## TOPS!

Monday evening, I had the interesting privilege of joining with the Tops Club as guest speaker. For those who may not know, Tops stands for 'Take Off Pounds Sensibly.' In a very enjoyable and yet serious way, this group of ladies is bound together by the covenant of a mutual problem which needs solving. They believe that they can lose weight more effectively working together than they can going it alone. Since each recognizes the problem of extra pounds as a personal one, the group is able to share together in taking off the excess weight in an honest, open and down to earth way.

The Tops Club employs the methods of group therapy: mutual association and mutual sharing based on a mutual problem. In a more dramatic way, Alcoholics Anonymous does the same thing. Each member confesses before the assembled meeting by declaring, 'My name is So & So; I am an alcoholic.' This honest confession of a serious problem is a common denominator of group fellowship. There is no need for hypocrisy or pretending or snobbery or for self-deceit. Such honesty creates an atmosphere of freedom and openness in the group, an attitude which is too often lacking in everyday group relationships.

Group therapy of this nature is based on the premise that people who are willing to share themselves with others in an honest way can be mutually helpful to each other. Think how we set up many of our own relationships by the exact opposite approach. We clothe ourselves in a garb of superficial happiness. Even in moments of companionship with our close friends we often keep our deepest selves and concerns hidden. We play the game aloof because we feel threatened by the possibility of rejection if we dare to be honest. We feel that the person who really dwells inside us might not fit as well in the group or the community or the church as the person we have fabricated to represent us there.

I recall an associate of mine who once having been quite successful encountered bankruptcy. However, he refused to admit his misfortune in his relationships with others. At great cost to himself and his family, he continued keeping up with the Joneses until the bankruptcy of his business turned into the bankruptcy of his family. He could not bring himself to be honest nor to confide in his friends. A group relationship founded on a phony front is a phony relationship which will never be fulfilling or supporting when real need arises.

All of us have areas of our lives which we wish to keep secret from the majority of our friends, else we would have no privacy. Yet this does not mean that in all degrees of human relationships, the courage to be who one really is should be sacrificed. We must risk life on our real selves. Difficult as such honesty of life may seem, it will enable us in the long run to be accepted or rejected, loved or not loved, for who and what we really are, not for who or what we pretend to be. Socrates long ago advised his pupils, 'Know thyself.' We might add, 'Be yourself.'

## Milk Prices In Danger Reports Jesse T. George

Representative Jesse T. George, Brownfield - Level-land area, today pointed out that the price of milk was on that S.B. 465, the milk price fixing bill, would cost the housewives of Texas untold thousands of dollars in higher prices for milk, ice cream and other dairy products and that it would also add tremendous additional cost to the school districts, counties and other public institutions who could no longer purchase milk on competitive bids.

Rep. George called attention to a statement made by the Atlanta Board of Education in Atlanta, Georgia, where a similar milk price-fixing bill was being contested in court, in which the Atlanta School Board stated that if they were denied the right to buy milk in an open and competitive market the board would pay more than \$400,000 this year and about \$525,000 next year as additional cost for milk supplies for the

school system. Rep. George emphasized that the price of milk was only 99c per gallon in the competitive market in Atlanta as reported by the Atlanta Journal in its issue of May 5, 1967 but under the milk price-fixing order the price would have automatically increased to \$1.11 per gallon plus 25c for glass containers.

Our schools in Texas are having a difficult time now in supplying nutritious meals in school cafeterias, and it would be highly discriminatory to add excessive costs to the present food bill for the public schools and hospitals when all of their other expenses are such a problem, George said.

Rep. George stated that although he was not a member of the House State Affairs Committee which held a public hearing on H. B. 465 at its meeting May 15, that he was greatly encouraged by the position which many of the

Committee members were taking in opposition to the milk price-fixing bill.

"The consumers should write their legislators and voice their objection to this price-fixing bill which will take money out of their pockets just as much as would a tax bill," George said. "Every hospital and rest-home that is struggling now to meet its bills would be hard pressed to meet rising payrolls and higher costs without the burden of higher milk and dairy food prices fixed by this proposed law."

George pointed out that the bill had apparently been passed by the Senate before the public had been told about its effect in increasing milk prices. "It now seems that the members of the House are better informed as to the unfair price increases which this bill would cause, since no House member has yet agreed to handle the bill," he said.

## 7 LAYER BUTTERSCOTCH BAR

- 1-2 cup butter or margarine
- 1 cup graham cracker crumbs
- 1 cup coconut
- 6 oz. pkg. chocolate chips
- 6 oz. pkg. butterscotch chips
- 15 oz. can condensed sweet milk
- 1 1-2 cups chopped nuts

Melt butter in 9" x 13" pan. Spread graham cracker crumbs evenly over melted butter, sprinkle on coconut, spread chocolate morsels, then butterscotch morsels. Drizzle condensed milk evenly over all. Top with nuts and bake in 350 degree oven for 30 minutes. Remove onto wire rack to cool and cut. (Makes about 3 dozen squares.) These are better if chilled in refrigerator.

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated eight accidents on rural highways in Hockley County during the month of April, according to Sergeant A. E. Roberts, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in eleven persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$6,470.00.
