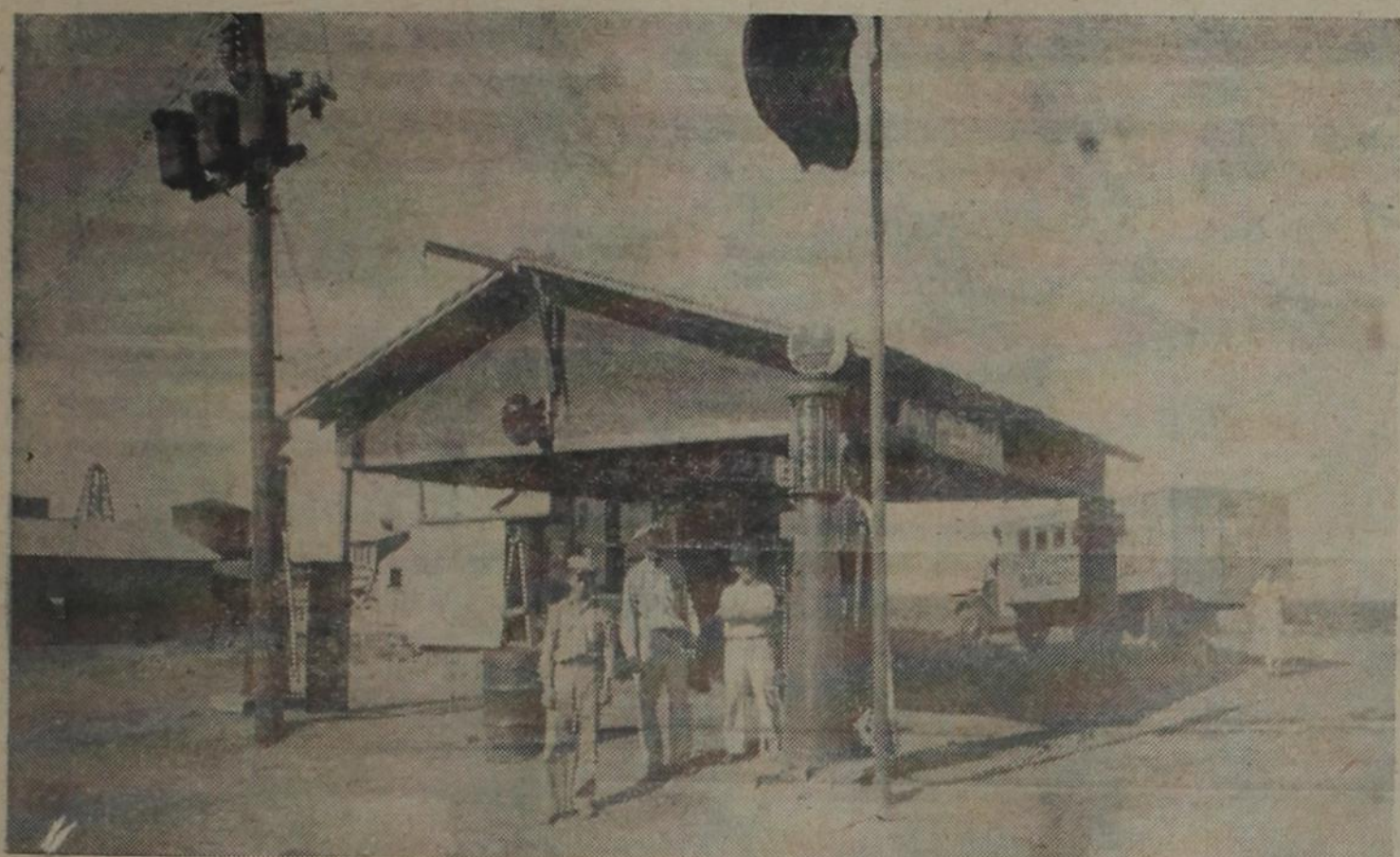

Russells Finish 25 Years As Phillips '66' Dealers

At a dinner held in Melody Drive-In in Brownfield, Mr. and Mrs. Edward Russell were the honor guests of the Phillips 66 Company, and were awarded a 25-year plaque, a watch each, and commended for their service to the company for the past quarter of a century.

The presentation was made by the Assistant Division Manager, J. A. Gilmer, of Levelland. Others in attendance were Jack Cleveland of Brownfield, W. C. Wilmoth of Plains, Raymond Edes of Big Spring, and John Hansard, District Representative of Brownfield.

