A JUDGMENT

For my own church denomination this next Sunday February 14, is Race Relations Day. On Race Relations Day we are to concern ourselves with the type of education that will better allow all races to exist together in a Christian manner. Perhaps nothing on this day is so important as is understanding. There are many issues and sides to the race problem. And, each issue and position must be understood. Without some understanding of the feelings of one another we cannot arrive at Christian conclusions.

There is a paperback book on the market today which, I think, has a good understanding of several sides to the race issue as it concerns the Negro. It understands the North and the South. It understands the segregationist and the integrationist. Not only does the book have a solid basis in understanding, but it is one of the best books I have read so far as enjoyment is concerned. The book was written by the sister of a famous preacher—Henry Ward Beecher. And, the book is reported to have started a war.

The book of which I speak is entitled UNCLE TOM'S CABIN by Harriet Beecher Stowe (Dolphin Books, \$1.45). In this book, published first in 1852, the author tries to reveal the situation in America in her own age. She is a northerner and yet she does not take the northern viewpoint of Abolition, but criticizes it most harshly as self-righteous. The worst character in the book was from the North, not the slaveholding South.

Perhaps you wonder how I could recommend to you a book that is one hundred thirteen years old as being valuable reading for today's racial problems? The reason I give is this: The book shows you the kind of climate out of which 1965 has grown. If you want to understand some of the problems we have today, look at what gave birth to those problems more than one hundred years ago.

Three weeks ago I picked this book by chance at the bookstore—just to thumb through it. After reading the first five pages, I had to purchase it and read it. Maybe those first five pages will have a like effect upon you.

A Letter To All Young Farmers

(The following letter was given to the Plainsman by V. L. Wallace of Route 1.)

This letter is written on farming interest and drought conditions on this part of the South Plains since 1906 and 1907. This is a rich country if you will keep your subsoil moisture.

So I am going to tell the story on weather conditions in the Southwest. Some farmers have asked me to write a letter on farming for the southwest and give a back record of the South Plains, New Mexico and Arizona since the year of 1906 and 1907 on moisture conditions.

In the first place I do not claim to know everything to a T. But I do know we have droughts in this country and always have had since I can remember. Farming has become a business here and in farming it takes water.

You cannot fertilize land here in this country without water. You will burn up your crops. Rain fall is very scarce here some years. So you can see deep breaking this land is the wrong thing to do.

Every year the right thing to do is to save all the moisture you can. Deep breaking land is good alright, but it's not good every year. You might not get it wet enough to plant when planting time comes.

Now in the Spring of the year, April, May and June is our best rainy months of the year. It is well to re-

member in all of West Texas spring of the year brings on great changes in the weather. Spring of the year, the new year starts here in this country, or that is, it is more noticeable.

The big storms cross the whole country. One big storm blowing against another big storm from the Pacific to the Atlantic oceans. We are on a big midland in one sense of the word. It takes the storms to start up the weather. If we didn't have storms, it would never rain very much.

Now a little more about the past drought in the years of 1906 and 1907. The country was all in grass and cow ranches. It was so dry in those years the ranchers had to drive their cattle off the Plains to keep them from starving to death. The roads were full of them to the east and northeast. They drove them by foot into Oklahoma and the Panhandle of Texas. My Father owned a ranch at that time near Memphis, in Texas.

I have been in West Texas and the Panhandle most of my life and I do know a lot about West Texas, New Mexico and Arizona.

This letter is to the young farmers of this territory.

Preserve moisture, don't deep break your land. This is an arid country.

On my farm we generally gather 75 to 80 bales of cotton each year on just 64 acres of land without any fertilizer.

Kay says this is a quick, easy and nutritious meal and her family loves it.

