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Frenship Students Participate In Tech Research Experiment

Students in Juanita Strong's homemaking classes may start eating breakfast now before coming to school in the mornings.

Two weeks ago, two Tech graduate students in Nutrition and Home Economics Education came to Frenship High School to present a unique educational unit on how breakfast eating habits affect teenagers mentally and physically.

Instead of the usual textbook instruction on the benefits of proper nutrition, nine freshman girls participated in tests to measure mental performance and their nervous irritability threshold on days when they had eaten breakfast and days when they had not.

And if that wasn't enough, the nine students twice donated blood on two different days to compare their blood sugar level on mornings with meals and mornings without.

According to Brenda Ramirez, a graduate student in nutrition, and Sharyl Fuller, a graduate student in home economics education, when the students eat breakfast, they perform better in class, are less irritable, and maintain better attitudes towards their work, their peers, and yes, their teachers.

"Breakfast affects attitude and performance," Ramirez said. "It increases motivation and awareness."

Ramirez said one of the reasons the blood tests were taken before breakfast was to test for anemia in the students.

"We're doing this because anemia is one of the major problems in young women in the United States," she explained.

The students are then fed a balanced breakfast consisting of minimum daily requirements from meat, milk, breads or cereals, and fruits and vegetables, and given another blood test two hours later. The researchers compare the level of glucose in the blood from the second test to the first.

Next the students take a math test to measure their mental performance and a Tweezer Dexterity Test which consists of putting small metal pegs into small holes with a pair of tweezers. The graduate students said if a student eats breakfast, she will perform much better on the tweezer test which measures nervous irritability.

Ramirez said a girl in Idalou was able to place 100 pegs in 100 holes in three minutes. She had eaten breakfast before taking the test, however.

Two days later, the students again give blood and retake the tests. This time, however, they do not eat breakfast. Generally, Ramirez said, the students perform about as well on the math test, but "so far there has been a big difference in the manual dexterity test."

There is a difference, too, in the way the students have been drawn into the educational unit. The class was conducted as a seminar with the students talking freely about the reasons they do not eat breakfast, such as sleep, or lack of time.



"We have a section on what affects their feeding habits; family background, cultural aspects, whether they like the food, and so on," Brenda Ramirez said.

"They can identify with it better than out of a textbook." Juanita Strong, Frenship's homemaking teacher, agrees.

"It's been a very valuable learning experience for my students. The girls are really excited about it," she said.

The project is funded by a \$5,000 grant from the Institute of Food Science and Nutrition. The two Tech graduate students designed the program, and intend to include about 100 area high

school students in their experiment.

The two researchers hope to publish the results in a professional educational journal, Ramirez said. They have received assistance from Lucia McBryer, a registered medical technician, and Coleen Jobe, a microbiologist from Furr's Cafeterias.

Area School Districts Receive Federal Funds

Area school districts will be receiving immediate moneys under the School Impacted Aid Program with the possibility of additional moneys in the future.

The aid program affects areas where there are federal employees whose children attend public schools.

Congressman George Mahon was advised Monday by the Department of Health, Education, and Welfare that the entitlement for Lubbock County had been approved.

Under the program, Lubbock Independent School District will receive \$100,318; Frenship ISD will receive \$85,092; Shallowater ISD will receive \$3,570; and Smyer ISD will receive \$1,249.

All Texans Should Know Weather Warning Signals

Two phrases that should be part of every Texans' vocabulary are "tornado watch" and "tornado warning."

The National Weather Service is constantly monitoring the skies and will issue a "watch" anytime a squall line which has the potential of spawning tornadoes begins to develop. "Watches" are usually posted for broad areas spanning hundreds of miles. It is not uncommon for a city or town to be included in a watch dozens of times without ever experiencing a tornado.

For this reason there is a danger of becoming complacent. Although no one expects that people will "drop everything" when a watch is posted, they should become conscious of the weather and monitor broadcasts for developments.

