REALITY

All our lives we are involved with reality. Either we are seeking to discover what is real, what is authentic, what is at the core and center of existence OR we are trying to run away from the reality we have discovered. We are not willing to give up the search for reality, nor are we willing to live with reality. Always we meet reality and then we scurry away to our little dream worlds of unreality.

This is most evident in those people who drink alcoholic beverages whether hard whiskey or one or two beers. You see, alcohol helps us into the dream world of unreality. It deadens a part of our brain so that we can slip into unreality. Anytime people drink they are the same as saying, "We need a crutch to help us live. We need a bottle in our mouth and a sleepy brain."

The drinking of alcohol is not the only sign that people are running away from reality. There are many other signs. For instance, look at all the excuses each one of us comes up with day after day. "I would have been at church. But... I would have given, but... I would have helped, but... I would have been kind, but..." Excuses, like alcohol, are means whereby we deny reality and escape into our dream worlds of unreality.

Well, what is wrong with escaping into unreality?

To escape into unreality is sin. God has created us and all that is. When we deny the reality He has created, then we are also denying God. This is what the theological terms Incarnation and Resurrection mean. The Lord God lives. He is here with us in reality. He is not off yonder. He is not chained to a cloud somewhere. The Lord God lives in the world today. When we deny reality, when we run away from truth, we also cut off our chances of God's help. God is ready and willing to help us face up to reality, but when we refuse to deal with reality, we turn our backs on God.

Sin has to do with turning your back in God. Sin has to do with denying God. The alcohol drinker denies God. By his drinking he says, "I shall depend on unreality, on a deadened brain, to get me through." The persons with excuses for every mis-deed or lack of responsibility denies God. By his excuses he says, "I shall depend on unreality, on excuses to see me through life."

If the Resurrection is true, then God lives today in this real world. And if we are going to find God we must look for Him in reality, not in dreams, not in alcohol, not in excuses.

Benny Redman, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. J. Redman, Jr. has been selected to play cornet in the ALL-STUDENT BAND, U.S.A., which will tour Europe this summer. The ALL-STUDENT BAND, U.S.A. will consist of 110 musicians and the students have been selected by audition from all over the United States. The first rehearsal of the ALL-STUDENT BAND, U.S.A. will take place in New York City, June 12th and then on June 13th, the band will depart for Europe on a four week tour with twelve or more concerts to be played abroad. The tour will include seven countries: England, France, Switzerland, Austria, Germany, Italy and Belgium. INTERESTING LETTER FROM DELPHI, INDIANA

(The following letter was handed us by Jim Martin, from a cousin in Delphi, Indiana, Mrs. Eulada Crowder. The letter describes the recent tornado which ripped through that state, giving on the spot details. The letter is only printed in part. Our thanks to the Martin for sharing this account of the disaster with us and our readers.)
Hello Folks,

Just a few lines to let you know we were not in the tornado. It was fourteen miles away, and that's close enough. We saw several homes leveled yesterday. The people's lives savings and work left in a pile of junk. Sure is sickening to see and think of it. So much work destroyed in a matter of seconds.

We were at a small town yesterday, about 25 miles from us. There were around 50 or 55 homes in the town, besides stores and a bank. There isn't a house, tree or pole or post standing. The only thing you can see is the bank vault.

A trailer park thirty miles north of Delphi, Indiana was destroyed. Ninety two trailers went over like paper cartons. Everyone said if they were us they would get a house. We said if we were going to be blown away, we would any where we were at. From looking at the houses that were struck, I don't think it would be any safer in a house. The brick and cement block houses were as flat as the wooden structures.
