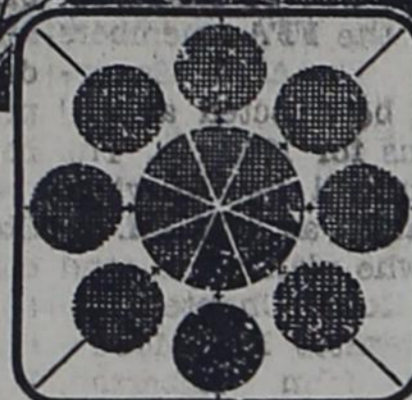

### Nazarenes To Hold District Assembly

# FISHING LINES

Many times, no doubt, you have felt that about half of the nation's 30 million anglers fish your favorite lake or stream. The numbers of American fishermen are going to keep growing. Yet some fishermen will continue to be quite successful. Why? Because they have above average fishing savvy and probably know many fishing tricks. Here are some hints which could help you catch more fish.

First, develop fine casting accuracy. Cast to areas around logs, bushes, lily pads and other "tough spots" that other anglers pass up. Many times you'll find unfished water even in "heavily fished" lakes or streams. To prevent snags, keep a supply of weedless lures, such as the ABU-Reflex weedless, in your tackle box. You'll be surprised at the number of fish lurking in rough-to-reach areas.

Like to bottom fish from shore? Many times fish will drop bait when they feel a sinker. You can fish with an unweighted line. Make a loop near the end of your line and slide it through an old hexagonal nut. Place a lump of sugar through the loop, then pull the loop tight. Cast. The sugar will melt in the water, the nut will fall off, and presto, your bait is in deep water with no fish-scaring sinker on the line.



Had trouble catching that lunker trout under a log or rock in a stream? Upstream from your quarry, slosh a hank of grass and soil around. As the soil particles reach your fish, toss out a worm and get set for results.

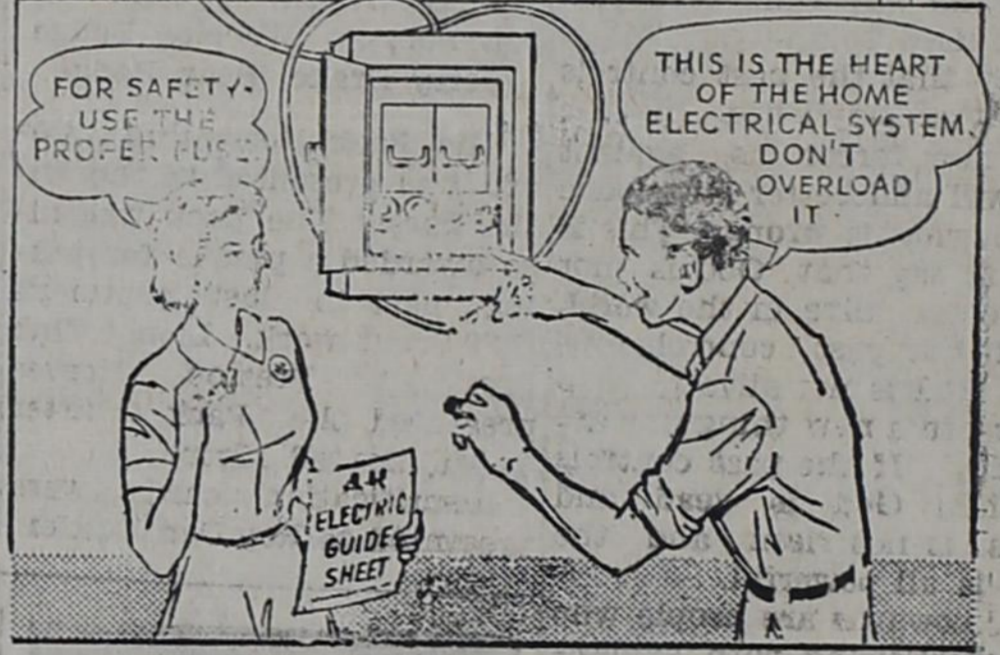
When you hook a fish, make a note of the depth, chances are you'll find more fish at that depth.

If fish are particularly squeamish, try an especially light line—say about four-pound-test Garcia Super-Platyl monofilament. Many times a tiny lure or spinner like the 1/8-ounce or 1/4-ounce Garcia Veltic will get fish which pass up larger offerings.

When fishing from a boat, avoid banging oars, tackle box or feet against it. Vibrations really do scare fish.

A final trick—stop, look and listen. Keep an eye on the fellow who consistently brings home the fish. Somebody's always coming un with a new fish-getting gimmick.

# LIFELINES to better living



"Don't overload circuits if you want to avoid blown fuses," caution 4-H Club members engaged in electric projects. They point out that the fuse box is the "heart" of the electric system and should be given proper care.

Never use a higher rated fuse than recommended or substitute something else which will keep the fuse from functioning properly, 4-H'ers warn. They regularly check electric circuits to guard against overloading—a frequent result from using more and more electrical equipment in the home and on the farm.

For 30 years the national 4-H Electric program has sparked millions of boys and girls to undertake a wide variety of projects. After learning the fundamentals of electrical energy and its place in modern living, they engage in projects that range from simple jobs like repairing cords to servicing motors, appliances and assisting with wiring and lighting surveys.

