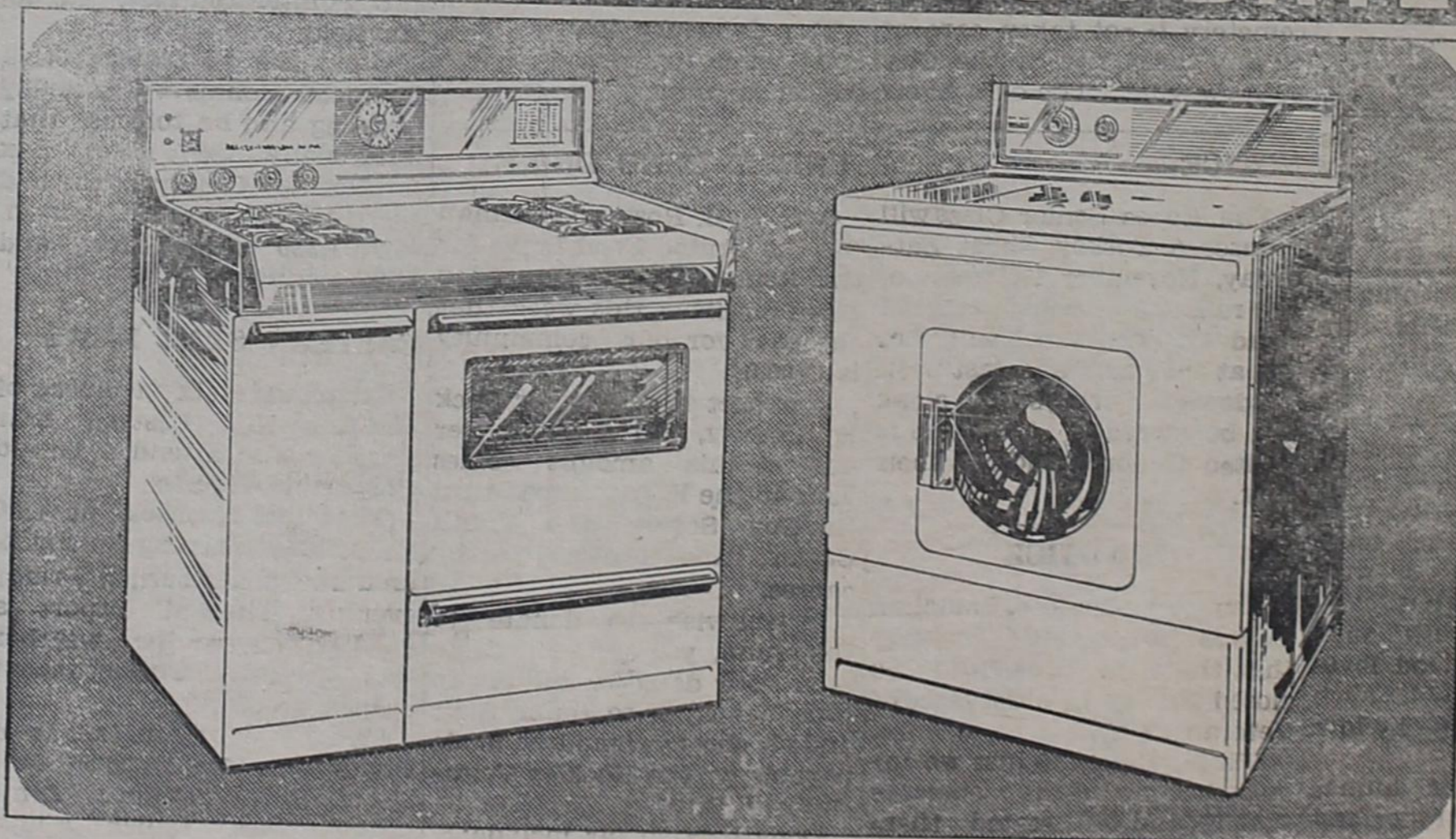

FAVORITE RECIPE

LEMON-COCONUT CAKE

1 pkg. Betty Crocker Lemon Coconut Cake mix
1 pkg. instant lemon pudding
1-2 cup oil
1 cup water
4 eggs
Put cake mix and pudding mix in a bowl. Add the oil and water. Blend with a mixer. Add eggs one at a time and beat the batter one minute after adding EACH egg. Grease and flour an angel food or bundt cake pan. Bake at 350 degrees 50-55 minutes.
SAUCE ICING
Mix together 1 cup powdered sugar, 2 tablespoons milk, and flavoring (lemon juice almond extract, or whatever you please.) Pour over cake after removing it from the pan. The coconut is sprinkled over the cake after the icing is poured.