Mrs. Russell is the first lady in the history of the company to receive a watch; the first to have 25 years of service with the company. Mr. and Mrs. Russell first established their service station here in 1933, locating it just north of where the Raspberry Station now stands. A year later they moved across the street to their present location where they started handling Phillips 66 products.

At that time there was little need for a wholesale station as only about one farmer out of twenty-five had a tractor, and they operated as a retail station up until 1945 when they added the wholesale business.

However, Ed with his parents moved to Ropes in 1922, settling on the Russell place about three or four miles west of Ropes on the pavement, and which is still owned by his mother.

"When we moved to Ropes," Ed said, "there was a lumber yard, a garage and service station in an old tin building located near where the Pierce Farm Supply now stands, a general merchandise store on the spot where

Candidate Rally Attended By Hundreds of People

Despite the fact that storm clouds floated over the heavens; despite the fact that thunder roared and lightning flashed, a huge crowd was in attendance at the Ropes political rally Saturday night.

It was a time the candidates tried to sell themselves to the voters.

The feature speaker of the evening was Senator Henry Gonzales, who is making the race for governor. Bill Boedeker, county Democratic chairman from Levelland, introduced O. V. Fuller, superintendent of Ropes schools, who in turn introduced the Senator.

In a speech which lasted for more than forty minutes, Gonzales outlined his platform, explaining that he was the only real Democrat seeking the office of Governor. He told of having a plan for veterans and a plan for old age assistance that

would give the old folks a living pension instead of one on which they could barely exist.

He said he was glad to come to Ropes, and that whether elected or not would return to meet the folks again.

In the rally were people from as far as Iamesa and even Aspermont as well as surrounding towns.

Following his speech Bill Boedeker took over the county and precinct candidates. It started to rain and the public address system had to be removed from the truck on which the candidates were to speak, and the program was continued from the porch of the Plainsman office.

Each presented his qualifications and asked for the support of the voters of this precinct.

While Dick Cooke was speaking lightning struck

the electric wires overhead and for a moment he was speechless, then he continued.

Mrs. Ruby Beebe was the first to speak. Running without an opponent, she was as fresh as a dew-kissed rose and as happy as a new bride.

In the race for county judge Frank Lawless presented his claims first, and was followed by the present incumbent, Paul Williams. Louis Owens spoke last on this list.

Then the Martin boys orchestra played a lively tune, which also was accompanied by thunder and lightning.

For a moment it seemed the cloud backed off. Then it moved over to the southwest and a brisk shower fell, but the crowd remained.

Davis Pounds gave his qualifications for County School Superintendent, and was followed by Chester Borders.

At this point there was more music, but as clouds were again threatening and lightning came in almost perpetual flashes, the music was dispensed with so as to give the candidates a chance to speak before the storm broke up the meeting.

Mrs. Grace Clingan spoke in regard to her office for County Clerk, and was followed by Raymond Dennis, who gave his qualifications.

The last of the county candidates to speak were Dick Cooke and Mary Meek, making the race for County Treasurer.

Then came the candidates for Justice of the Peace of Precinct One. Jim Gotcher, because of the impending storm, had been called home and Mrs. Minnie Fewell was first to speak, with M. L. Roberts finishing the speaking.

While much of the program which had been arranged had to be omitted on account of the threatening weather, the crowd apparently enjoyed that part that was given them.

The Plainsman wants to extend sincere thanks to the Martin boys and their orchestra for the invaluable assistance given, not only with the music, but the setting up of the public address system and other things which they did to make the rally a success.

Paul reported to us that the bootlegger who was caught near Ropes this past week by Constable Jack Ogle was fined \$750.00 and given 30 days in jail.

