In current thinking there is often found a strain which goes like unto this: "Men's goals are either foolish or selfish; therefore, why be involved with humanity!" Such thinking arises when one gets involved in something and then, halfway through some project, one begins to think that the project is foolish or selfish. Inherent in such thinking is the idea that all of life is a disease with much suffering.

This is seen most often in churches. We plan big and great programs aimed at doing much good. Then, in the midst of the program we realize that they will never work. People are too evil. People are too lax to care about their lives in a depth level. And so, the program fails and dies out because it looks like the goals are too unreal or unattainable.

A modern day existentialist theologian, Rudolph Bultmann, answers such hopelessness as he writes of the Eternal Now. He points out that it is through the individual and through the process that we find life and God. We do not find God and life in results, in the finished product. Rather, we discover the power of the Lord active in the midst of our work. The power of the Lord is active in the individual we deal with, not in the mass crowds. Eternally before us is a Now and it is this Now that we are concerned with. In the Now we must discover God. In the Now we must find life. In the Now we must enjoy one another and find peace. In the Now we must be able to relax. In the Now we must overcome our anxiety.

This is a hard lesson for modern people to learn. We think that in the new things we will find life. If only we can purchase a color TV, then we will be living. If only we can take this or that trip, then we will be living. If only our son or daughter will marry this or that particular person, then we will be living. If only we can achieve this or that position, then we will settle down to what life is all about. This is wrong. Life is not discovered. God is not made known in the future. God is alive in the present, right here with us. God is not "just over the hill" in some new achievement. The Lord God lives in our midst, in the midst of the lowly neighbor, in the midst of the lowly task that is ours today. If we always seek God over the hill, we shall always miss Him.

Life is not tomorrow. But it is today. Life is not in some specific ownership or achievement; rather, life is to be found in the midst of the process it takes to live daily.

We miss life and what it is all about, we miss God and all His love for us when we forget the Eternal Now of our existence. Savour each moment and each task. With in the present is meaning.

Only 22 voters from Ropes cared enough to take time to cast their vote in Tuesday's ballot of the Amendment to raise the number of Senate members from 31 to 39. The vote did carry in the Ropes box, with 18 voting for, and four against.

Election Judge was S. B. Berry, and Clerks were Mrs. J. C. Pointer, Ms. Marshal Armstrong and Mrs. D. M. Tipp.

The big cities put this one over, with the bill being voted down by several thousand votes.

Results mean that no special session of the legislature will be required to draw new district lines for the Senate. The districts as drawn for 31 members, during the last legislative session will be in effect for the 1966 election; also at least seven present senators, if they seek office again, will be defeated because 13 districts were combined into six in the redistricting for 31 members.

This loss of senators will definitely hurt the smaller towns and the rural areas.
