

## FIRST STORMS HIT PLAINS ON MARCH 28TH

The first tornado warnings and the first tornadoes hit the South Plains March 28th.

Charles Shannon, head of the Ground Observers Corp, was alerted just after noon on Friday of last week to be on the watch for possible tornadoes.

Immediately afterward the clouds built up in the southwest, but instead of sweeping directly over Ropes they split, going to the north and south. Both clouds contained tornadoes. The first report of a twister came over KLLL Radio Station in Lubbock announcing a twister was sighted ten miles northeast of Brownfield. A little later Constable Jack Ogle was informed by the Highway Patrol they were following the cloud.

This twister damaged a few buildings near Brownfield, Lakeview and New Home. Soon another tornado was reported between Smyer and Roundup, but did no damage.

This latter cloud was visible from Ropes, boiling in the air. As the tail end of the cloud passed over the Ropes community a heavy downpour of rain resulted, leaving three-fourths inch of rain, and some hail.

Almost immediately following the passing of the cloud Mrs. James L. Means called the Plainsman office and reported an airplane hangar on their place two miles west of Ropes was flattened.

"It was a terrible looking cloud, and for a few minutes it became dark," stated Mrs. Means. "When the cloud passed and it became lighter we noticed the hangar was destroyed."

Another twister was reported near Floydada, but no damage was reported.

## PAUL WILLIAMS VISITS ROPES

## DEAN OF STUDENTS SPEAKS AT ROPES HIGH SCHOOL

C. L. Kay, Dean of Students of Lubbock Christian College, was guest speaker at the Ropes High School assembly program April 2. His subject was entitled "What Makes America Great?" "Despite the fact that our first satellite was a failure," says Dean Kay, "I still believe that America is the greatest nation in the world." He stressed the fact that America is a big country; big in ideas, legend, and out-look.

Four facts of interest were brought out which make America great. They were: (1) We are free, (2) America is a land of vocational opportunities, (3) America is a land of educational opportunity and (4) Because of our Civic Organizations such as Rotary and the Lion's Club. "Clubs such as these," said Mr. Kay, "are designed to create understanding between people and nations."

In the closing remarks the speaker stressed the fact that America has a great future if "we do a good job in building citizenship, educating our youth, and training them to accept the challenges of tomorrow."

Mr. Kay suggested, "America has come to the front and we must retain that position. To do so, we the people must preserve the foundation of our American way of life, we must have faith in God, and we must maintain our political and economic rights, which include the right to speak, to assemble, and to worship."

A native of Pennsylvania, Mr. Kay attended Freed-Hardeman College before going to Eastern New Mexico University in Portales, New Mexico, where he earned his B.A. and M.A. degrees. He has done additional graduate work at the University of Colorado.

Prior to accepting his present position as Dean of Students of Lubbock Christian College, Dean Kay, taught on the campus of West Texas State College for three years.

A little over two hundred students are enrolled in Lubbock Christian College for the spring semester. Next year the college will be open to sophomores and an expected enrollment of 350-400 is anticipated.

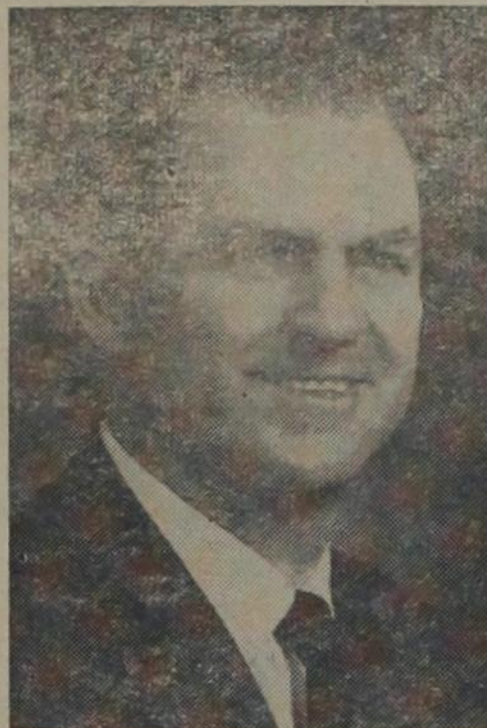

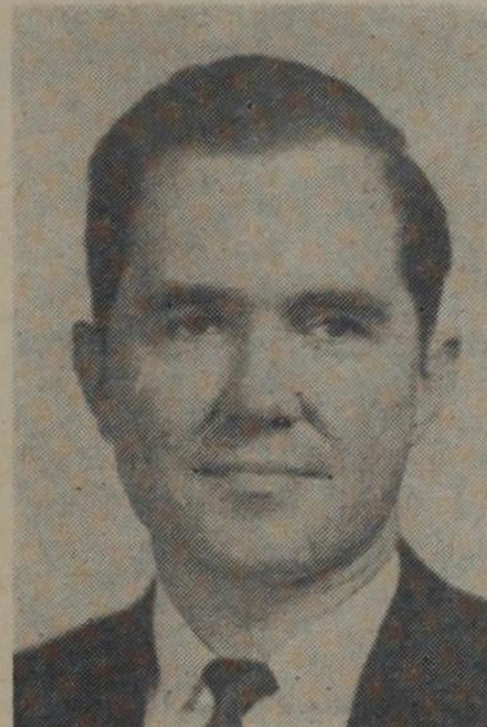

### SCHOOL NEWS

(Continued from last week) SIZE, VALUATION, AND TAX RATE OF DISTRICT From Last week

The District covers a small town and one hundred twenty-five (125) square miles in area. The valuation was doubled in 1954 and later increased ten per cent more. The tax rate was then set at one dollar (\$1.00) on the one hundred dollar (\$100) valuation. This year (1957-1958) the assessed value is about four million four hundred thousand dollars (\$4,500,000) with a tax rate of one dollar and twenty cents (\$1.20) on the one hundred (\$100) valuation. Fifty cents (50c) is used for debt service, while seventy cents (70c) goes to the local maintenance fund. SCHOOL BOARD

The School Board holds regular and special meetings conducted according to law and the printed school policies.

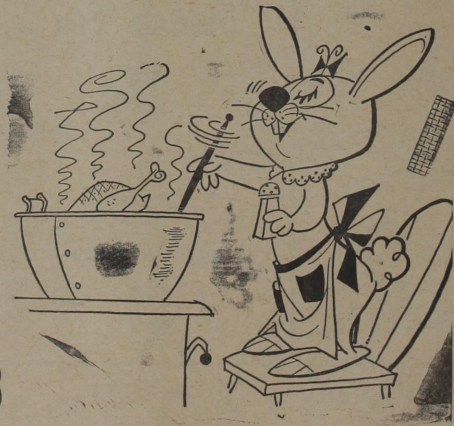