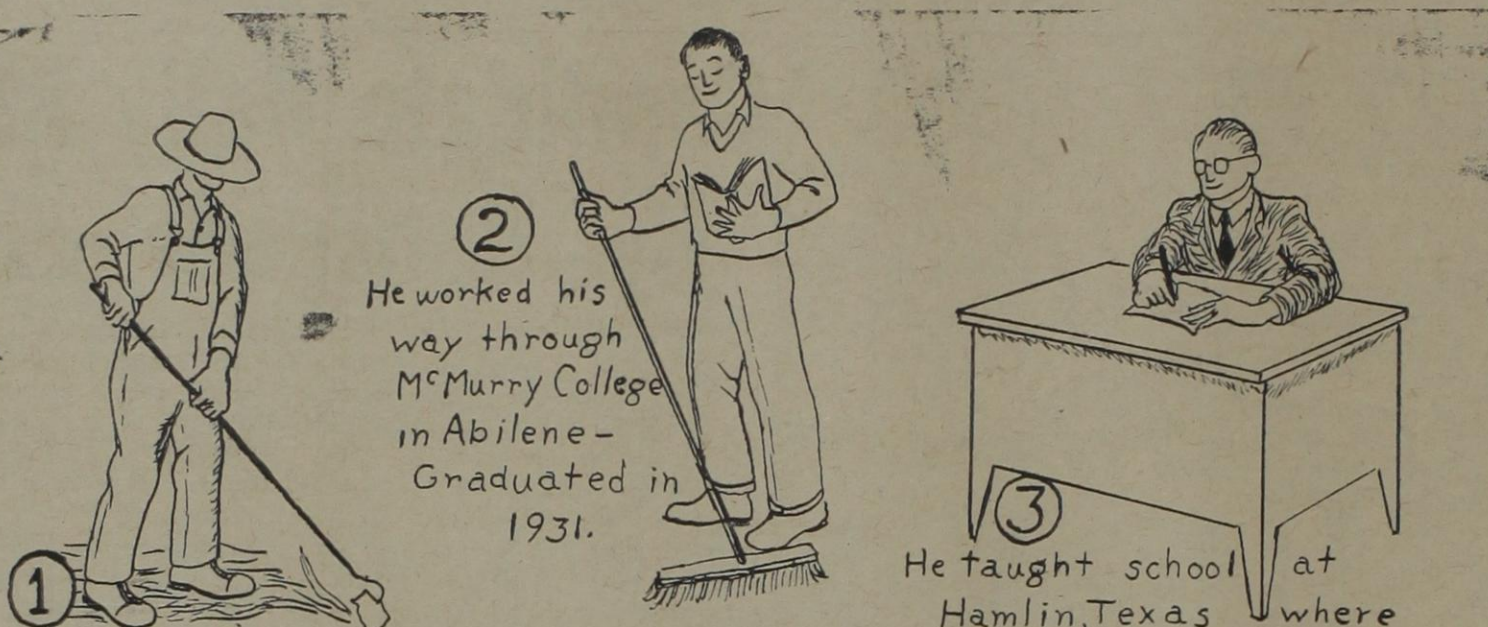

The old brick was located which has just been torn down. J. R. and Bernice Evans ran this business, C. F. Burrus Blacksmith Shop, the building still standing east of Higginbotham-Bartlett; a cafe, located on the lots now occupied by the Phillips 66 Station operated by Howard Bradshaw. The cafe was owned by Mrs. Whitehorn, who later built a hotel on the lots.

There was also a wooden school house and about five residences and a gin, which was not completed until the next year.

There were four houses between our farm and Lev-

elland, the house where T. J. Redman, Sr., now lives, and was occupied by Mr. Tharp; Whaley and Jones Ranch house and another ranch house whose name I do not recall. Our first visit to Levelland there was a wooden courthouse, and the square was planted in blackeye peas.

"I remember that in 1923 there was a fair held in Brownfield, and the thing that impressed me most was cushaw with a long neck which curled around and had attached itself to the bowl, and it had a sign over it which read, "Come to Terry County Where Both Ends Meet". (A cushaw is a crooked-neck squash).

"At that time," said Ed, Meadow was twice as large as Ropes.

"Along in those early days a rodeo was held north of Ropes, and Bill Carter broke a leg while riding a calf, and John Cowan took first place for riding.

"Folks came to Ropes from Claene, Mallet Ranch, Charley Lyon Ranch, and Highly Boyd Ranch. Most of the country was ranch land, and I don't think there were but three or four farms between Ropes and Levelland — the place now owned by M. M. Collins was in cultivation at that time.

"In the summer, after the work was caught up on the farm, I would come to Ropes and work on the section. On the ride home in the afternoon I would average killing from three to four rattlesnakes."

Mr. and Mrs. Russell were married on July 10, 1926. They came to Ropes where Ed was employed on the railroad, the gins and other work until 1927 when they moved to California, where their first child, Vera Lee, now Mrs. Weldon Tudor, was born. After a year in that state they came back to Texas locating in Waco, where their son, Charles, was born. They remained in that city for three years, then moved back to Ropes, where Jean, now Mrs. Loy Hamby, was born. They have since lived in Ropes.

Ed served on the Ropes school board for a period of eight or ten years, and both he and Mrs. Russell have been active in civic work from the time they located here up until the present time.

Ed has, as his hobby, a collection of scenic postcards and has cards from all over the world. Mrs. Russell has, as her hobbies, a collection of picture plates, salt and pepper shakers and arrow heads, and has a wonderful collection of all three.
