## Nazarene Giving \$143 Per Capita For New Record

Per capita giving of \$142.37 set a denomination record in 1960 in the Church of the Nazarene. The increase was nearly \$7 per person over the preceding year.

Giving for all purposes climbed to a record \$45,350,000, an increase of \$3,170,000. The total was \$42,180,000 in 1959.

The annual statistical report released by Dr. S. T. Ludwig, Kansas City, general secretary, showed that membership increased to 318,588. This was a net gain of 7,289 persons.

The denomination started one new church a week or a net gain of 45 during the year and a total of 4,741 churches on Jan. 1, 1961.

Gains in membership also were recorded for 1960 by the Sunday school, Foreign Missionary society and the Young People's society.

American Samoa and Denmark were among world areas in which new Nazarene work started in 1960. At year-end, the denomination had more than 450 full-time missionaries in 42 world areas.

Special offerings for world missions at Thanksgiving and Easter each exceeded \$1,000,000.

Commenting on the report, Dr. Ludwig said: "Total giving for all purposes during 1960 exceeded anything we have done as a denomination. The \$142.37 per capita figure also was a church record."

"The membership gain of 2.34 per cent, while not quite up to 1959, was better than we had expected in view of our quadrennial world assembly held last June in Kansas City."

## Jehovah's Witnesses To Meet In Levelland

Jehovah's Witnesses of this area will hold their semi-annual circuit assembly in Levelland, Texas, February 17-19.

Alfred Ferguson, presiding minister of the Levelland Congregation said, "Texas Circuit No. 9's assembly will be built around the theme, 'Be Taught of Jehovah'."

"We are looking forward to this assembly with great anticipation," Ferguson said. "The directive agency, Watchtower Bible and Tract Society, is revamping all of the present 204 circuits in the United States to make room for 54 new circuits, with 16 to 18 congregations to the circuit."

Recently, 308 circuit and district overseers from the United States and Canada completed a 16-day intensified schooling course at the world headquarters of Jehovah's Witnesses in Brooklyn, to equip them to be better teachers and overseers in putting the new program into operation.

Texas' problem of how to raise more taxes is of one aued by the Legislatures refusal to face facts that a new, broader based tax is a necessity.

Legislators realize the only answer to solve the State's Money problem is going to be a broad based tax—the most common being state income tax, sales tax or payroll tax.

The problem is that they have not found a way to break the bearer of Texas tradition which has always sought taxes through business, Natural resources and manufacturing. In addition, because so many Legislatures ran on platforms condemning any kind of general sales tax for

A recent controversy that began when a Roman Catholic priest in New Jersey told his parishioners to tithe was just a renewal of a discussion that has been going on since pre-Christian times.

Tithing — interpreted today as the giving of 10 per cent of one's income to the church — is mentioned more frequently in the Old Testament than in the New, but nowhere in the New Testament is there any opposition to it.

There is evidence that the most ancient peoples offered material possessions in the worship of their deities. Some Bible students regard the offerings of Cain and Abel as tithes. And Rabbinical codes of tithing were set forth in the Old Testament.

In a National Council of Churches discussion of what now is called "stewardship," Luther P. Powell, pastor of Lakeside Presbyterian Church in Storm Lake, Iowa and a dedicated student of the history of religious philanthropy, said that Jesus spoke of tithes only twice and there was little evidence that tithing was recommended for Christians in the first century of the Christian church.

By the 3rd century, A. D., however, there are indications that tithing had been established as a standard of Christian giving. It was being strongly advocated by the 4th century.

Through the centuries, tithing came to be a standard fund-raising method for the Christian church. In some cases, it was mandatory, under either church or government law.

Many abuses grew from the compulsory tithe an d some unscrupulous person gained material reward at the expense of the contributors and the church.

