TV VALUATION

October is Television Valuation Month. This project began in The Methodist Church and has spread to other denominations and inter-denominational groups. Some 900 local television stations along with the major television networks have agreed to cooperate in receiving evaluation of their new fall programs on a nationwide basis from persons who are concerned about what comes into their homes via the television screen. During this month television broadcasters everywhere are expecting to hear from their viewers. Perhaps there have been times when you wanted to react concerning a program you watched, but you didn't because you felt that no one would care about what you think. Now is the time to write and express your opinions to either local or national broadcasters.

The following is an excerpt from a guide to critical television viewing: "Does television really affect you? Unless you are an unusual viewer, it has definitely altered the way you see the world in which you live, often picturing life as being far more simple and less complicated than it really is. It can also present accurate pictures, getting you deeply involved in events that would otherwise be quite remote. TV can affect you either positively or negatively.

"If you view certain TV programs uncritically, you may come to believe that the world is really like the images you see on the screen—that many of your problems can be solved by the application of violence or the sexual exploitation of someone else, and that true happiness or success can be achieved by purchasing the products advertised. In this sense, TV can make it more difficult for you to live effectively in today's world.

"If you would like to determine for yourself how TV will influence your own life, be ready to ask yourself a number of questions as you view each program. Did it really offer the best solution to the problem presented? Did this program contribute to my knowledge and understanding of the world? Did this program help me relax—was it really recreation for me?

"If you want a few harder questions, try these: How have my values been changed by watching TV? Am I more tolerant of 'inferior values'? Because so many people 'die' in TV dramas, does this affect my feelings about the value of human life? Is it as easy for me to think of other people as 'children of God' as it used to be? Answering such questions will lead to an awareness which is basic to the achievement of a new level of involvement with television."

If you wish to let your voice be heard concerning the television menu, then write your local station using one card to comment on each program. Be as helpful as possible in your criticism whether positive or negative and be sure to identify yourself by giving your name and address. It is usually best to write

to the local stations even if you are commenting about a network

show. However, if you want to write to the networks, their addresses are: ABC Television (1330 Avenue of the Americas, New York, N.Y., 10019), CBS (51 West 52nd St., New York, N. Y. 10029), NBC (30 Rockefeller Plaza, New York, N. Y. 10020). View the new fall schedule critically, and let someone know what you think. Your responses are important!

The Ropes Eagles came out on top Friday night when they met New Home on the Leopards home field. Final score was 42-0. This was the Eagles second win for the season, but the first in District 2-B play.

Scoring in all but the third quarter, the Eagles won with a break-away offense and a defense which limited the hosts to only 41 forward steps during the evening.

Halfback Russell Arp opened it up with a three-yard drive, then quarterback Ted Lowrie tallied the two extra. David Bradshaw scored from the 11 late in the first round.

Fullback Rosario Lara ran for a two-yard TD and Lowrie passed for

the two extra to Ricky Braden. Lowrie passed 31 yards to Braden for another score shortly before the end of the half, and then added the two points himself.

Then things popped wide open in the final round when number two signal-caller Mike Flowers ran 27 yards for a score, and later half-back Waymon Morgan broke for an 85-yard scoring run.

Seemed to us the Eagles suffered more penalties during this game than any this season.

The Eagles will meet the Cooper Pirates this Friday evening at 7:30 on the home gridiron for this year's Homecoming game.
