





Drain and measure 1/2 cup juice from tomatoes. Let rest of Juice and tomatoes stand until needed. Mix well in a 11/2-qt. bowl the 1/2 cup tomato juice, beef, onion, 1/2 teasp. Worcestershire sauce, 1 teasp. salt, pepper, bread and PET Instant. Divide meat mixture into 4 equal parts. With wet hands, shape each part into a small loaf. Put loaves into 9-in. square pan. 
