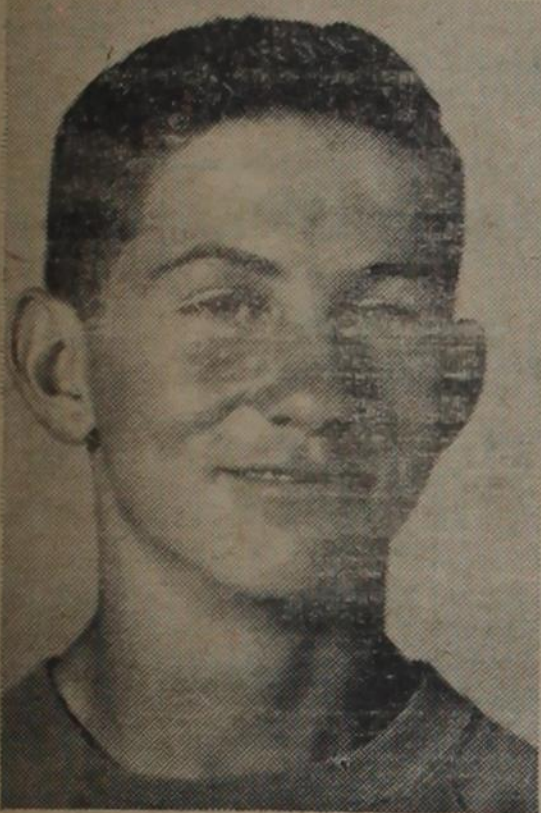

The Ropes Junior High School graduation exercises will be held Thursday night, May 23, (tonight) in the High School Auditorium.

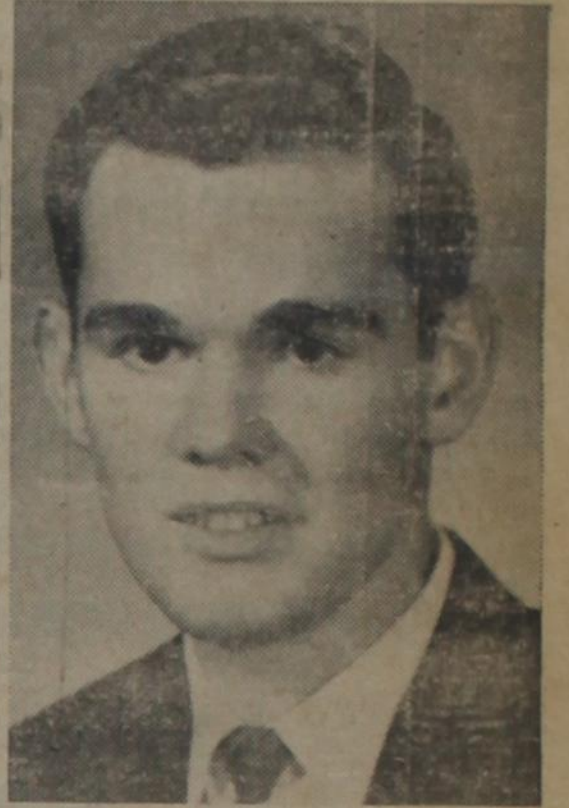

A lady by the name of Thelwyn Wetherald sat down one day and wrote a little poem. It expresses a beautiful thought that we need. Here's what she wrote:

My orders are to fight;
 Then if I bleed, or fail,
 Or strongly win, what matters it?
 God only doth prevail.

The servant-eraveth naught
 Except to serve with might.
 I was not told to win or lose,
 My orders are to fight.

It is good to remember that today in the world in which we live, it seems the measure of a man today is not that he fight for what is right, but that he succeed. Success, that's what we all want and many are willing to pay dearly for. Success, that's what makes a man. Success, that's what rules the world.

Funny how we can take things and twist them to suit us and our conceptions, isn't it? The coach who is the greatest success today is the one who wins the most games, not the one who teaches sportsmanship and clean play and love of the game. The doctor who is a success today is the one who drives the biggest car and lives in the largest mansion. The business man who is a success today is the one who can have the biggest store or make the most money off of a product. The politician who is a success today is the one who can get elected the most times to a higher office. Even the preacher of today is not a success unless he serves the largest church.

One man, who was counted a failure by the standards of the world, once said that the way to success was to serve. "The greatest among you shall be the one who serves the most," he said. And we have taken this and made it

imply that we had to win. Win, at all cost, win! You are a failure if you do not win.

I think we need to go back and get a few things in proper perspective about the faith of the Nazarene. He never once told us that we could expect success as the world measures success. A man named Abraham Lincoln once said it in these words: "I am not bound to win, but I am bound to be true. I am not bound to succeed, but I am bound to live up to what light I have. I must stand with anybody that stands right, stand with him while he is right, and part with him when he goes wrong." Is it any wonder we say he was a great man?

MILEPOST 100

John Santa Fe turns 100 this year but you'd truly have to say he neither looks nor acts his age.

From that modest beginning at Topeka, Kansas, in 1868 Santa Fe has grown into a \$2 billion empire whose 13,000 miles of track extend, as Cyrus K. Holliday, its founder and first president predicted, from the Great Lakes to the Pacific Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico.

