Skeleton Unearthed Over 600 Years Old

Recently while searching for arrow heads, and other Indian relics, in western Crosby county, J. C. Whitfield and son, Stephen Whitfield of Lubbock, unearthed a skeleton of an Indian estimated to be more than 600 years old.

Along with the skeleton were arrow heads, teeth and trinkets which are said to have come from New Mexico.

The location of the grave was in the sand hills, and the first indication of a burial ground was a bone on the surface of the earth—a human thigh bone, they guessed. The skull was found and several other parts of the skeleton. They had to be handled with care as they were so old that they would crumble to dust.

The sun was high in the heavens and the hunting party was in pursuit of tre buffalo, chasing him across a sandy waste—chasing him for the meat he could furnish the hungry tribe. Dust raised by the hooves of the fleeing animals was thrown back into their face with a brisk west wind, while above the sun, a copper disc in a sky of brass, beat down with suffocating heat.

As Red Arrow rode he knew it was nearing the time when he would see the Great Spirit—forty summers and forty winters had come and gone since first his mother carried him on her back. For a fleeting moment his mind turned backward and he could see her squatted by the fire.

The skeleton lay in the grave, from which the wind had removed most of the covering, with arms across chest and knees drawn up. As they touched it, a part of it crumbled into dust—it became a part of the sand in which it rested—of dust thou art to dust returneth—very carefully they picked the remains from the grave and brought them home.

Red Arrow climbed wearily from his horse—he hunkered down to rest. Off to his left was the shimmering waters of a lake, and the trees waved their branches in the wind. "Forty times I've come here," he thought, "but as the sun trails near the west, so my life nears the sunset." Rubbing his hands over his body, they stopped at scars. How well he remembered. KENNEDY PRESIDENT ELECT DENNIS NEW COUNTY CLERK

In what was not a total surprise, or unexpected, Jack Kennedy, in Tuesday's election, became the president-elect of the United States, and will take over the White House on January 1st.

One of the surprises of the election was the fact that Kennedy carried California, Nixon's home state and, of course, his defeat came about by what was formerly Republican communities going Democratic—the election demonstrated one thing, the Catholics can vote as a bloc—predominantly Republican counties, whose citizens were Catholics, swung to the Democratic column. However, it became apparent this was happening in the last two weeks of the campaign—the Protestant voters did not vote as a bloc.

The religious question was not brought into the campaign by Nixon, but by Kennedy who capitalized on it.

Hockley County went Democratic, although the largest Republican vote in its history was cast, with Kennedy carrying the county by 1,056, with one box complete at 10 a.m. Wednesday.

In the only county race, Raymond Dennis was elected county clerk to fill the unexpired term of Mrs. Grace Clingan.

To give you an idea about the voters, in 1958 378 people cast ballots in the Ropes box, and in the county 4498.

and only one tooth was missing from the jaws.

Red Arrow knew he was laying flat in the sand—he didn't remember laying down. Others were gathered around—he could not see them, but he could hear them talking. Then his vision cleared—a vast hunting ground stretched out before him. In the waving grass he could see buffalo, by the hundreds, grazing—the air was sweet and cool and, surprised, he saw his mother painting pottery and his father walking between the tepees.

From all indications, the experts told the Whitfields, this man died from natural causes. J. C. said, "We found arrowheads and bits of pottery after high winds, but this is the first indication of an Indian burial ground. Now there is a desert waste of sand, but for Indians to camp there, there had to be water.

"Steve discovered the first bone. When he decided it was a bone from a human, he was a little reluctant to uncover it, but the wind had blown away most of the dirt."

Gathering Indian relics is a hobby of the Whitfields. J. C. stated, "I'm interested because I would like to know about a way of life that has sunk into oblivion, and a people who are well on the way to extinction."

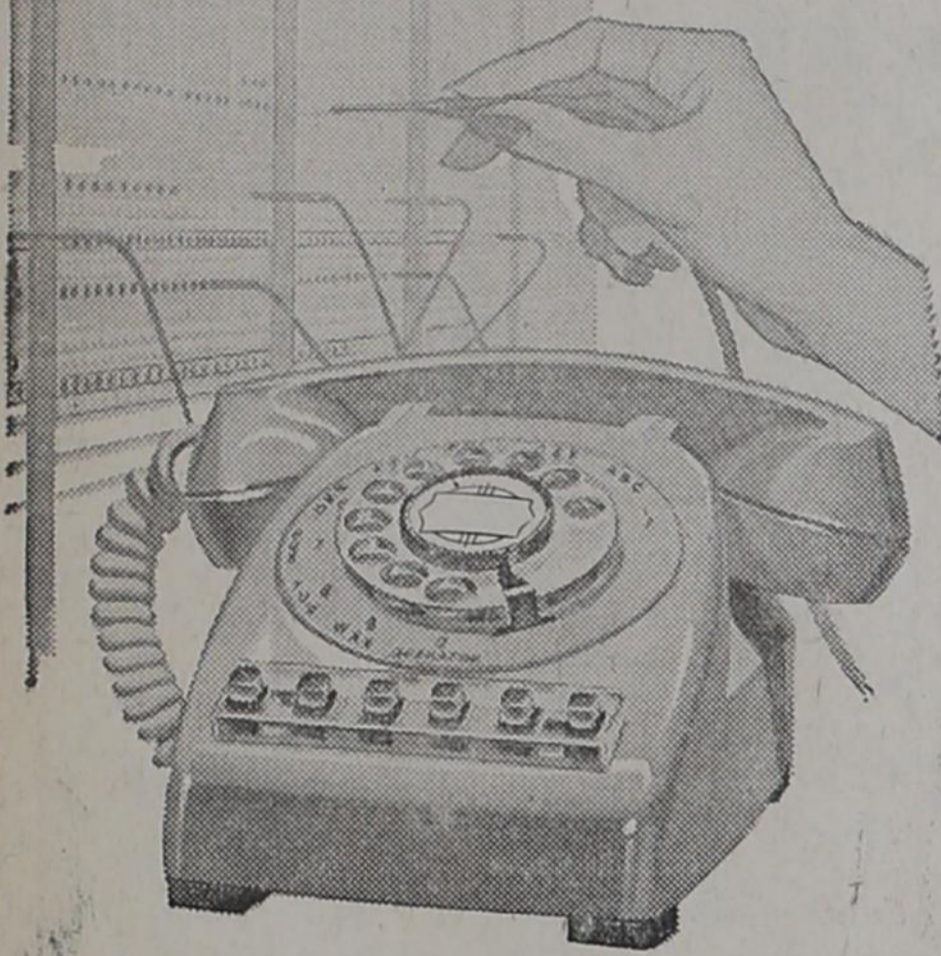
