### Outsiders at Thanksgiving

Writing to the church at Corinth, Paul has this interesting word to say about thanksgiving to God: "If you give thanks with the spirit, how can any one in the position of an outsider say the 'Amen' to your thanksgiving when he does not know what you are saying? For you may give thanks well enough, but the other man is not edified." (I Corinthians 14:16-17) Here Paul has been expressing his conviction to the Corinthian Christians that worship which is conducted entirely in the spiritual realm is meaningless to the non-Christian, to the outsider. He is especially distressed over the practice of speaking in spiritual tongues which are nonsense to those who do not possess the gift of speaking in tongues. He concludes his argument by saying: "I would rather speak five words with my mind, in order to instruct others, than ten thousand words in a tongue." (I Corinthians 14:19)

Paul's criticism of the early Church's thanksgiving is still relevant to the Church today. We are too often guilty of celebrating our thanksgiving to God in such a way that it is absolutely meaningless to the outsider. We gather together to ask the Lord's blessing and to render our thanks to Almighty God. We do so by singing hymns, by enumerating our many blessings, and by attributing our good fortunes to God in prayer and in sermon. When the benediction has been pronounced, we might well ask the question: What have we done or said that might be of real meaning to our nation on this day of national celebration? Have we communicated to the world outside our sanctuaries the prophetic word of genuine Christian thanksgiving? Or have we simply reinforced the popular notion that thanksgiving is really a time of national self-congratulation for the abundance we have produced and the freedoms we have won?

For Paul the prophetic Word of God is the direct opposite of speaking in tongues. While one who speaks in tongues is actually "speaking into the air" (I Corinthians 14:9), one who prophesies is speaking the will of God directly to a real human situation. "If all prophesy, and an unbeliever enters, he is convicted by all, he is called to account by all." (I Corinthians 14:24) At Thanksgiving time, the Church is given a unique opportunity to call our nation to account by proclaiming again God's prophetic Word—which is something more than counting our many blessings before we fall asleep!

Our Biblical heritage from the prophets who spoke to Israel has entrusted us with the message that the nation which understands itself to be guided or chosen by God is a nation called and chosen for special responsibility, not for special privilege. Our patriotic celebrations of Thanksgiving Day often dwell on America's privileged status among the nations of the world as if God were our private benefactor. When ancient Israel exchanged the truth that she was the people of God for the lie that God was the special God of Israel, God's judgment was wrought against her.

## Shop Early--Mail Early

Postmaster Flora Martin reminded Ropesville residents today that there are only 25 mailing days before Christmas.

"While that may seem like a long time to most people, it is frighteningly short to those of us in the Postal Service," she said. "Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien has predicted that well over eight billion pieces of mail must be delivered between now and Christmas Eve, a new record. "We are asking everyone to start thinking about their Christmas shopping and mailing now. If all the holiday mail were to hit the postal system at one time, it is obvious that we'd have difficulty delivering every piece on time."

Mailing early and spreading the mail flow out along the entire pre-Christmas season is the key to better mail service at this time of the year.

Last year the public cooperation was "tremendous," according to Miss Martin. Virtually every piece of holiday mail was delivered before Christmas Day. This year with increased volume because of the continuing strength of the economy we are hoping to see that fine cooperative spirit again.

Postmaster Martin offered these mailing tips.

\* Use ZIP Codes on all mail. "If there are some ZIP Codes that you still need for your mailing list come to the Post Office and look them up in our ZIP Code directory or give us a call. ZIP Codes are more important than ever this year.

Every envelope bearing the 1966 Christmas postage stamp will be a masterpiece. Postmaster Martin said today.

The special holiday stamp is a replica of a painting by Hans Memling, Flemish master of the Renaissance Era, now ranging in the National Gallery of Art in Washington, D. C.

The stamp, which is now on sale at the Ropesville post office was designed from the

central portion of Memling's oil, "Madonna and Child with Angels" which was painted on wood about 1480.

Postmaster Martin noted that use of the stamp for the sending of greeting cards assures first-class handling. That means the cards will be forwarded if the addressee has moved or will be returned if there is a return address.

This is the fifth in a series of holiday stamps and the Postal Service expects it to be another best seller. The initial print order was for one billion, two hundred million stamps.

The Postmaster estimated that 2,400 of the stamps will be sold locally.

The stamp design was unanimously recommended to Postmaster General Lawrence F. O'Brien by the Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee which passes on all stamps.