In spite of great technological strides, the human eye is still the best instrument for locating a tornado. Since radar isn't effective in spotting most tornadoes, many communities have organized

networks of trained volunteer spotters.

To be effective, a spotter must be trained because there are many weather conditions which resemble tornadoes but are not. These tornado look-alikes will confuse one untrained eye. More often than not, the classic funnel tornado will be clearly visible in West and Central Texas. In the Eastern states and East Texas the funnel will often be obscured by rain so that it is heard rather than seen clearly.

As potentially dangerous squall lines pass through an area, that community's trained tornado spotters are deployed to scan the skies for trouble.

If a twister is spotted, a "tornado warning" is signaled. Warnings are issued for much smaller areas and may mean that

residents may have only a few minutes to take shelter. If a warning is issued, persons in that area should immediately watch for danger and be ready to take cover at a second's notice.

Interviews with people who have lived through tornadoes, indicate that the most prevalent sound associated with tornadoes is that of freight trains passing close by or jet planes roaring overhead.

Anyone who thinks they have spotted a tornado should immediately notify law enforcement officials. Spotters do a good job in protecting their community but they cannot be everywhere at once.

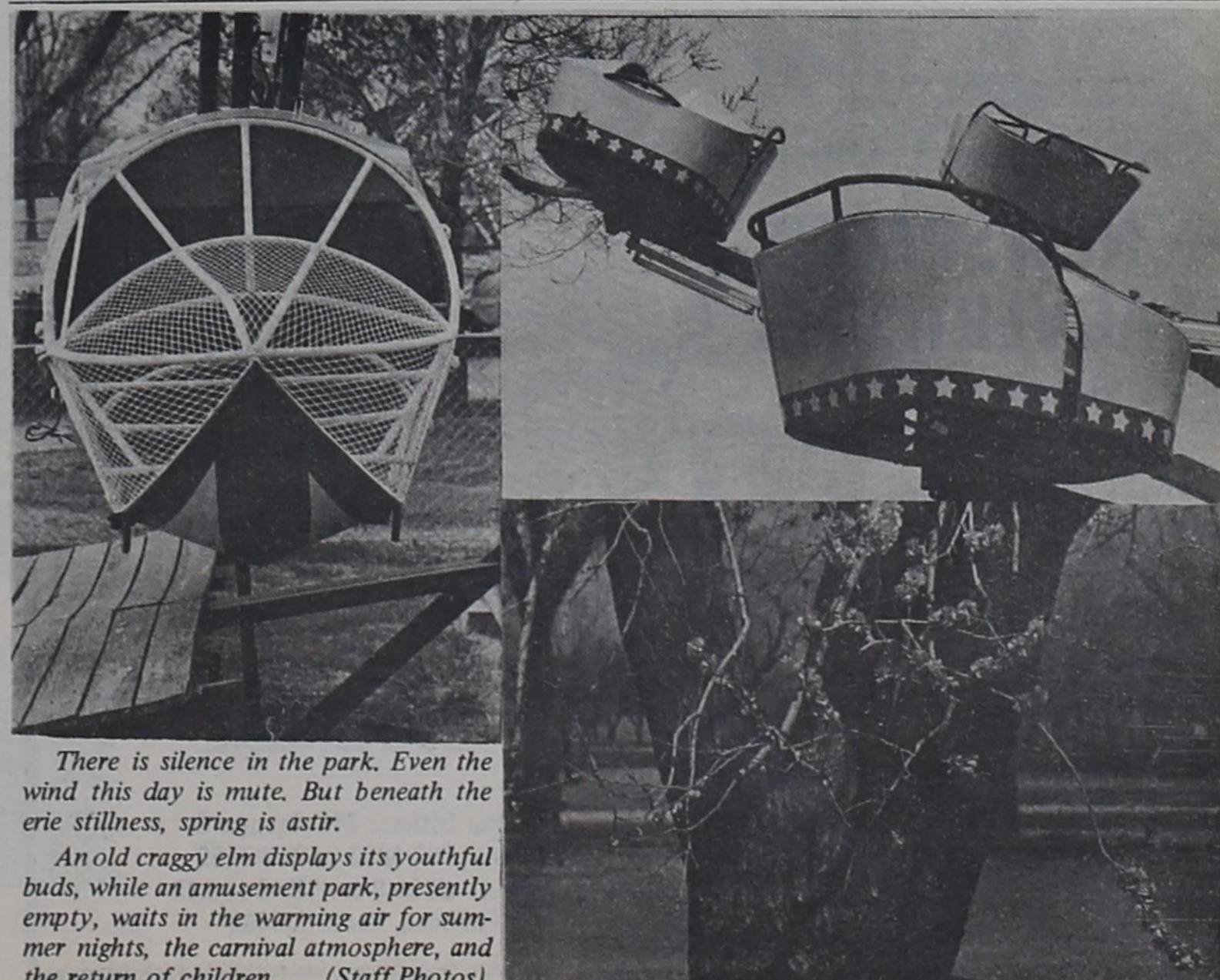
While the community goes about its business during a tornado watch, the spotters become the first line of defense against tornadoes striking without warning. The work can be dangerous. A volunteer spotter was killed by the tornado which wrecked Lubbock in 1970.

