A FINE FARM.

J. Mack Smith's K. D. Ranch a Scene of Activity---What is Being Done.

Cotton Gin and Grist Mill.

Where only a few short months ago was a sun-scorched and sand-driven plain, we are shown to-day what the hands of man and an artesian well can accomplish. It is realy wonderful how rapidly changes are made in the Artesia country. This is illustrated at the K D Ranch. Plows are running in all directions and the gushing torrents are spread-ing across the brown furrows and ing across the brown furrows and softening the heds wherein will soon lie hundreds of bushels of seeds. Two hundred acres are ready for seeding and Mr. Smith says the whole 320 will be put in this year. The 1904 crop will be a varied one. One hundred bushels of fine, white corn from the Stone Ranch near Roswell has arrived and is being put in the ground, and this to be follow ed by Kaffir corn, alfalfa, blackeyed peas, suga. beets. Mangel Werzel ampkins, watermelons, cantaloupes okra, blue grass and a number of other things known to thrive in the valley including cotton.

Mr. Smith this week received one Mr. Smith this week received one hundred bushels of select cotton seed from Oklahoma and will, start to planting next week. The fact was proven at Carlsbad last year that the fleecy staple grows to fection in the Pecos Valley. U irrigation the stalk grows to unusual irrigation the state grows to unusual size and the quantity and quality of the cotton is much more than was anticipated. Sixteen bales were gin-ned off eight acres near Carlsbad and as there is no danger of the boll wee-vil or boll worm in this arid climate the growing of cotton is gaining in favor. Six hundred pounds of cane the growing of cotton is guining in favor. Six hundred pounds of cane seed will be planted this year so as to provide good forage while the al-falfa is maturing.

Mr. Smith informs the Advocate that he will immediately arrange for the creetion and equipment of a cotton gin and corn mill at the ranch, the power for which will be supplied by the big artesian well, as supplied by the big artesian well, as it empties its 2000 gallons of water per minute upon a turbine wheel. The cotton will be ginned there and corn ground and Kaffr and cane chopped for the stock. Custom grinding will probably be done Messrs. Hooper, Rawls, Roberson and Noell are cultivating land on the K D ranch and it is astonishing how rapidly this vast area of grass is how rapidly this vast area of grass is how rapidly this vast area of grass is being converted into a busy plantation. The ten-acre apple orchard planted a few months ago is doing splendidly.





Directors by the Score

It is not easy for the American rall-road man to conceive of the conditions existing in the British Islands. The English rallway systems total only 22,000 miles. Yet this comparatively small mileage is the property of 230 companies, more than half of which have their separate administration and executive. The others are "leased and worked lines." Allotting an average of dight directors apiece to each of the 125 independent commanies, the English railways support 1,000 directors, whose fees can hardly be less than \$1,250 a year each.

The railroads of India cover about

The railroads of India cover about \$6,000 miles. Yet Thomas Robertson, the expert who recently reported to the British government on Indian railway Administration, says that the task of aupervising the lines of that vast sountry might safely be intrusted to a board of three qualified men, assisted by a secretary, a chief inspector and a number of inspectors and auditors. Three experts with a small staff are considered by Mr. Robinson capable of performing duties of about the same character as those for which in England are employed 1,000 amateur directors with their secretaries and assistant secretaries, accountants, auditors, clerks, messengers, etc.

And though the individual roads in these systems have in some cases their separate boards, these usually consist of practically the same men. Many important lines are also "leased and worked." Against the 230 systems of 22,000 miles—less than 100 miles to a line—in England the Vanderbilt and Pennsylvania systems include to gether less than twenty component lines, or an average of more than 2,000 miles alline—in line. The longest single line in the United States, the Southern Pacific, has over 9,500 miles of track.