Santa Fe operates more miles of track in Texas—3,615 to be exact—than in any other state. There are 7,578 Texans on the payroll who last year earned \$38,151,026. The company's '67 tax bill amounted to \$3,264,466.

Through the years the railroad has scored some impressive transportation 'firsts,' including the first to become fully Dieselized in 1954, developing the Astorreyer car for shipment of automobiles in 1960, and the inauguration of 'Super C,' the world's fastest freight train in 1968, which operates on a 40-hour schedule between Chicago and Los Angeles although it consistently makes the run in little more than 35 hours. These are but a few; the list is almost endless.

While Santa Fe is pardonably proud of its distinguished past, its centennial theme is geared to the future—'Second Century of Progress—On to 2068.'

Voting

Absentee voting for the Second Democratic Primary slated June 1 will begin Wednesday, May 22, and continue through Tuesday, May 28, according to Raymond Dennis, county clerk.

Emmett Schoenrock and Myrl Brock were forced in a runoff election during the first primary May 4 for Commissioner for Precinct 1. Their names will appear on ballots for voting boxes 11, 12, 13, 14 and 15 only.

Also on the ballots for the entire county will be Preston Smith and Don Yarborough for governor of Texas, Jack Hazelwood and James Joy for Court of Civil Appeals, Seventh Judicial District.

According to Dennis, anyone who has moved from one precinct to another since registering, is required to report to the tax-assessor collector's office to have their voting precinct changed four days prior to the second primary. If these requirements are not met, they will not be eligible to vote.

Persons who have moved to Hockley County, but have not resided here for six months will be required to vote during the absentee period mentioned above. They are not eligible to vote on a limited ballot unless they have mov-

ed from one of the 42 counties which make up the Seventh Judicial District. If they have moved from one of these counties they can vote for the two candidates running for Court of Civil Appeals. If they moved from any county but one of the 42 they are not allowed to vote for either Joy or Hazelwood.

Oil and gas wells provide approximately \$53 million a year of Hockley County's economic output, according to statistics released this week by Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association.

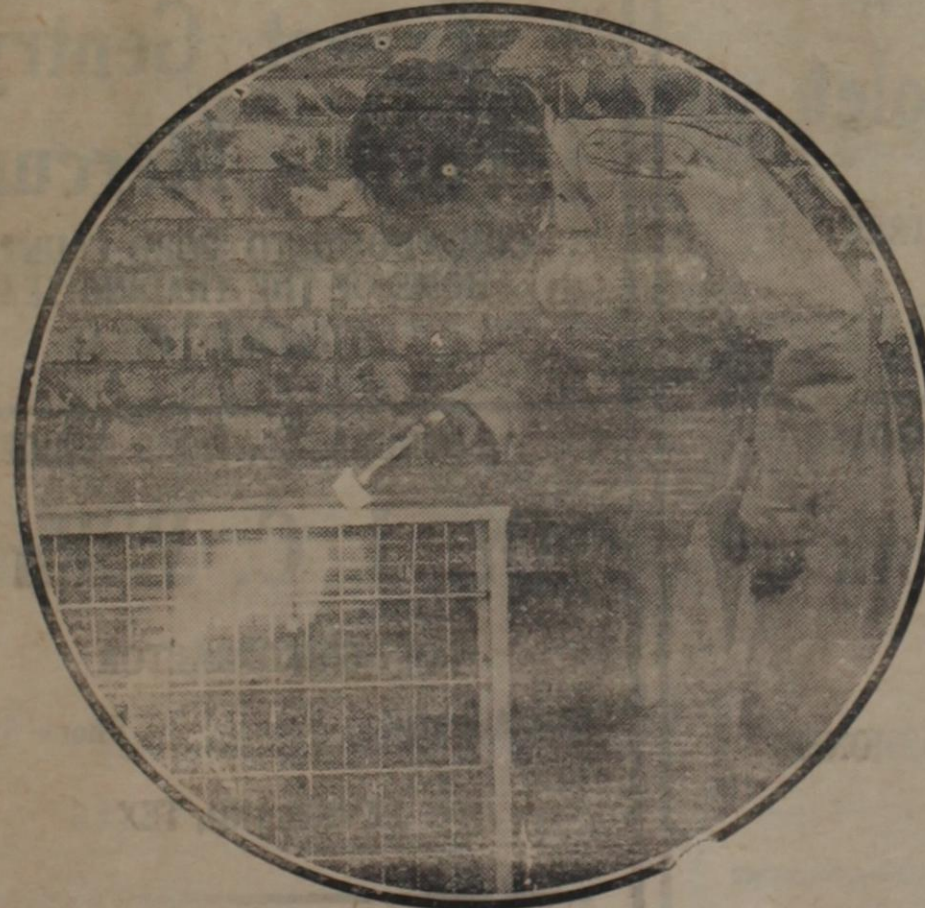
Production from Hockley County last summer helped prevent any oil scarcity for U. S. consumers at a time when one-third of the world's supply was cut off.

The annual study showed that Hockley County ranked 23rd among Texas counties in total value of its production of some 16.5 million barrels of oil and 30.9 billion cubic feet of natural gas.

Texas oil men drilled 67 wells in the county. Fifty-four of them were dry holes.