"Extension Update"

Are you one of the lucky people who received a Microwave oven for Christmas? Or, maybe you wanted one but didn't get it and are now trying to make a decision about buying this popular appliance.

We get several calls each week from Lubbock homemakers who are concerned with the safety, cost, or use of the Microwave oven. If you are one of these individuals, or merely interested in the appliance, we may have the answers to some of your questions!

As most of you know, this method of cooking does not involve heating the air or the oven. The Microwaves penetrate the food causing the molecules to vibrate, thereby, generating friction, and heat to cook some food items in seconds.

Loss of nutritional content and flavor of foods is at a minimum in the Microwave appliance, since little or no water is used when cooking.

Non-metallic cooking utensils, such as chinaware, oven-proof glass, ceramics, paper and some heat tolerable plastic are used in the Microwave oven. To prevent splatters, cover loosely with waxed paper or a paper towel.

There are, however, some cooking limitations that you need to be aware of:

- Most Microwaves cannot be used to simmer or stew.

- Some foods will not brown as well as when prepared on a conventional range, although browning features are now available on several models.

- The Microwave appliance will not produce crispy coatings or crust on pies. It will not fry or broil a food, but it does grill and toast, through not very effectively.

- Large cuts of meat are normally not as tender as when cooked in a conventional range.

The size of Microwave oven you choose should depend on: your budget, the amount of space you have available, and the type of

oven (free standing, portable, or combination Microwave-Conventional). Be sure to check the inside dimensions of the oven; there should be enough space to hold large food items such as roasts or turkeys.

In general, the Microwave oven costs less to operate than a conventional oven because the cooking time is shorter.

The Microwave appliance is made with the safety of the consumer in mind. The user is protected from excess exposure to microwave energy by stiff regulations. There must be at least two operating safety interlocks that will automatically shut off radiation when the oven door is opened.

The appliance is usually guaranteed for two years. But be a wise consumer—read the warranty carefully, make sure there is a competent dealer in the area to service the oven, and look for the seal of the Underwriters' Laboratories. This indicates that the appliance has been thoroughly checked.

Follow these basic recommendations established by the Bureau of Radiological Health:

- Never insert objects through the door grill or around door seal.
- Never tamper with or inactivate the oven safety locks.
- Never operate when empty.
- Frequently clean with water and a mild detergent, never use scouring pads, steel wool or other abrasives.

- Have the appliance checked regularly by a qualified serviceman.

- Switch control to "off" before opening door.

- Stay at least an arm's length away from the front of the appliance while it is on.

- If you wear a pacemaker, consult a physician before purchasing a Microwave appliance.

