Do You Suppose these Men Are Serious?

An Editorial

Over in Levelland three or four men have filed for county office, placed their announcement in the Levelland newspaper and seemingly that is the end of it.

We are wondering if they are really serious in their announcement—do they intend to make a countywide race?

So far they have completely ignored both Ropes and Anton communities, either having sufficient votes to decide a close election, and several times in the past have decided who went into office and who went out.

No man seeking a countywide office can confine his activities to one community—there are not enough votes to make this feasible. In a county-wide election all communities in the county must be considered and if they are not the candidate can look for little disaster.

It is not so much a man placing his name in the col-

umns of the Plainsman or the Four County News at Anton, as it is these newspapers represent these communities and in slighting these news media the community which they serve is also slighted.

Not by the widest stretch of the imagination can it be said that any newspaper in the county covers that county as a whole—no other county paper has the coverage in the Ropes territory that is enjoyed by the Plainsman—that is the only territory we claim to cover thoroughly.

We have been asked who these candidates are and what office they are running for and we have had to admit we have never met them, never seen them in Ropes, nor heard of them in the Ropes territory.

But we do wonder if they are serious when they say they are making a countywide race?

In the basketball game on Tuesday night between Wellman and Ropes girls, the Ropes girls defeated the Wellman aggregation 54 to 24, and thus clinched the district title.

Their next contest will be for the regional title and the game will be played at Canyon. Coach Maxfield stated he did not as yet know who they would play there. If they win this game they will go to Austin for a try at the State championship.

While during the season they did lose five games, they did not lose a single conference game.

Coach Maxfield said: The girls have performed as a team—the games they have won have been through team effort. All forwards have scored in double figures in district play, while the guards have done an outstanding job.

FRANK BURNETT EXPLAINS FREE VOTE

Since it has become law that no one needs a paid poll tax to vote in a Federal election, Frank Burnett, county tax-assessor and collector, points out that anyone who has not paid their poll tax and desires to vote for the president, vice-president, etc., will have to register at his office and be issued a poll tax on which will be stamped, "poll tax not paid". This will allow them to vote in the general election for federal candidates, but not for state candidates.

If you want to vote for state and county candidates you must have a paid poll tax. If you are overage—61 or more—you do not require a poll tax, and if you do not live or vote in a city of over ten thousand population you do not need an exemption, as you can vote in all elections free.

The free poll tax can be secured in Ropes at Tyree's Insurance Office as long as his poll tax receipts hold out.

3. The statement was made she stayed in the Sheriff's office for only a short time and was released. The fact is

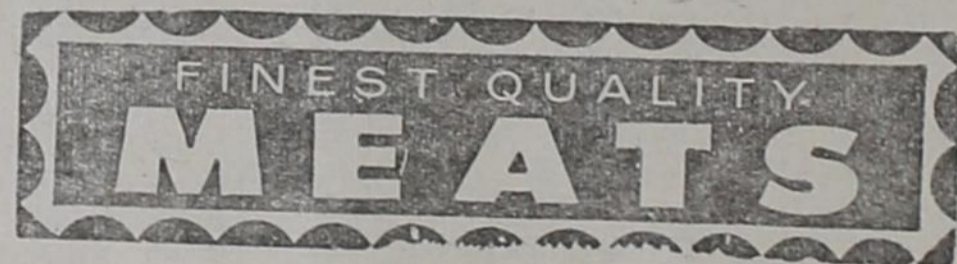

A taxpayer who is 65 or over is not required to file unless his gross income in 1963 was at least \$1,200, Mr. Campbell said.

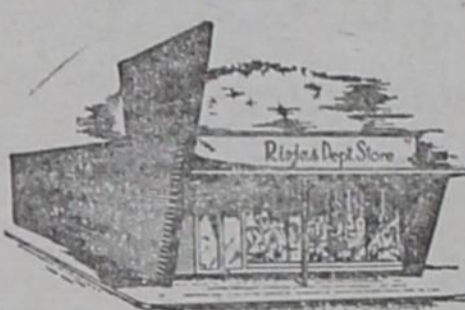
