## Alibi of Kisner is Slowly Falling Apart

Charles Henry Kisner's alibi is slowly but surely falling apart.

According to his story he left Haskell Syrus and Frances Mosley at a dance spot in Lubbock early in the night and did not see them again.

Syrus gives the story that he and Mrs. Mosley were in a cafe waiting for a taxi when Kisner, a stranger to them, called from across the building, "If you don't want to wait, I'll take you down town."

This invitation was accepted, and they got in the car with Kisner.

"Our first stop," according to a statement made by Syrus, "was at a bootlegger's where we bought two pints of liquor. We went from there to a dance spot where we remained about an hour and a half. We then got into Kisner's car and drove away. He made so many circles and turns that he lost me—I didn't know where we were."

"We had been running on dirt roads and pavements, and when he stopped the car I thought he was going to talk to me."

"But he didn't."

"He jumped from the car, jerked me out and hit me on the head with his fist, knocking me unconscious for a moment. When I came to, my wallet was gone and the car was racing away with Kisner and Frances in it."

Kisner denies this.

He declares that he left the couple at the dance spot and went riding around, picking up another man he went to Lamesa, enroute to Hobbs, New Mexico, to get more booze.

That he did go to Lamesa has been verified, but the man who went with him stated that he was picked up at 12:30 a.m., at least an hour and a half after Mrs. Mosley was dumped near Smyer. The passenger in Kisner's car found a pair of glasses which were sut-

posed to be those of Mrs. Mosley, and Kisner said;

"You can't wear them. They are female glasses. Throw them out of the car."

This the witness said he refused to do, but Kisner took them and threw them out the window of the car.

A search for the glasses has been made, but up to Monday they had not been found.

Sheriff Weir Clem stated to the Plainsman, "I believe Kisner is the most callous man I ever handled. He asked to see the body of the deceased so he could be sure she was the woman who was in the car with him."

They carried him to the funeral home, and as he viewed the body he is alleged to have said:

"I don't know whether that is the ..... old ..... or not."

"Can't you see a resemblance?" asked Clem.

With more curse words he replied, "She didn't have them scratches on her face the last time I saw her."

One fact that was not revealed for several days is that Kisner is an ex-convict out on parole. Monday Clem had a telegram from the Governor of Texas revoking the parole.

Even up to this point his wife believes in him, and is trying to establish an alibi by showing pictures to different people who might have seen him on the night of the murder. She visited him in the Levelland jail and declared, "Charles just couldn't kill any one. I've lived with him six years and I know."

She did admit, however, that he should have been at home instead of out on a drinking spree.

According to Sheriff Clem the facts are about ready to be presented to the grand jury.

## NEGRO CRARGED WITH THEFT

A Negro, who gave his name as Shehe and a Lubbock address, was arrested in Ropes about 3:00 o'clock on Monday morning and charged with theft of an automobile wheel and jack from the car of J. N. Willis, of near Ropes.

The Negro, accompanied by two other Negroes, drove into Ropes on the rim and were stopped by our night officer. They told him they had blown out a tire and were going to catch a bus back to Lubbock, and he asked them to wait in the Justice of the Peace office for the bus.

While there the theft of the tire and jack was reported. A search of the Negro's car by Constable Ogle and night officer revealed the tire and jack.

The couple with Shehe were cleared, but he was placed in county jail to await trial.