The Microwave oven can be a very valuable asset to your kitchen if used properly. Remember to be a wise consumer when shopping. Get all the facts, evaluate them in terms of your resources and needs, and make the decision to buy or not to buy through these evaluations, not

because of high pressure salesmanship.

Tonight tells the story for Texas Tech. The Red Raiders tangle with Missouri, Big 8 champions, in the first game of the Midwest Regional tournament, and it's a stern challenge.

The Tigers toppled Washington, a team that beat Tech by some 20 points at the first of the year. They obviously have a strong team to win their conference, recognized as one of the toughest in the nation.

In prior years you could almost say with some degree of assurance that the season was over. Southwest Conference teams have not, with consistency, beaten Big 8 teams.

That isn't true this year. Tech has beaten both Kansas State and Oklahoma State, and Missouri wasn't that much stronger than the Wildcats. So, if the Raiders relax and play their normal game, they have a better than fighting chance tonight.

The Raiders, though, will have to play much better than they did against Syracuse. The Orangemen, who didn't play well either, aren't as strong as Missouri and Tech had, all things considered, a relatively easy time with Syracuse.

The number of turnovers Tech committed against Syracuse were alarming for this late in the season. And a like performance against Missouri would be fatal.

Certainly the nervousness of playing a first round game should be gone. The Raiders obviously were tense. They forced some shots, they stood around too much and they didn't seem to relax. And they got careless with the ball.

They cannot afford such a performance against Missouri. If they are relaxed, move well and pass accurately, while getting the good shot, there's no reason to believe that they can't beat the Tigers.

It would be a great thing for Tech and the conference if the Raiders did win. It would mark the first time since SMU lost to San Francisco in the semi-finals of the national tournament in 1956, 20 years ago, that a SWC team advanced that far.

If Tech gets past Missouri, it probably would face Notre Dame, a shaky winner over Cincinnati and an earlier conqueror of the Raiders. And that could be an epic battle.

Right now there are doubts about the baseball season, pro-style, getting off on schedule. Talks between owners and labor have progressed at a snail's pace, with nothing concrete coming out of the meetings. Both sides refuse to budge.

Meanwhile, players are beginning to get impatient. They want to play, because those top-heavy salaries are in jeopardy. Maybe they're having second thoughts about going union.

Many a ballplayer lives like the rest of us, despite the inflated salaries, or pay—they spend what they make without putting anything aside. The prospect of going into another line of work is a little frightening.

And that other work doesn't pay quite in line. Big salaries in baseball don't necessarily mean an equivalent executive's pay for someone with no experience.

The owners, in many ways, hold the upperhand. The majority operate baseball clubs as a sideline to other businesses. They don't have to field baseball teams.

The owners generally own the stadiums, or have a lease agreement, on them. They foot all the costs. All the players have invested is their ability, and they run no business risks. It has become the classic confrontation between management and labor.


Frankly, my opinion is that baseball players made a grave mistake in fighting management. Sure, they have been chattels, but they've been well paid and salaries have gone up. They are doing what they enjoy and you can't beat the hours.

Unless the impasse is broken, and it may have been by now, professional baseball is in danger of being a bygone sport. The losers will be management, players and the public.

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

Sheridan's Ride

Well, I was early. So I sat down on a brick wall by the front door and waited. 2:10 p.m., nobody. 2:20 p.m., nobody. So, realizing what had happened, I started out, my cane and I, and hobbled over to avenue A where a good buddy picked me up and brought me to a cab availability.

Checking back I know better now. I overlooked the mention of the date in the first paragraph of T.J.'s column. I also checked with Mrs. A.L. Davis and Mrs. Americus Lee Smith and Mrs. Edwina Woods. I know now.

That service, one of the most thrilling and uplifting times of the whole year in this city, will be held on the fourth Sunday, that will be March 28, at 2:30 p.m. And, gussied up again, I shall indeed be there. I wouldn't miss it.

