THIS WEEK IN AUSTIN

One of the main targets of the special session is a better lobby control bill which would, among other things, better define ways a trade association or interest group could have its voice in state government.

Mainly, though, new lobby-control measures will prevent bribery situations which in the past have cost Texas plenty. Just exactly how much it has cost the state would be impossible to find out.

One measure introduced in the Senate has to do with "direct communication". This bill would allow a lobbyist to spend any amount of money on a lawmaker for entertainment without reporting it, as long as he didn't mention legislation during the entertainment.

"Direct communication" has been defined as "any personal appearance before a legislative committee, or any personal contact or communication with any member of the Legislature for the purpose of explaining, discussing, or arguing for or against pending or proposed legislation or any action thereon by the Legislature, the Governor, or the Lieutenant Governor."

Under this bill, by Sen. Crawford Martin, only those persons who make total expenditures of more than \$50 during any one calendar year through "direct communication" would be required to file an accounting of the money spent.

The effect of entertainment on legislation is a subject that can be debated in the Legislature from now on.

Even when trade associations, civic groups, private industry and other sponsors entertain groups of legislators through their Austin contacts, legislation is seldom if ever mentioned.

With discussions underway in the Senate, action is underway toward lobby control measures. Just what the final outcome of this work will be, we can only wait and see. At any rate, it is a subject well overdue for consideration.

As a matter of fact, a look at the liquor laws which now grace the statute books of Texas will convince you that they were written by the liquor interests and passed to aid in the distribution of liquor in dry territories.

And, if a bootlegger is caught, the penalty is so light that he is back in business within a short time.

One liquor outfit, it is alleged, that works in this territory, has a fund set aside for fines, and when a bootlegger is fined he is not

out one red cent — the big boss pays the bill.

Take a look at this: According to County Attorney Tabor, a person can take a bottle of liquor and sit down on the court house lawn in Levelland and drink to his heart's content, and if he is not drunk the law cannot touch him.

And here is another, you can haul it about in your car, drink it in front of the officers, and if you are not drunk — sloppy drunk — there is not a thing that can be done about it.

So, this gives you an idea of why liquor is sold in great quantities in the county, and why it will continue to be sold.

What is needed are liquor laws with teeth in them, and until the day comes that teeth are put in the liquor laws there will be no shadow of a chance of enforcing the liquor laws of this state.

SEAGRAVES RIPS ROPES, 34 TO 6

Three touchdowns within six minutes early in the third quarter added to first and fourth quarter touchdowns by Seagraves chilled Ropesville, 34 to 6, in a battle of the Eagles at Seagraves last Friday night.

Seagraves drew first blood in the initial quarter when quarterback Dennis Grimes tossed a 15-yard pass to halfback Jim Hamilton, who then raced 20 yards to score. Hamilton converted.

Fullback Lavoid Lowrie accounted for Ropesville's tally in the second quarter when he rammed over from the 3-yard line.

Seagraves stunned Ropesville with three quick scores in the third period. Second play after the kickoff halfback Pat McAdoo romped 43 yards for a touchdown. Hamilton converted.

Then fullback R. E. Dugan capped a 45-yard drive when he plunged over from two yards out. Hamilton's conversion was again good.

End Eddie Singleton ran 15 yards to score after nabbing a 20-yard aerial from Grimes and Hamilton made good his fourth conversion.

A 70-yard punt return by Hamilton in the final period ended the scoring.

HOCKLEY BAR HITS TROOP USE

In a resolution mailed to President Eisenhower Thursday of last week, members of the Hockley County Bar Assn. expressed unanimous condemnation of the Chief Executive's action in sending federal troops into Little Rock, allegedly "without authority or color of authority, as required by the Constitution of the United States."

"Personal feelings toward integration were not our concern in passage of a resolution to write the President," said bar president Warren G. Tabor. "It is strictly a legal question as far as we are concerned."

The resolution labeled the controversial White House move unconstitutional on the basis that "... No rebellion or insurrection, as recognized by the Constitution, was in being," and, that the President "in ordering out such troops acted without authority ... as set forth in the Constitution ..."

"We believe in law and order," the letter to Eisenhower stated, "... but when such action as that taken by you, in your official capacity as the President ... is without authority or color of authority, as required by the Constitution ... then it becomes the duty and obligation of every member of the Bar everywhere to condemn such action."

The letter concluded with an assertion that the Bar members "are vitally interested in seeing that orders of the courts are carried out but only so long as such court orders are carried out and enforced in the manner prescribed by law."

Federal marshals were the proper authorities to enforce the Supreme Court ruling, contended Tabor, and enforcement should not have come in the form of a "dictatorial edict" from the Chief Executive, he maintained.

No schools are integrated at present in Hockley County, but should a local court order require it, "I think the members of the Bar Assn. would follow any legal procedure taken," said Tabor.

"We may not like some of the court orders that come down," he said, but "we will obey them, regardless of whether we like it." Tabor said as far as he knew most of the Hockley Bar members were opposed to integration at this time.

