CAMP PENDLETON, Calif. (FHTNC) — Marine Pvt. Jehue M. Price, son of Mr. and Mrs. Sidney Price of Ropesville, Texas, is scheduled to complete four weeks of individual combat training, on Nov. 24, at the Second Infantry Training Regiment, Camp Pendleton, Calif.

Each new leatherneck receives the training upon completion of recruit training to ensure his proficiency at combat formations, weapons firing and maneuvering techniques, individual protection and safe movement under day and night combat conditions.

Mrs. Sidney Price reported to the Plainsman that their son, Jehue, who is stationed at Camp Pendleton, Calif., is ill with measles and is now under quarantine.

Jehue stated, in a letter to his parents, that he was to have arrived in Ropes Tuesday, but stated it will now be December 21st before he will be able to come home. He is getting along fine, suffering mostly from a cold. He also stated that Parks Turer is in a San Diego hospital suffering from double pneumonia, but is now off the critical list. Also, there are at least 30 men confined with measles at the base, according to the report.

LIBRARY NEWS

Ropes High School is proud to state that the library is growing both in size and in use. Some one hundred books have been added this year with approximately that many being added last year. Many of these are non-fiction, biography, and classics. Several sets of classics given to the library by various citizens will be rebound in the future. One set, the complete works of Charles Dickens, is already in the process of being repaired.

The girls who work in the office have compiled a new card catalogue listing each book in the library. At last count there are 1,141 volumes in the collection. This includes 469 books lent by Hockley County Memorial Library to the school. Following is a break-down of the types of books represented:

News From South Plains College

On October 21, 1961, eleven nursing students from South Plains College were administered the State Board Examination in Austin, Texas. From the seventy-three approved LVN training programs participating in the exam, 656 candidates passed and were issued their Vocational Nurse licenses.

Three of the students from South Plains College received grades which were listed among the top ten grades. They were: Mrs. Martha Haynes of Littlefield, an employee of Medical Arts Hospital, who made a grade of 94 which was only two points below the highest state score of 96; Mrs. Josie Lee Phillips, also of Littlefield, with a grade of 93.6 and Mary Lee Boothe of Levelland, who is employed by South Plains Hospital, with a grade of 92.4.

South Plains College received an over-all school average of 84, and was ranked under 15 among the seventy-three participating schools. For this outstanding performance, Mrs. Shirley Kennedy, the South Plains College LVN instructor, should be commended.

The present nursing class in progress at South Plains College will graduate in August, 1962, and a new class will begin July 1, 1962. Registration for the next nursing class is now in process. Because of a limit of twenty-five students, those interested in this excellent nursing program should apply for the class at their earliest convenience. For information concerning the registration, write Mr. J. Frank Hunt, Director of Evening College, South Plains College, Levelland, Texas, or contact him at the college from 8:30 a.m. — 5:00 p.m. Monday through Friday, or from 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. Monday through Thursday.

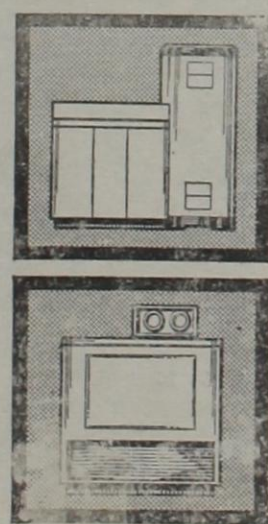
