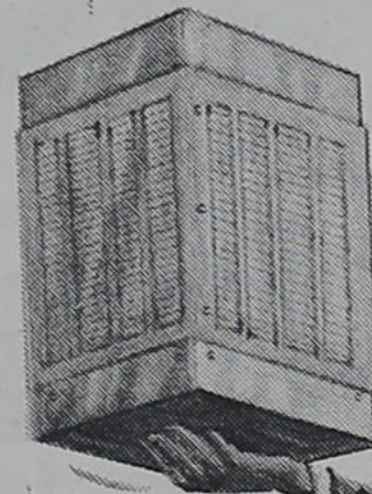


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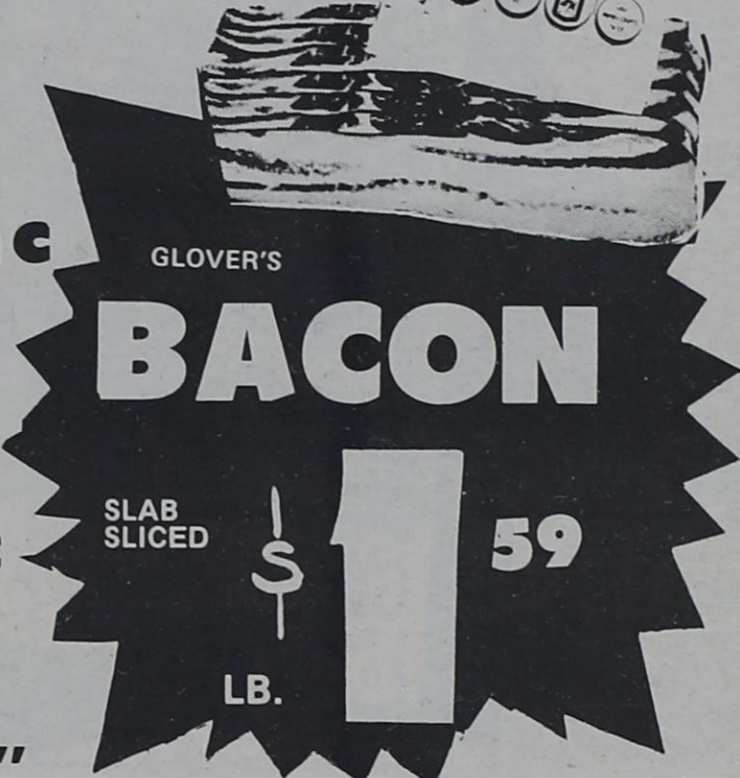