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MASS FLIGHT OF CHICKEN HAWKS

Here is something new to us and will, perhaps, be new to you—a mass flight of chicken hawks. But, let the Jayton Chronicle tell you about it:

Folks in this part of West Texas are more or less accustomed to seeing flights of crows, ravens, sandhill cranes, and, of course, ducks and geese, but last Saturday morning Claud Senn, who lives southwest of Jayton a few miles, noted a "convention" of chicken hawks in the sky over his farm.

Claud reports that when he observed the birds gathering, he went to the house to get his binoculars to secure positive identification. The hawks streamed into the

gathering from every direction, Senn reported. When there was a vast cloud of the wheeling, circling birds, Claud stepped to the telephone and called the Chronicle office and asked if we had ever seen a "chicken hawk convention". He gave instructions as to where we might be able to spot the gathering and by the time this writer could get outside and locate the flight, the hawks had begun to move off to the south and were visible only as a large, dark cloud, moving slowly south.

Senn states that once before he had witnessed a similar flight of hawks. This writer had never before heard of such a phenomenon, much less witnessed one. Neither do we recall ever

having read of hawks making a massed flight.

DAVID GLENN RITES SET IN EDMONSON

(David Glenn was a former resident of Ropesville, he having been one of the builders of the Farm Center Gin. He had many friends in this community.)

Funeral services for David A. Glenn, 42, a Plainview resident, were held at 3 p.m. Saturday of last week at the Edmonson Baptist Church with the pastor, the Rev. R. L. Swanner, officiating.

Glenn died from shotgun wounds in the right chest. Burial was in Plainview Memorial Park by Lemmons Funeral Home.

Glenn was found by Melvin Morton of Edmonson about 10 a.m. in a bar ditch 2 miles southwest of Edmonson in the Running Water community.

Morton said Glenn was lying in the ditch near his station wagon which was parked at the side of a country road beside the Glenn farm.

The door of the station wagon was open and the scabbard of the shotgun was laying on the front seat. There was an impression of the shotgun butt in the ground just under the open station wagon door.

Glenn had a shotgun wound in his left chest near the heart. He died about 3 minutes after arrival at the Plainview Hospital and Clinic.

Born in Stamford Aug. 20, 1915, Glenn moved to the Plains in 1947. He lived in Ropesville, Cotton Center and Edmonson until 1955 when he moved to Plainview from Edmonson. He was a farmer.

