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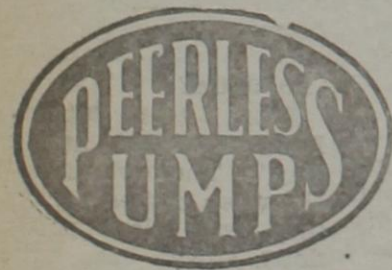
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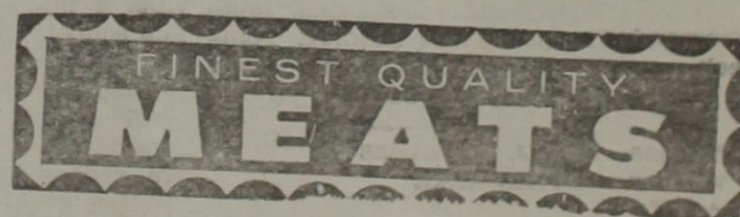

WRECK VICTIM**

Elks Club members Tues-
day night honored L. C.
Childers Jr. for his bravery
of a fellow lodge member
following a traffic accident
January 27.

Childers was presented a
plaque which stated he "ex-
emplified the spirit of Elk-
dom with true brotherly love
in courageously saving the
life of Brother Lloyd T.
Wall."

On the night of Jan. 27,
Childers was driving home
when he came upon a pick-
up truck overturned in a
cotton field south of Wolf-
forth. The wheels still were
turning, so the wreck had
just happened.

On investigation, he found
that his lodge brother was
pinned under the truck,
soaked in gasoline dripping
from the tank.

Unable after several at-
tempts to free Wall, Childers
used his new car to raise
the pickup enough to remove
Wall. He rushed Wall to
the hospital.

Elks members said that if
Childers had not performed
this act of courage, Wall may
have died from exposure or
have burned to death if the
gasoline ignited.

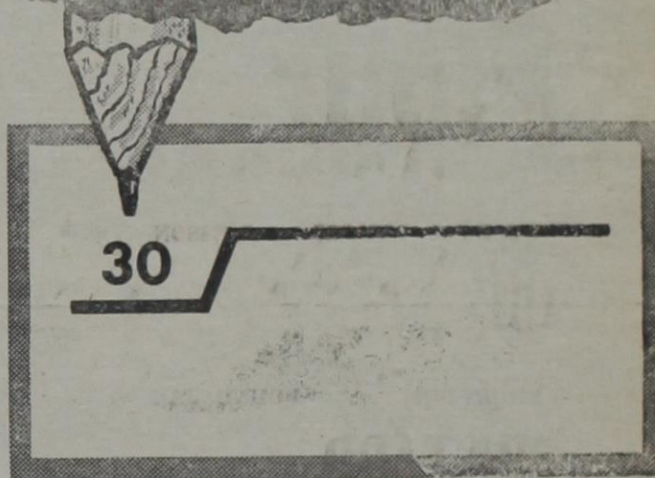
