Ropes Eagles Make Clean sweep Of Track Events at Levelland Meet

The Ropes Eagles gained nine first places to sweep to a big victory in the 7-B district meet at South Plains College, Levelland, Saturday afternoon.

IS RECOVERING

Tom Killean, who lives near Ropes, is in a Brownfield hospital recovering from a heart attack.

The Eagles scored 169 1/2

points to win by a large margin over their closest competitor, New Home, with 87 and 5/6. Whiteface was 3rd with 81 1/3, while Wellman had 64 1/6; Meadow 53 and Union 32 1/6.

High point individual was Ronald Wyatt of New Home with 36 points. In the junior high division, Temple Kern of Whiteface took in-

dividual honors with 16 1/4 as the Antelope 8th grader took first in the '0, 100, shot put and ran on the winning sprint relay team.

Wellman paced the junior division with 50 points while Whiteface was runner-up with 29 1/2, Ropes had 20 1/2, Meadow 5 1/2, Union 3 and New Home 2 1/2.

Comment from the Capital —

What'll You Have — Complacency Or Competence?

Recently, a team of Russian women beat a team of American women in a basketball game at New York's Madison Square Garden. America won the men's game. That's fine with us; they were good games, and someone had to win.

The point is, Russia won a game as American as the Indians. And they broadcast their triumph loudly and happily throughout the world. But here is the significance. Not that the Russians won an American game, but how.

Here is how. Athletics is not fun and games in the Soviet. It is grim government business. Anyone who shows aptitude and physical qualifications for track, soccer, basketball, hockey, skating or for practically any other sport, receives special treatment behind the Iron Curtain. Jobwise, he is given preferred work. He undergoes intensive training. He gets special grooming and coaching, enabling him to rise to what we would call professional heights. Yet technically he maintains his amateur standing. When the individual, or the team, wins, the victory is exploited around the world with all the arrogant boastfulness attending a major military conquest.

The same boastful attitude prevails in the far more important area of scientific contribution.

There is no doubt that "Sputnik" was a great achievement. But Sputnik's success prompted an outburst of Russian political braggadocio so swagging as to cloud the fine accomplishment itself. It may be true that the Russians are ahead of us in space probing. It is possible that we lead them

in other phases of rocketry and in certain scientific defense systems. The details of comparison we do not know. What we do know is the almost-hysterical emphasis with which every Russian advance is boomed across the world as proof of the superiority of the Soviet "good life." This way of life "in the workers' paradise" is so productive, so forward-moving, we are told flatly, that Russia expects not only to exceed our growth but even economically to "bury" us!



Such an attitude on the part of the Russians makes a comparison with our own way of life inevitable. Let us see how the Soviets get their results. For one important thing, they go to school six days a week. Their government creates, as we said, special living conditions for those who excel in any field where the results can be a loudly-touted political boast. The whole stress is on mass production of talent.

It's not our way. It never was. Part of our Constitution opens up opportunity to the individual but does not ram it down his throat. There is more

chance in our method, but the past proves it has served us well. We feel we do not need governmental assistance, such as the Soviet provides, to guarantee team or personal successes.

The danger in this practice is that it can lead to complacency. So far, our haphazard "individual" system has worked well; therefore we feel it will continue. Perhaps we are too optimistic.

Remember, this attitude of ours has a terrible historical parallel. Complacency was the curse that so frequently softened older civilizations. Egypt of the great Pharaohs, Greece, the Roman Empire, Spain of the Phillips, France of the Empire — all were complacent. And all paid the catastrophic price for their smugness.

Can we do anything to change complacency to competence?

Yes. First, we can be aware of it. Then, everywhere, let's use our individual initiative while we still have it! We can be active in politics, in medicine, in business — in all those important areas so easily socialized by government. By retaining our duties and functions as men of democracy, we retain something greater — our individual identity! And, in turn, we help our nation to keep the strong shape of its heritage.

In America, ours is still the choice. So we must not surrender our individual initiative to the government or to any other agency. The rights and duties of personal initiative and personal responsibility still rest where they always did. Right on the individual. On YOU. And only your own competence can keep them there.

After an illness of several weeks duration Mrs. J. D. Zachary passed away early Wednesday morning in a Brownfield Hospital. Funeral services will be held in the Ropes First Baptist Church at 2:30 this afternoon (Thursday) with Rev. John Cole, the pastor, officiating. Interment will be in the Ropes cemetery.

Mr. and Mrs. Zachary moved to the Ropes community twenty-seven years ago from Jones County.

Before her marriage she was Nannie Elizabeth Dutton, born May 3, 1/78. On December 20, 1894, she was married to John D. Zachary who preceded her in death, passing away October 25, 1946.

Mrs. Zachary was a member of the Ropes First Baptist Church and is survived by two sons, Herman Zachary of Abilene, and Robert Zachary of Ropesville.