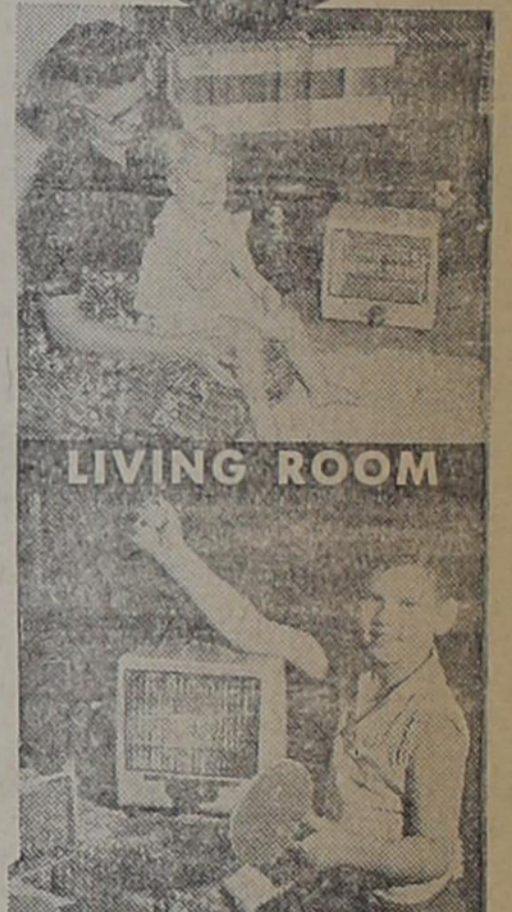

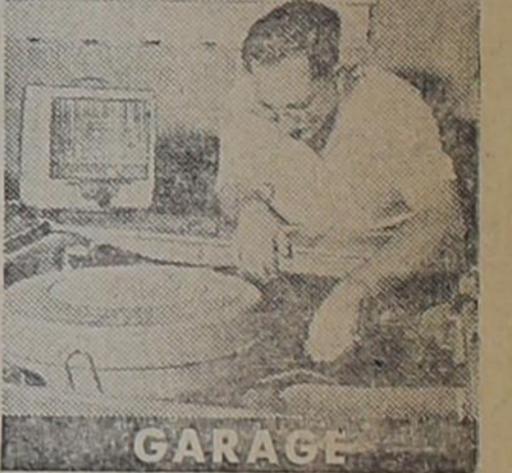

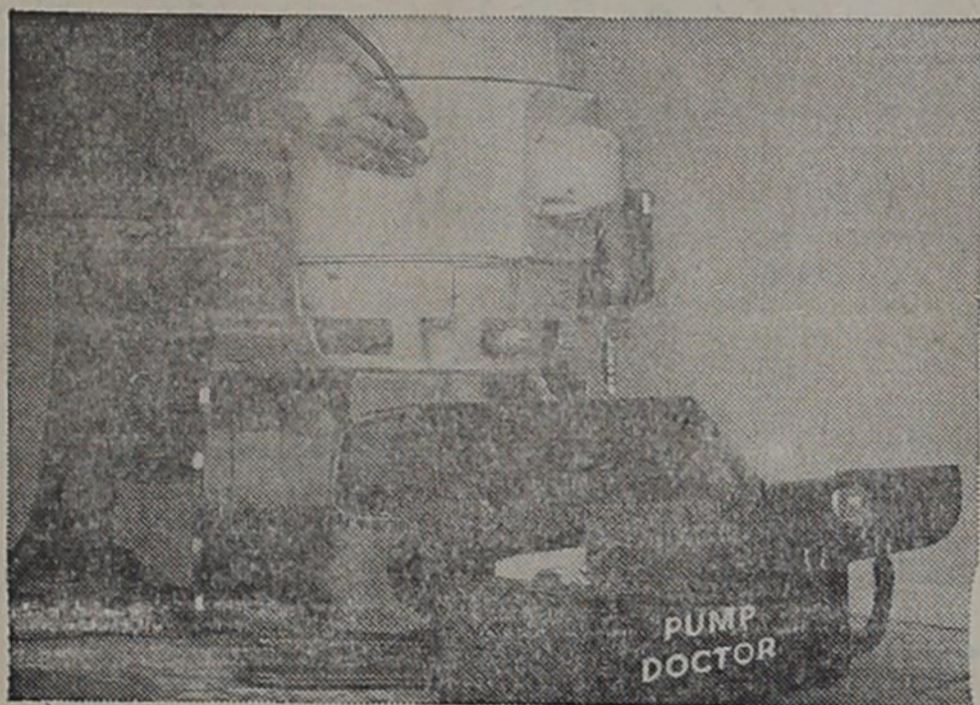

### RED RING CRANBERRY CAKE

3 Tablesp. melted butter or margarine  
2 cups sugar  
2 cups fresh cranberries  
1/2 cup shortening  
2 eggs  
1 teasp. vanilla  
2 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour  
1 Tablesp. baking powder  
1/2 teasp. salt