Powell said that the Reformation, in which the Protestant church was established, was to a large extent a culmination of protests against financial abuses of the churches. Soon after the reformation, he re-

ported, a growing number of per- the idea of receiving material reward  
English dairy maids took one-tenth of the milk they drew from cows to church and left it by the altar. In Exeter, England, dairymen took their tithe milk to church and poured it on the floor in front of the altar if no one was there to receive it. Farmers bound tithe sheaves of grain badly so they would fall apart before they could be collected.

In some cases, protestors resorted to such violence that clergymen stopped collecting tithes. Quite a few objectors landed in prison.

The tithing controversy accompanied the first settlers to America, where debate raged between those who favored compulsory tithing and those who insisted it should be voluntary.

Generally, today, tithing is voluntary, except in the church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints (Mormons) and the Seventh Day Adventist denominations, neither of which classifies itself as Protestant. Both require all members to tithe to remain in good standing.

**Churches Pushing Tithes**  
Tithing has played an important part in the American stewardship movement since 1885 and churches today are encouraging it as never before. Seventeen of the largest Protestant denominations have vigorous tithing programs. Among them are both the Southern and American Baptists, the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., the Protestant Episcopal Church, the Methodist Church and the United Church of Christ, representing the majority of American protestantism.

The dispute in New Jersey centered on the compulsory aspect of the tithe as requested by the Rev. John P. Weigand, pastor of St. Joseph of the Palisades Church in West New York. Cries of "totalitarianism" were raised, but higher church authorities assured Catholics that tithes still were voluntary.

The philosophy behind tithing has changed, generally, in most denominations. At the turn of the 20th century, most persons tithed with

live now is subordinated, he said, to a program of "discipleship" expressing increased support for the work of the church.

Among tithers there still is one major problem, however. There is no agreement on whether the tenth contributed should be figured on the basis of gross income or take-home pay after taxes. Most churches leave this question up to the tither to answer for himself.

NEWS FROM DUN & BRADSTREET, INC.

James H. Burnaw, manager of the Amarillo office of Dun & Bradstreet, Inc., announced that requests for financial statements were mailed to 441 businesses in Hockley county. These figures, obtained from physical count of the names listed in the Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book for January, 1961, reflect 2.5% increase when compared with the 430 concerns listed one year ago.

According to Mr. Burnaw, each January business concerns in all parts of the United States are asked by Dun & Bradstreet for copies of their financial statements. This year requests are being sent to approximately three million business concerns—to the corner grocery store worth a few thousand dollars as well as to businesses worth million.

The Dun & Bradstreet Reference Book, published bi-monthly, lists manufacturers, wholesalers, and retailers as well as certain service businesses who seek or grant commercial credit, but does not include service and professional businesses such as beauty and barber shops, security dealers, and real estate brokers. Therefore, the figures for total businesses in the United States would be somewhat higher than the three million quoted above.

The changes occurring in Hockley county are about the same as in the rest of the country where the rate of change is about every five seconds.

Back of each listing of a business in the Reference Book is a Dun & Bradstreet credit report. The report includes a history of the business, a description of what the business does, a record of how the business pays its bills, and a financial section which usually includes the latest financial

in this state has been built to mean "the worst thing that can happen." so many years, the word "sales tax" A general sales tax for years has come to mean treason. This shighly emotional defination attached to sales tax, most legislators agree, is clouding the best tax judgment of our State in many instances.

How many people in this district are against a sales tax more than an income tax? How many people are willing to have payroll deluctions for State taxes instead of a sales tax?

These are questions every Legislator wonders about. Personally I hope more people from my district write me to help me understand some of these questions better. Other Senators and Representatives have the same wish.

The biggest question we face in the 57th Legislature is where to find additional money to pay the State deficit, and raise another \$100 million a year in new tax revenue.

The tax front of this Legislature has not yet been tested. None of us know what the outcome of our tax deliberations will be at present.

But, one thing is sure: The information and opinions we get from our respective districts will help us do the right thing for all Texans.