You shouldn't either. The whole of Lubbock should attend this one. The Federation of Choirs is the product of all the churches in east Lubbock and when they raise their collective voice and solo voices in the praise of the Lord they reach right into the innermost part of one's heart. There is an incredible joy in that service and one emerges just a little better a person than he was going in.

Remember the date—March 28, 2:30 p.m., Greater St. Luke's Baptist Church, 306 E. 26th St. It's an important date.

Still on things of Biblical nature this week. I went off to see the film production of "Moses" since my last column. This is a British and Italian co-production which was filmed in the arid lands of Israel. It is a curiously hybrid kind of picture, since Burt Lancaster as Moses is American; Anthony Quayle as Aaron is British; Ingrid Thulin as Miriam is Swedish; and Irene Papas as Zipporah is Greek!

The remainder of the cast is a mix of Israeli, American, Italian and the rest.

The film is well photographed and traces, naturally, the setting adrift of the baby Moses in the basket to be found by the Princess and raised as a prince of Egypt. There is the splitting from his "cousin," the Pharaoh Ramses II, and Moses' return to his people. The Passover, the beginning of the flight from Egypt, the parting of the Red Sea, the Burning Bush, the fall from grace and the Golden Calf, the laws and the ultimate victory into the Promise Land—all are told faithfully and with care.

The picture is told less lavishly and less overwhelmingly than the epic Biblical films from the Hollywood master of the genre, the late Cecil B. DeMille. It has validity, this "Moses," and the playing is sincere and direct.

The sequence, incidentally, of the parting of the Red Sea is a far better and more credible handling than the similar DeMille version in "The Ten Commandments."

Burt Lancaster, the one time trapeze artist and "Elmer Gantry," handles his Moses assignment with low-keyed honesty and quiet professionalism. Anthony Quayle's Aaron is a sad, troubled and sometimes uneasy portrayal. Miss Thulin makes a sincere Miriam, while Miss Papas gives her skills to Zipporah.

Two others score handily in this cast, Mario Ferrari as the Pharaoh and Yousef Shiloah as the wily Dathan.

The film, at the Cinema West, runs two hours and 20 minutes and is PG rated. It has had a dual reputation, for much of its content was seen on television under the title of "Moses: The Lawgiver" earlier. This film contains much material not seen in that TV presentation.

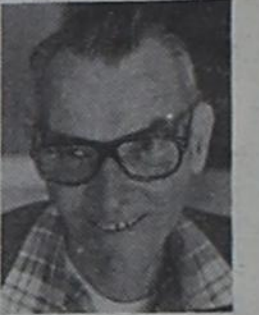

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF SHALLOWATER INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

2. (a) In election precincts numbered 46 at Community Club House Building, in Shallowater, Texas, in said School District, with Bob Grice as Presiding Judge.

The polls at the above designated polling places shall on election day be open from 7:00 o'clock a.m. to 7:00 o'clock p.m.

4. Mrs. Mary Ruth Walker is hereby appointed Clerk for absentee voting, and Mrs. Peggy Cowart and Mrs. Wana Beth Cook are hereby appointed Deputy Clerks for absentee voting. The absentee voting for the above designated election shall be held at School Administrative Offices within the boundaries of the above named School District and said place of absentee voting shall remain open for at least eight hours on each day for absentee voting which is not a Saturday, a Sunday, or an official State holiday, beginning on the 20th day and continuing through the 4th day preceding the date of said election. 7. Immediately after the votes have been counted, the officers holding said election shall make and deliver the returns of said election and perform all other duties as provided by the Election Code.

8. The Board of Trustees shall give notice of said election, and this combined Election Order and Notice shall serve as Notice for said election. The President of the Board of Trustees is hereby authorized and instructed to post or cause to have posted said combined Election Order and Notice at three public places where notices are customarily posted in this school district, and said posting shall be made at least 20 days before the date of said election.