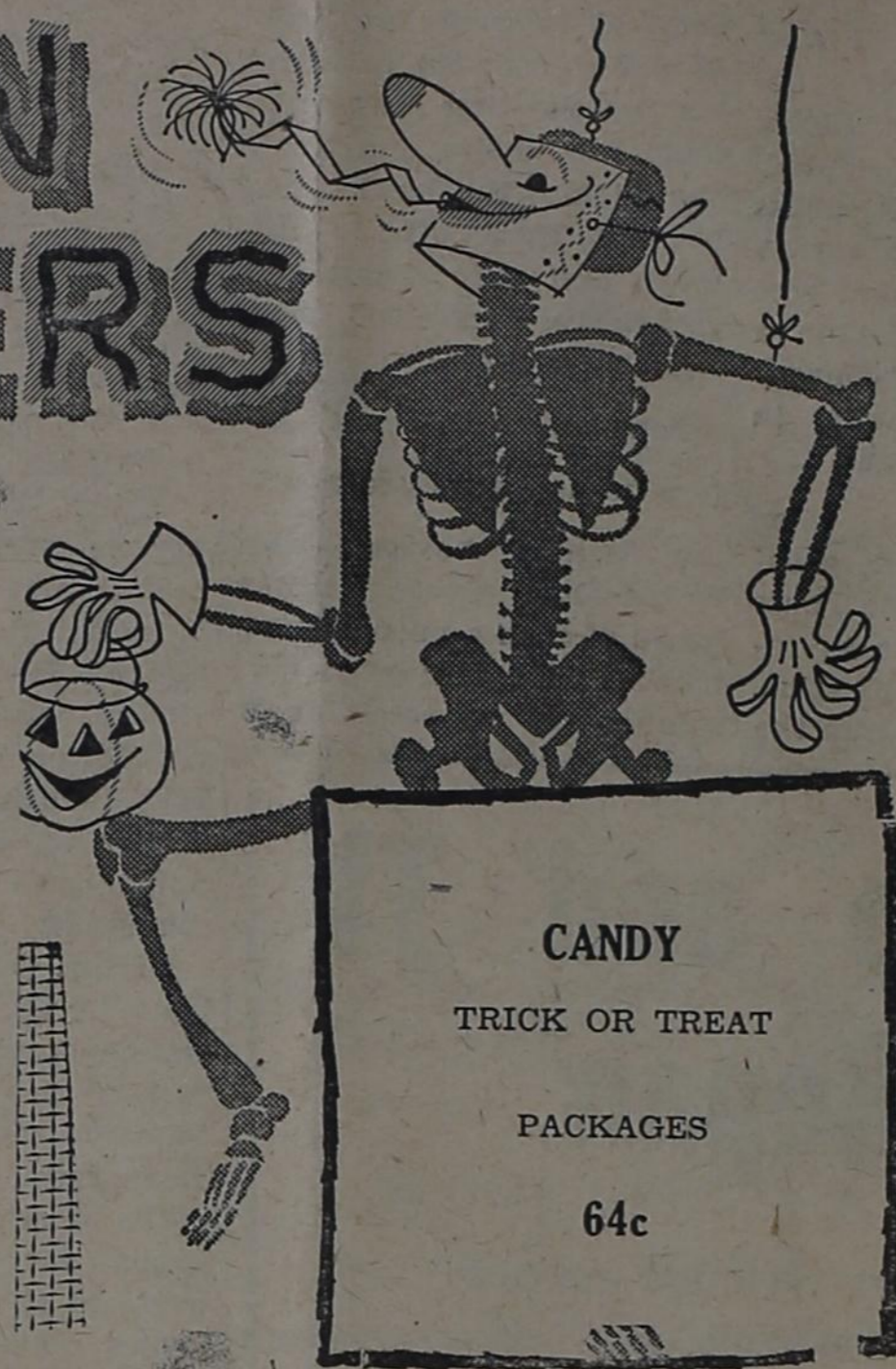
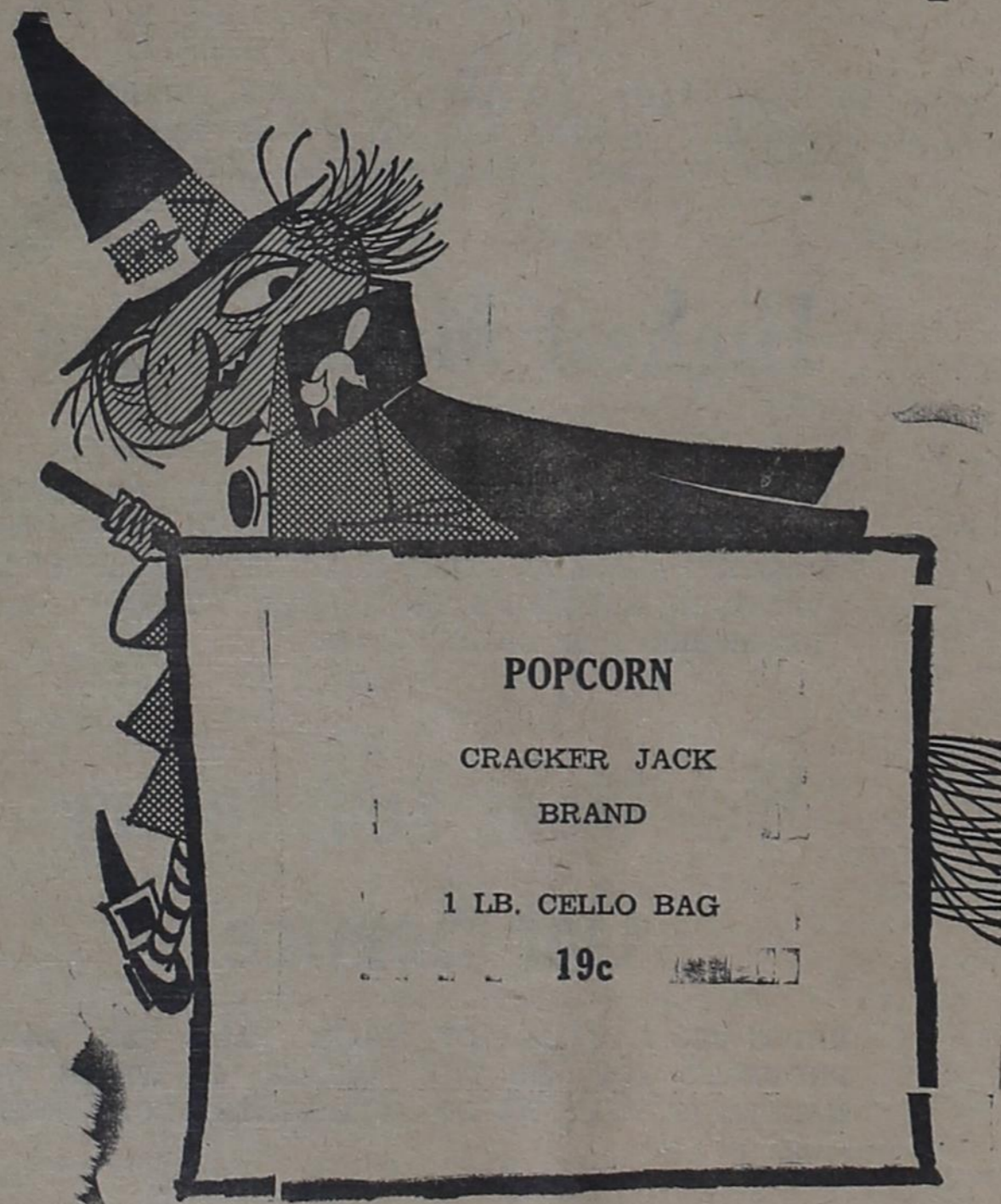
