EXPLAINS FREE VOTE Since it has become law that no one needs a paid poll tax to vote in a Federal election, Frank Burnett, county tax-assessor and collector, points out that anyone who has not paid their poll tax and desires to vote for the president, vice-president, etc., will have to register at his office and be issued a poll tax on which will be stamped, "poll tax not paid". This will allow them to vote in the general election for federal candidates, but not for state candidates.

If you want to vote for state and county candidates you must have a paid poil tax. If you are overage-61 or more-you do not require a poll tax, and if you do not live or vote in a city of over ten thousand population you do not need an exemption, as you can vote in all elections

The free poll tax can be secured in Ropes at Tyree's Insurance Office as long as his poll tax receipts hold out.






