Facts About Your City Government**2 New Aldermen Are Elected Tues.**

On Tuesday of this week in the municipal election, one of the largest votes polled in the history of the city was recorded when 53 voters went to the polls and voted for folks of their choice.

There was only one name on the ballot, Troy Morris, for mayor. The places for the election of aldermen were blank, and in this race T. J. Redman, Jr., received 16 votes, while Joe Schwartz received twenty.

In the mayor's race, the write-in, which had developed by noon, gave Charles Shannon 20 votes and Troy Morris 30 votes.

Tyree Martin, a retiring alderman not seeking election, received 10 votes. Tyree explained he believed the heavy turnout was due to the fact there was dissatisfaction with the manner in which the city government was being run.

While the folks of the city have seemingly taken little interest in the city, the turnout of voters indicates a healthy condition and makes us believe the folks are becoming more interested in the city.

While not generally realized, the city business is a little complicated and it would be a good thing if every citizen could serve for two years on the city council.

Wind, Snow And Rain

To us this is a new way to predict the weather, so we are watching this date and hoping Grover is wrong.

Returns Home

Mrs. D. E. Strickland, who has been visiting in the home of her daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Whittle, at Hobbs, N. M., returned to her home in Ropes Sunday.

In the first place it is a job without pay—the job of mayor takes from one to three days of time a week to look after the affairs that are constantly arising. The water system, which is the main source of income, is a constant source of worry, and throughout the years has hardly broken even—on the revenue bonds, each month, \$230 has to be paid out of the take from the system—out of the taxes some \$2,000 must be paid each year, which leaves but a shoestring to operate on.

During the past two years the city has had to add a well which cost approximately \$3500, and we still do not have an adequate water supply. And, as for the economy being practiced, Bob Whitlock, who is water superintendent, and his wife, who is bookkeeper and secretary, draws the sum of \$175 per month. The upkeep of the system requires from three to four days a week, and sometimes 7 days and nights a week, to keep it going. During the past two years the city has paid approximately \$2400 on the most recent well and equipment; during that time, also, mercury vapor lamps have been installed on the main street and up and down the highway. Too, the city has bought and paid

for a pickup truck to be used in looking after the water system. During the past two years the city has paid approximately \$6500 on the interest and sinking fund—the total now owed on the tax bonds is less than \$21,000. During the past three years the city has finished paying for a \$3500 water works extension, paid off the mortgage on the fire truck, which in the beginning was over \$5000. The fire truck, the city hall and the land on which it stands is now free of indebtedness. During the past three years the city has taken one dollar from the tax fund and paid 50c on the bonds—this coming year this will have to be reversed and the city will take 50c and will place \$1 in the bond fund. The constant growth of the city has called for water line extension and installation of additional fire plugs—during the past three years the city has spent better than \$1500 for these extensions—all of this has not been paid. The water rates in Ropes have been held at the same level as when the system was installed. Now Ropes has the cheapest water rates of any city on the South Plains. However, from the present outlook the water rates are going have to be raised. The minimum rate is \$2 for the first three thousand gallons—to meet the rising cost there is a likelihood that this minimum will have to be raised to \$2.50.

Dan and Don Day, identical twins, farm four sections of irrigated land—as well as overseeing nine sections of ranch land, 25 miles northwest of Brownfield. 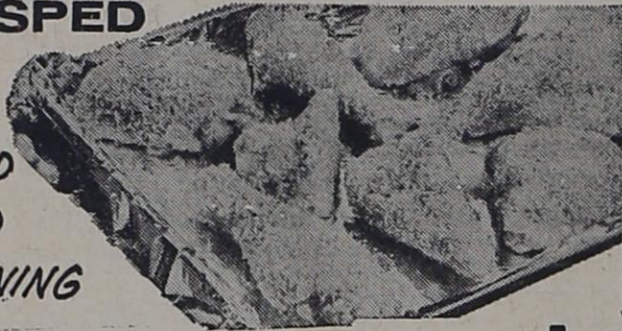