The President shall also cause a copy

of this combined Election Order and Notice to be published one time in a newspaper of general circulation in the county where this school district is located. Said publication shall be not more than 30 days nor less than 10 days before the date of said election.

It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary posted written notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting on the bulletin board located in the central administrative office of this school district, a place convenient and readily accessible to the general public, and said notice, having been so posted, remained posted for at least 72 hours preceding the scheduled time of said meeting.

It is further found and determined that in accordance with an order of the Board of Trustees, the Secretary furnished a notice of the date, place and subject of this meeting to the county clerk of Lubbock County, Texas, the county in which most, if not all, of this school district's pupils reside.

The above order being read, it was moved and seconded that the same do pass. Thereupon, the question being called for, the following members of the Board voted AYE: Jay Stanton, Donald Martin, Walter Hutton, Melvin Stewart, Ronnie Elliott, Butch Pair, Newman Lusk; and the following voted NO: None.

AN ORDINANCE ORDERING A SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY OF ROPESVILLE, TEXAS, ON THE QUESTION OF THE ADOPTION OF A ONE PERCENT (1%) LOCAL SALES AND USE TAX WITHIN THE CITY; DESIGNATING THE DAY OF THE ELECTION AND THE POLLING PLACE; APPOINTING ELECTION OFFICIALS THEREFORE; PROVIDING THAT ALL DULY QUALIFIED RESIDENT ELECTORS SHALL BE QUALIFIED TO VOTE; PRESCRIBING FORM OF BALLOT; PROVIDING FOR NOTICE OF ELECTION; CONTAINING OTHER PROVISIONS RELATING TO SAID ELECTION; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62) authorizes the governing body of any city, town or village in Texas to call an election for the purpose of adopting a local sales and use tax within such city town or village; Now Therefore, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF ROPESVILLE:

Section 1. That a special election

shall be held in and throughout the City of Ropesville, Texas, on the 3rd day of April, 1976, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified voters of said City, for their action thereupon, the following propositions:

"FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

"AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city."

Section 2. That said election shall be held at one polling place for all qualified voters of said City, and the polling place and presiding officers for said election shall be, to-wit: Polling Place, CITY HALL; Presiding Officers, Merle Rodgers, Presiding Judge and Wanda Rodgers, Alternate Presiding Judge. The Presiding Judge at such election shall appoint two (2) clerks.

Section 3. That said election shall be held in accordance with the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas, and all duly qualified resident electors of the City of Ropesville, Texas shall be qualified to vote.

Section 4. That the ballots of said election shall conform to the requirements of Section 2, Subsection G, of Article 1066c, Vernon's Texas Civil Statutes (Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 36, Page 62), and to the requirements of Chapter 6 of the Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended, and the language to be printed thereon shall include the following:

OFFICIAL BALLOT

INSTRUCTIONS: Place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way you wish to vote.

- FOR adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.
- AGAINST adoption of a one percent (1%) local sales and use tax within the city.

Section 5. That election judges and clerks are directed to comply with Article 6.06, Election Code of the State of Texas, as amended (Section 2 of House Bill 181, Acts 1967, 60th Legislature, Regular Session, Chapter 452, Page 1026, 1028), which provides that a square shall be placed beside each proposition in which the voter is instructed to place an "X" or other clear mark to indicate the way he wishes to vote; but which also provides that failure of a voter to mark his ballot in strict conformity with the directions on the ballot shall not invalidate the ballot, and the ballot shall be counted if the intention of the voter is clearly

ascertainable, except where the law expressly prohibits the counting of the ballot. It is specifically provided that the election officers shall not refuse to count a ballot because of the voter's having marked his ballot by scratching out the statement of proposition for which he does not wish to vote.

Section 6. That notice of the election hereby ordered and called shall be given: (a) by publication on the same day of two successive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published within said City, the date of the first publication to be at least twenty-one (21) days prior to the date set herein for such election; and (b) by posting of such notice at the polling place in each of the election precincts of the City not less than twenty (20) days prior to the date set herein for such election. It is hereby found and determined that the Plainsman is a newspaper published with the City of Ropesville, Texas, and is a newspaper of general circulation within said City.

