Basic Clothing Construction Course To Be Offered

There's to be an adult Clothing Construction Course given by Mrs. Bell at the Ropes High School Home-making Department June 5-9 from 8:30 a.m. to 11 a.m.

The course is designed for the beginning adult seamstress who feels she needs to learn new techniques of clothing construction. Some of the problems that will be covered are: proper cutting, set-in sleeves, zippers, collars, waistbands, hems and pressing. This adult instruction is given in connection with the summer homemaking program.

Enrollment will be Monday, June 5, at 8:30 at the home-making department. Those interested should bring a SIMPLE dress pattern, or if a beginner, a straight-lined skirt pattern of their choice. Also scissors, pins, tape measure, pencil and paper will be needed Monday.

High school girls enrolled in the summer program will be on hand to baby-sit if those participating in the course need to bring small children.

All women in the community are invited to take the course.

He paints a rather sordid picture of the poor in Mississippi, both black and white telling us that farm labor goes at \$3 a day, service station workers \$25 a week, and those who look after the millions of chickens produced there drawing \$35 a week. However, on this last, there is a catch, for the chicken producers will not hire one man, but a family with at least six children, as it takes at least 3 or 4 persons to care for the chickens, and maybe more, if and when the chickens are sick.

Rev. Dean pointed out that groceries are as high, and many times higher, than they are here, and the Negroes and Whites go barefooted winter and summer. The houses are poorly built and cracks in the walls and floor you could throw a cat through.

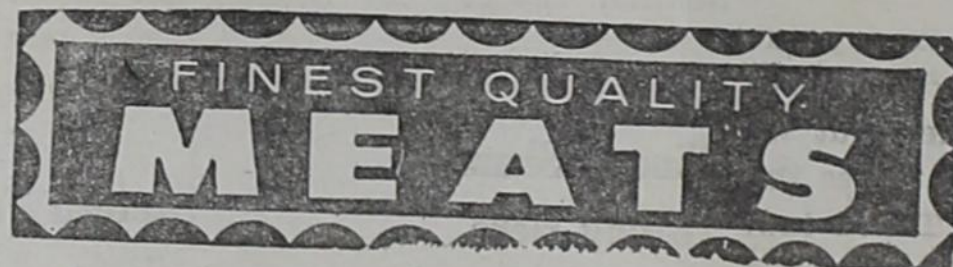

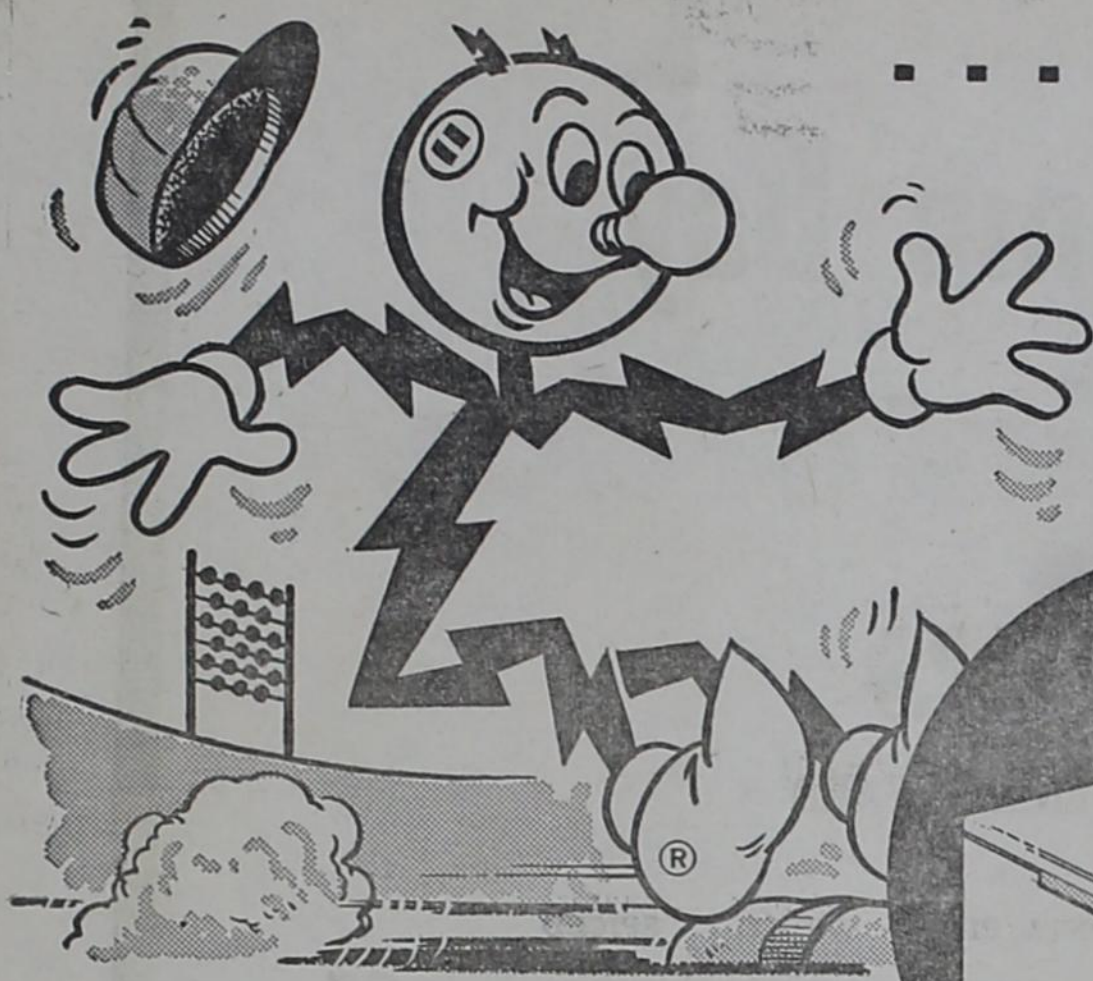
