First State Bank Now Open in Wolfforth

This past week witnessed the opening of the First State Bank in Wolfforth. According to information given the Plainsman, it met strenuous opposition even to a threatened injunction. However, it managed to bridge all the pitfalls that had been dug for it, and are now doing business next door to the postoffice in our neighboring city.

Wallace Barnett, president of the bank, stated they are now in temporary quarters, and at an early date they will start construction on their own building. He further stated that it is the hope of the bank to be able to serve both Wolfforth and Ropesville trade territories.

The bank has a capital stock of \$100,000, a surplus of \$50,000 and Undivided profits of \$50,000.

Mr. Barnett is a banker of long experience and was at one time associated with the bank in Anton.

CITY HAS BEEN SPRAYED FOUR TIMES

So far this season the City of Ropes has been sprayed four times with DDT to kill out the mosquitoes.

At no time in the history of Ropes have the mosquitoes been as numerous, or have they bit harder, than this year. Right after spraying, and for a few days after, their number is thinned out, but more hatch out. Bob Whitlock says it is because of the lakes, and they have been sprayed by airplane. However, the weeds are furnishing breeding places and unless they are chopped down and burned we will have the little pests until after a hard freeze.

ELBERT CAVITT SERIOUSLY ILL

As this is written reports from the Methodist Hospital, Lubbock, state Elbert (Cotton) Cavitt is still on the critical list. He has been in the hospital for more than three weeks, going there for an operation to remove a tumor from his lung. However, before the operation could be performed he developed pneumonia, and has since been in serious condition.

TRAILER TAGS AT TYREE'S INSURANCE

Those needing tags for their cotton trailers can now secure them at Tyree's Insurance Office in Ropes. As we understand it, all trailers hauling cotton must be tagged, and in placing tags in Ropes, Tax Assessor Frank Burnett is saving the folks of this community a twenty-five mile drive.

Twelve hundred persons filed into the Ropes School cafeteria Tuesday afternoon between the hours of 2 and 4:00 o'clock to take Oral Vaccine for the prevention of polio.

This inoculation was sponsored by the Lions Club and was a step toward wiping out polio.

Taking of this vaccine is supposed to eliminate "carriers" of the disease, who are now supposed to be the cause of it breaking out in different places. While the shots given are supposed to be effective, there are thousands who have never had the shots, and who will not take them, whereas most of those who will not take the shots will take the vaccine orally.

The Ropes Lions are to be commended for their work in bringing the vaccine to Ropes, otherwise the folks of this community would have had to go to Lubbock, Levelland or Brownfield for their inoculation.

Graduates to Enter Scholarship Competition Says R. K. Sams

All 1964 graduates of Ropes High School will enter the 1963-64 National Merit Scholarship competition, R. K. Sams, principal, announced today.

The National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test will be given in the school at 9 a.m. Tuesday, March 5, 1963.

Students who will graduate from high school in 1964 and enter college in the same calendar year are eligible for scholarship consideration in the 1963-64 Merit Program.

Awards in the Merit Program are granted on the basis of intellectual merit, but

student financial needs determine the amount of individual stipends. The stipends are renewable each year without further testing.

A student's performance on the qualifying test also provides him with information that is useful in career planning or in selecting courses in high school and college, Mr. Sams stated.

After the test, each participating student receives an interpretive folder prepared by Science Research Associates, the testing agency, that reports individual test results for comparison with

scores of high school students across the country. Thus, Sams said, students can learn more about their educational strengths and weaknesses—whether or not they plan to attend college.

In addition to the awards made by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation, about 150 business corporations, foundations, and individuals give scholarships through the Merit Program. A considerable number of other scholarship agencies utilize the services of NMSC in awarding their scholarships.

NMSC was established in 1955 through grants from the Ford Foundation and the Carnegie Corporation of New York. An additional Ford Foundation grant to extend the Merit Program through 1970 was announced in April, 1962.

In the period 1956-62, nearly 6000 students have received Merit Scholarship awards and thousands of other high-scoring students been assisted in obtaining financial aid from other sources.

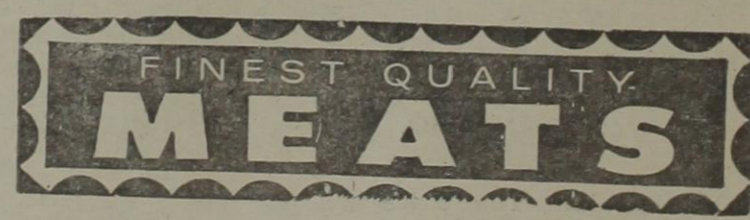

He has no fingers and only stubs of thumbs, but he grabs a short pencil with each stub and picks out letters on the typewriter.
