

## A Short History Of Hockley County Facts

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### THE BIBLE

Very often when people enter into religious discussions, someone says, "I take the Bible literally." At first this seems simple enough, but such is not the case. There are at least two meanings of the idea.

First, some people say "I take the Bible literally" meaning that they take the Bible's words as being true without understanding the situation and history behind the passage. There is no attempt to gain the "sense" of the passage or the true facts behind the passage. If the Bible has the words, then they can be applied to today's needs without any concern for the biblical situation.

Secondly, some people say "I take the Bible literally" meaning that they take the Bible exactly as the author intended it to be taken. The words in and of themselves are not important, but it is the sense behind the words which is all important. Thus, the first step for these people is to understand the situation behind the text. Once they have understood what the ancient situation was, then and only then do they seek to understand how the Word of God shines through for the present day generation. For these people, often called Existentialists, the Bible contains the Word of God spoken to people of a certain existence, time, age. The Word of God remains the same, but the age, time, existence, situation, of men changes. Thus, these people seek to discover the Word of God first as it applied to a certain age and then as that same ancient Word speaks to this present age.

The best way to understand the difference between the two concepts is to look at a specific passage of Scripture. Look at Matthew 5:39. People of the first category say the situation behind Scripture need not be understood, but that each Scripture is exactly true as it stands. Thus, according to this Scripture only left-handed people may slap you on the right cheek and therefore you only need turn your other cheek to left-handed people. You see, if you are facing the person who is to slap you, a right handed person's palm will slap your left cheek. But the Scripture says, "whosoever shall smite thee on thy right cheek, turn to him the other also." You are struck on your right cheek first when being slapped by a left-handed person. The Scripture indicates that your right cheek is struck first, therefore, you need turn the other cheek only to left-handed people.

But the second view of Scripture, which is also very literal, goes for the meaning behind the words. And the meaning, of course, has to do with humility, suffering, forgiveness to ALL men.

Our Bible contains the Word of God and is therefore a Holy Book. Yet, the Word of God in the Bible is speaking to a particular situation and we must know the situation so as to understand how the Word becomes a Word to us moderns.

## City Clean Up Campaign

The City of Ropes is trying to plan and carry through a clean-up campaign. This will require the interest and cooperation of all citizens of the community.

To begin with, the alleys are being graded, and the City Park is being cleaned.

Each family is asked to clean their property and put the trash in piles. Then trucks will come by and you will assist them in loading your trash into the truck. If you are unable to help load your trash, it will be done for you, if you will say so. Let's get busy and help clean up our community.

Hockley County was created in 1876 from Bexar County. The county was named for George W. Hockley who distinguished himself in the Battle of San Jacinto. The first meeting of the Hockley County Commissioners Court was held March 2, 1921.

The first school in Hockley County was located near the present site of Ropesville. It was called the Primrose School and the District occupied almost the entire south half of the county.

The first churches were organized in 1921 at Leveland and Ropesville, with about thirty charter members in the two churches.

Hockley County is one of the top 20 oil producing counties in Texas. Oil was first discovered in 1937.

Three gasoline plants are located in Hockley County.

Hockley County has one of the most complete systems of paved rural roads to be found in the nation.

Average rainfall is 19.03 inches.

Hockley County was in grass prior to 1923. Cattlemen began to graze the area with cattle as open range about 1880. About 1890 they began to fence their range.

Some droughts occurred and the grass was depleted but stock numbers were reduced and the ranges recovered. Needless to say, there were dust storms.

About 1923 some of the ranchland was sold to settlers to be plowed up for cropland.

The drought years of 1933 and 1934 will never be forgotten. Wind erosion is still one of the district's number one hazards on both cropland and rangeland.

Realizing the need for a soil and water conservation program a group of farmers petitioned the State Soil Conservation Board for the creation of a soil conservation district in February, 1946. The District was organized on October 15, 1946.

## NEW EYES FOR NEEDY

The FHA Chapter of Ropes High School is promoting "New Eyes for the Needy" It is a non-profit, non-sectarian volunteer organization whose sole purpose is to help provide better vision for the poor the world over.

New Eyes is endorsed by the National Society for the Prevention of Blindness, the Fessex County Medical Society (N.J.), and the American Academy of Ophthalmology and Otolaryngology.

New Eyes for the Needy never asks for money. Revenue and results are derived from the refining or redistributing of items useless to the donor. It solicits: metal frames in any condition, unbroken plastic frames with or without lenses, sunglasses, artificial eyes, cataract lenses, soft cases, hearing aids and precious metal scrap such as old watches, broken or out-dated jewelry (including costume), dentures with bits of gold, damaged silver, etc. Unfortunately, we cannot use loose lenses or hard cases.

Thanks to thoughtful individuals and organizations, New Eyes receives thousands of packages of the above materials every year. Processing is carefully done by volunteers working the year

round. Metal framed glasses and metal scrap are sold to a refinery and the redeemed cash used to purchase new prescription glasses for the indigent in the U. S.

Re-usable plastic framed glasses are tested, classified, and sent abroad to medical missions and welfare agencies for re-distribution.

Over 400,000 people have been helped by New Eyes. Funds for the purchase of new prescription glasses and artificial eyes have been established in 90 hospitals and agencies in 28 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and Haiti. Quotas of new glasses and eyes are guaranteed in 54 agencies in 26 states and the District of Columbia. By various arrangements New Eyes pays for glasses in 47 states for screened patients to whom no other private or public funds are available.

Upon specific requests, New Eyes ships re-usable glasses to such areas as the Philippines, Indonesia, Arabia, Labrador, Oman, India, Africa and South America.

Value of the 1964-65 Texas cotton crop was about \$650 million, representing a \$150 million drop from the preceding year, University of Texas Cotton Economic Research reports. Texas ginned 4,053,030 bales for the 1964-65 season by January 16, 1965. The total was about 323,000 bales below the figure at the same date in the 1963-64 season. The decrease was attributed to three factors: a smaller crop, a price decrease for lint and cottonseed, and a lower state average for grade and staple lengths.