In recent years electronic devices including robots, radios and hi-fi sets have been constructed by club members. Participation in the program has enriched their knowledge and given comfort to their families as well, club leaders report. The work is supervised by the Cooperative Extension Service.

Sponsor of the program for the last three decades is the Westinghouse Electric Corporation. Members who complete the best projects receive recognition awards consisting of gold-filled medals, a trip to the National 4-H Club Congress and a chance to compete for six \$100 educational scholarships.

Local electric power suppliers also strongly support the program through recognition, technical assistance and teaching aids.

## TEXAS DEPT. OF PUBLIC SAFETY

### 1964 Driver License Suspensions and Denials

A total of 43 citizens of Hockley county had their driver's license either suspended or were denied a license during the year 1964. Of this total, 28 persons had their licenses suspended and 15 persons were denied a license.

The number and causes for suspensions and denials of licenses were: 31 drinking while driving; 5 habitual violators; 3 violation of restrictions; 2 automatic suspension in other states; 1 driving while license suspended; and 1 authority withdrawn.

During the year 23,958 licenses were suspended with 10,069 licenses being denied over the state. The 20 year old driver had the most licenses suspended with 1,348. The 19 year olds ran a close second with 1,313. The oldest driver who had his license suspended was 87 years of age with one driver 92 years of age being denied a license.

The above information was obtained from the records of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Washington, D.C.: Representative George Mahon reports that he has protested to the Secretary of Agriculture the proposed change in the skip-row program for cotton. Mahon advised the Secretary that he felt the proposed change would be disastrous to some farmers and hurtful to all.

Mahon has asked the Chairman of the House Committee on Agriculture to conduct an open hearing to enable farmers and farm organizations to air their views on the subject of the proposed change.

The Department of Agriculture has proposed a modification of the cotton skip row program for 1966 which would reduce by 30 per cent the advantage which the present program grants to producers who plant two rows of cotton and skip one or who plant two rows of cotton and skip two or who plant two rows and skip four.

The advantage granted under the present program to those who plant four rows and skip two or who plant four rows and skip four would be reduced by 15 per cent.

Mahon has provided details of the USDA proposed change to all ASC office managers in the District and to officials of farm organizations whose addresses are available to him. The Department will give consideration to all protests and recommendations which are submitted prior to May 22, 1965. Mahon urges that farmers and farm organizations make their views known immediately to the Department of Agriculture, Washington D.C.

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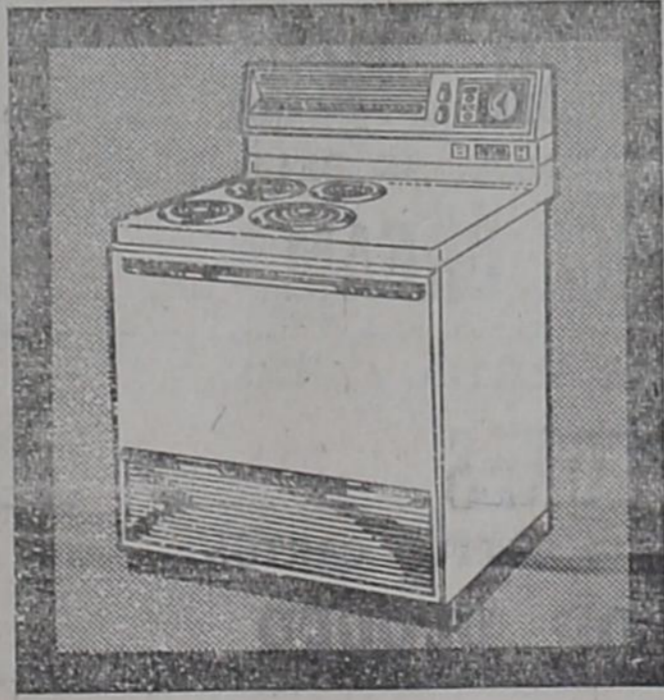
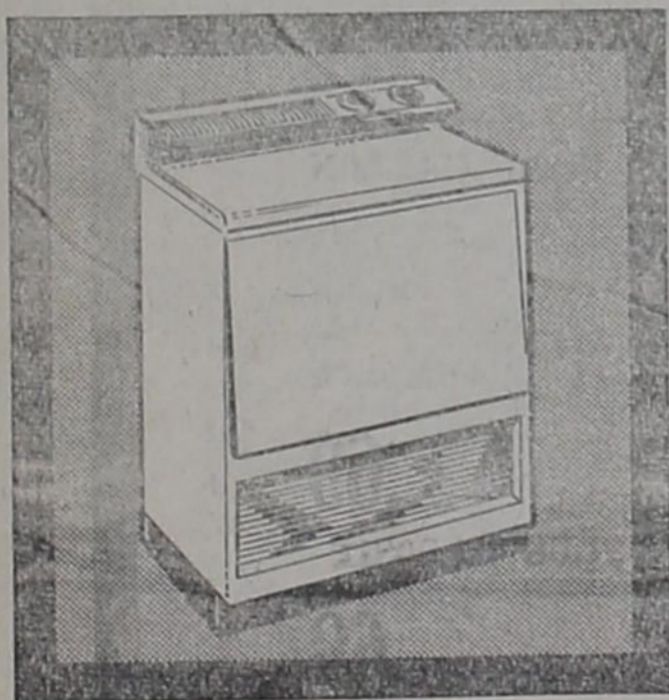