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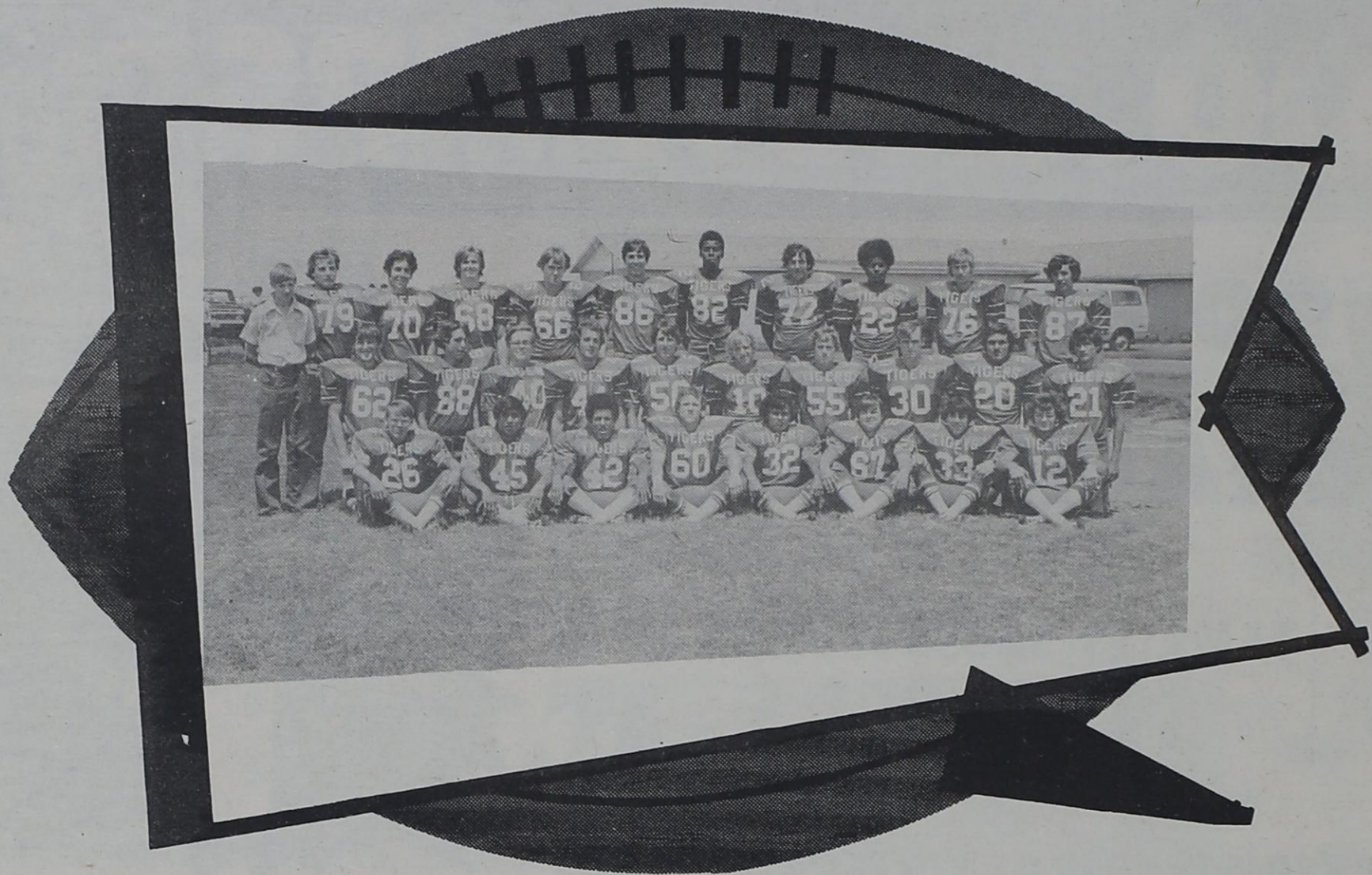

"BALBOA DISCOVERS PACIFIC"

The Spanish explorer, Vasco Nunez de Balboa, was the first European to set eyes on the Pacific Ocean. Balboa and his group of men first sighted the body of water from a mountaintop in what is today Panama. They reached the waters four days later on September 29, 1513. Balboa named the ocean the South Sea and claimed all of its shores for Spain. (It was Magellan, on his round-the-world voyage, who named the ocean "Pacific.") 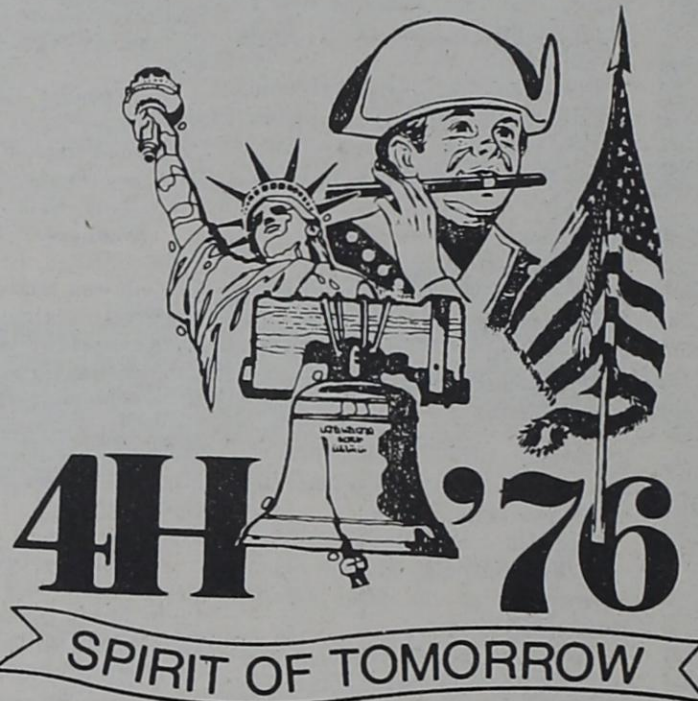