Shrinks Hemorrhoids Without Surgery Stops Itch—Relieves Pain

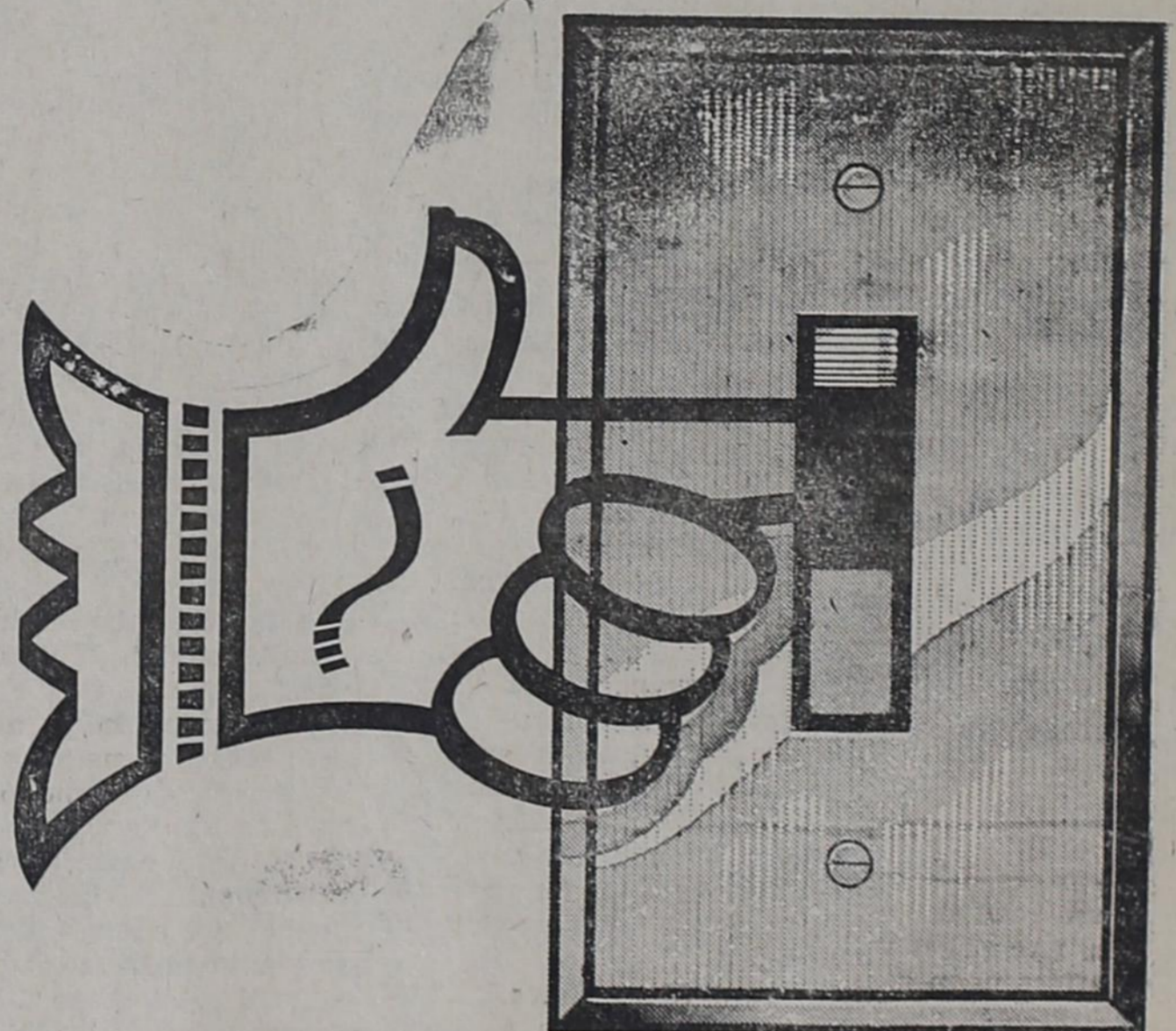

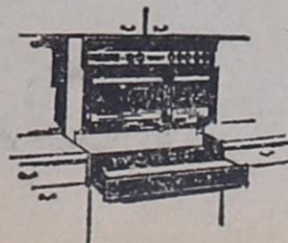
