Take a good look at the little house above with the sign, "Southland", across the top. That is what passes for a depot. At one time Southland had a depot similar to the one in Ropes, but today it is only a shack in which the birds nest and rats run riot.

How would a depot of that kind in Ropes appeal to you? It can verily easily happen here if the depot is closed. And, if the Santa Fe has its way it will be closed. They say through the summer, but

once it is closed there is no power on earth that can make them reopen it. The business of the Santa Fe, through the depot at this point, is estimated to be \$12,500 a month. They pay an agent less than \$500 a month to keep it open, which gives a gross above the agent's salary of approximately \$12,000. There is something you can do about it—go to Lubbock on December 11 and be present at the hearing which starts at 9 a.m. in the new courthouse.

Hail on Sunday night, if it had covered a large area, would have been a disaster of major proportions. As it was, it did heavy damage to the Myles Collins crop just west of the city limits, also heavy damage to the Boots Moore and Jordan crops.

Clouds rolled in from the southeast in the early morning hours, bringing lightning and thunder. There was one vicious puff of wind, then came hail which lasted three or four minutes. It sounded as though it was beating the roof off the house. Had it lasted much longer there wouldn't have been a roof left in town.

City Marshal Dub Riney told us, "Some of the hail bounced on our porch and I picked them up—they were flat and had horns."

The heaviest damage we have heard of was at the M. Collins farm where cotton was beat down and knocked from the bolls. It is said there were at least two bales to the acre and Dub Riney, who looked the crop over, stated it appeared a third of it was on the ground.

The S. B. Berry place next to it sustained damage also.

There was little rain and no hail on Iwest of Ropes—it seemed to cover a narrow strip of land.

Tuesday night a heavy fog came in and a drizzle of rain was falling, further delaying gathering the crops.

of 1962 shows a total of 77 crashes. As a result of these crashes there were 3 persons killed and 41 persons injured. The estimated property damage amounted to \$45,061.00. During the last five years there has been a total of 11,902 traffic fatalities in Texas. Of this total 2,354 or 20 per cent were killed during the months of November and December. For the year thus far there has been 1,841 traffic fatalities as compared to 1,766 for the same period of 1961, an increase of 75 or 4 per cent with deadly December yet to come.

"These cold grim traffic facts alone are a challenge for every responsible citizen throughout this state to join in an all out effort to stop this needless tragedy this Holiday Season. This can be done by obeying all traffic laws and being a defensive driver; that is, be prepared for the unpredictable actions of the other driver," stated the veteran Patrol Supervisor.

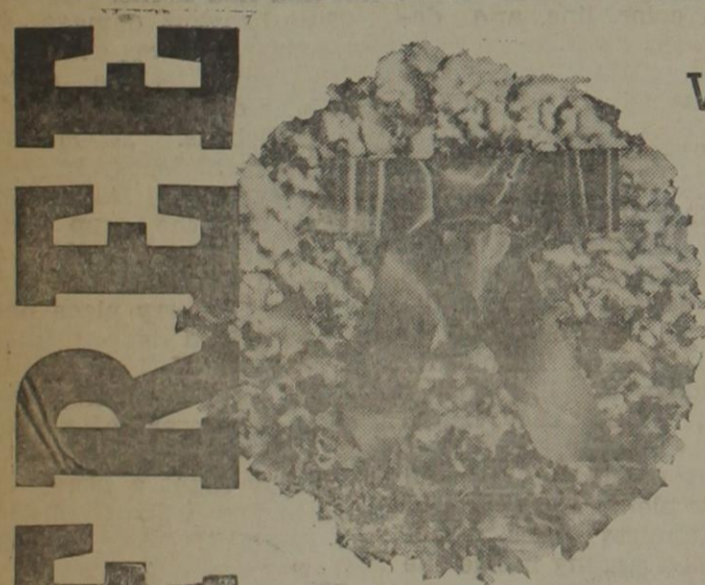