Section 7. In case any section, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, or word of this Ordinance shall for any reason be adjudged by any court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such invalidity shall not affect, impair, or invalidate the remainder of this ordinance.

Section 8. Whereas, the public convenience, safety and necessity of the City of Ropesville, Texas, requires the immediate passage of this ordinance, and an emergency is hereby declared and further reading of this ordinance is dispensed with, and the same shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication.

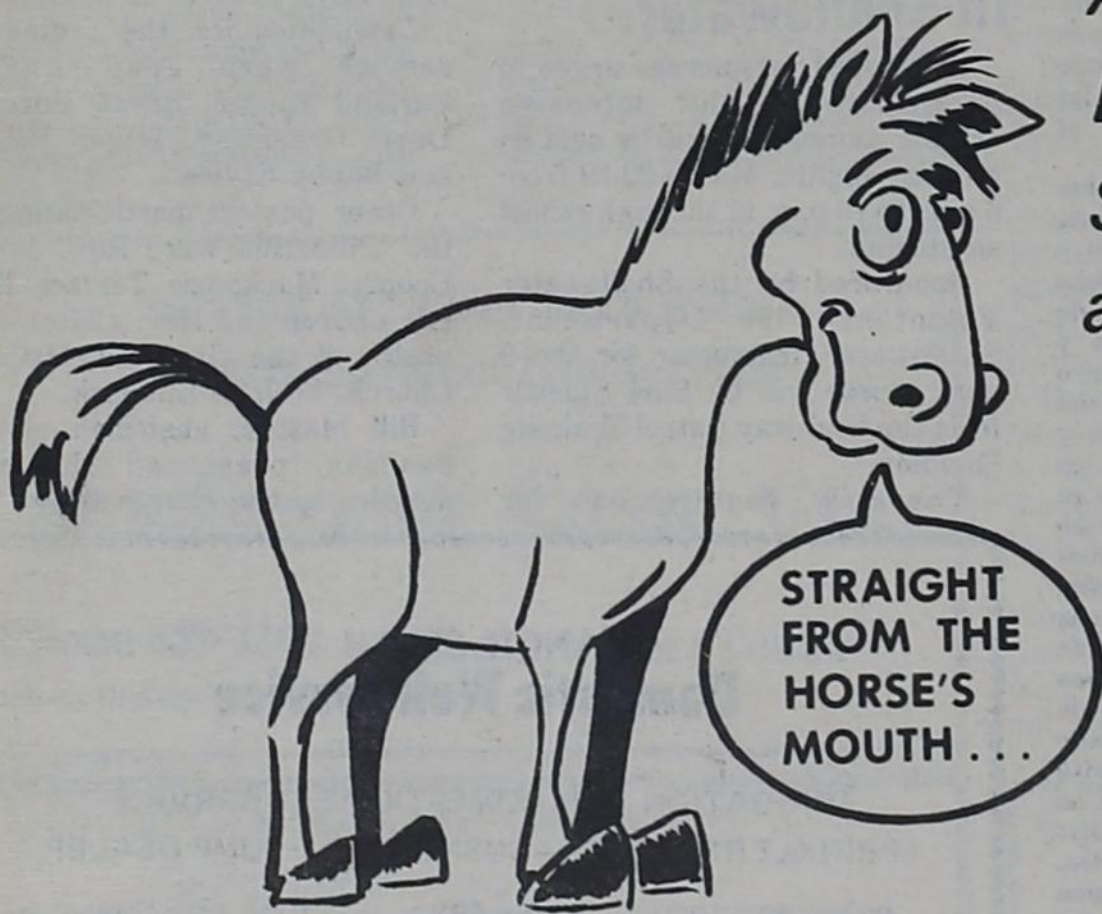