Mrs. Zachary was our neighbor—time and time again in the early hours of the morning and in the waning afternoon we watched her work with her flowers. She took pride in her yard and her home, and as long as she was able was active in church work, in civic work, she was a good neighbor, a faithful wife, a loving and understanding mother.

When the Angel rolled away the stone that covered the mouth of the sepulchre where Christ rested and Christ walked from the grave, death was defeated—today, we sincerely believe that while the body is interred in the earth from which it came, the spirit is returned to the God who gave it—one of the promises of the Book of Books is eternal life—oh, grave where is thy victory; oh, Death where is thy sting?

As we write this article in our mind is a picture, a moving picture, of Mrs. Zachary as she crossed the street—the years bearing heavily on her shoulders—yet, she refused to let the infirmities of age deter her in living—it was in the latter years that we knew her, respected her. At night, when we worked late, we have noticed a light in her home as we passed, and we knew she was not able to sleep—ill health had been her lot for several years.

We suppose that all of us, as we grow older, think more of what lays beyond the grave, and in those hours of searching we turn to the Book which tells of the Christ and the promise, and as we read of the crucifixion we can hear the Savior as he speaks to the thief: "Surely this day shalt thou be with me in paradise." We do not doubt that the spirit of the thief was in paradise immediately following his death.

Mrs. Zachary was what might be termed a pioneer in this young country. She and her husband settled on a farm southwest of Ropes, and through the years that he lived they farmed and reared their family. After his death she moved to Ropes where she bought a home, and here she lived during the hours before the sunset; here she lived among friends and neighbors who loved her.

Today she is beyond suffering. God, in his infinite wisdom and mercy has called her home where she rests in the circle of friends and relatives who have gone on before—there is laughter there; there is happiness, and—life eternal.

Tornado Season Opens on the South Plains

STORM PIECE

The tornado which destroyed Sunnyside and others which waltzed about over the Panhandle Tuesday night can leave no doubt that the turbulent weather season has arrived on the South Plains.

Jack Ogle requested the Plainsman to announce that during this season he will be on duty day and night and

wants every one interested to call him when there are alerts. Jack has at his disposal the Ropes civil defense

radio station which is located right in the center of a network of stations—Lubbock,

Slaton, Brownfield and Levelland—these stations, during the stormy period will keep in close touch with the weather bureau and the Ropes

station will be able to receive the reports as they come in.

This year sees the most elaborate warning system in the history of the South Plains.

In Ropes plans are being made to contact key points in the community when alerts are given so that the entire people may get the

benefit of this service.

This may be the means of saving lives.

If proper warning had been given at Sunnyside the people killed in the storm there would today, possibly, be alive. There is no way in which you can place the value on such a thing as the two way radio station—short wave gives the first warning

—patrols on the scene, and following broadcast warnings long before a storm hits, and that warning goes to short-wave sets, one of which is located in Ropes.

And, while you may discount it, nuclear attack is an ever present threat. If such should come it will be shortwave stations that will carry the warning in advance of other stations.

Recipes

CHICKEN TETRAZZINI
1 box spaghetti
1 1/2-2 cups diced canned chicken
1/2 cup chopped onions
1 can cream mushroom soup
1/2 can milk
1/4 cup diced pimento
1/4 cup butter
Salt and pepper to taste
Grated Cheese

Cook spaghetti, drain, and rinse with warm water. Cook onions in butter until soft. Mix chicken with rest of ingredients, except cheese. Grease baking pan or individual casserole. Cover bottom with spaghetti. Ladle hot mixture on top. Sprinkle with grated cheese. Bake in hot oven till bubbly. Garnish with parsley.

Variation: Use equal parts of ham and chicken.

SOUTHERN LIVER PLATTER

6 oz. package egg noodles
1 1-2 lbs. sliced calf liver
Flour, salt and pepper
4 tablespoons shortening
2-3 cup diced celery
1 cup diced onion
1 green pepper diced
2 1-2 cups canned tomatoes
1-2 cup American Cheese

Cook noodles in boiling salted water until tender. Sprinkle liver with flour, salt and pepper. Sauté in fat until brown. Place in butter baking dish. Mix together the celery, onions, green pepper (may be omitted if desired) and tomatoes. Pour this mixture over the liver and bake, covered, in 350 degree oven for one hour.

Place liver on platter. Add cheese, finely cut, to vegetable mixture and cook until cheese is melted. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Arrange noodles around liver on platter. Pour sauce over noodles.

Buttered and seasoned rice may be substituted for noodles.

Hamburger Corn Pone Pie
1 lb. ground beef
1-3 cup chopped onion
1 tablespoon shortening
2 teaspoons chili powder
3-4 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce

1 cup canned tomatoes
1 cup drained kidney beans
1 cup corn bread batter (1/2 standard cornbread recipe)
Brown meat and onions in melted shortening. Add seasonings and tomatoes. Cover and simmer over low heat for 15 minutes. Add beans. Pour meat mixture into 1/2

quart baking dish. Top with corn bread batter, spreading carefully with wet knife. Bake in 425 degree oven for 20 minutes. Serves four.



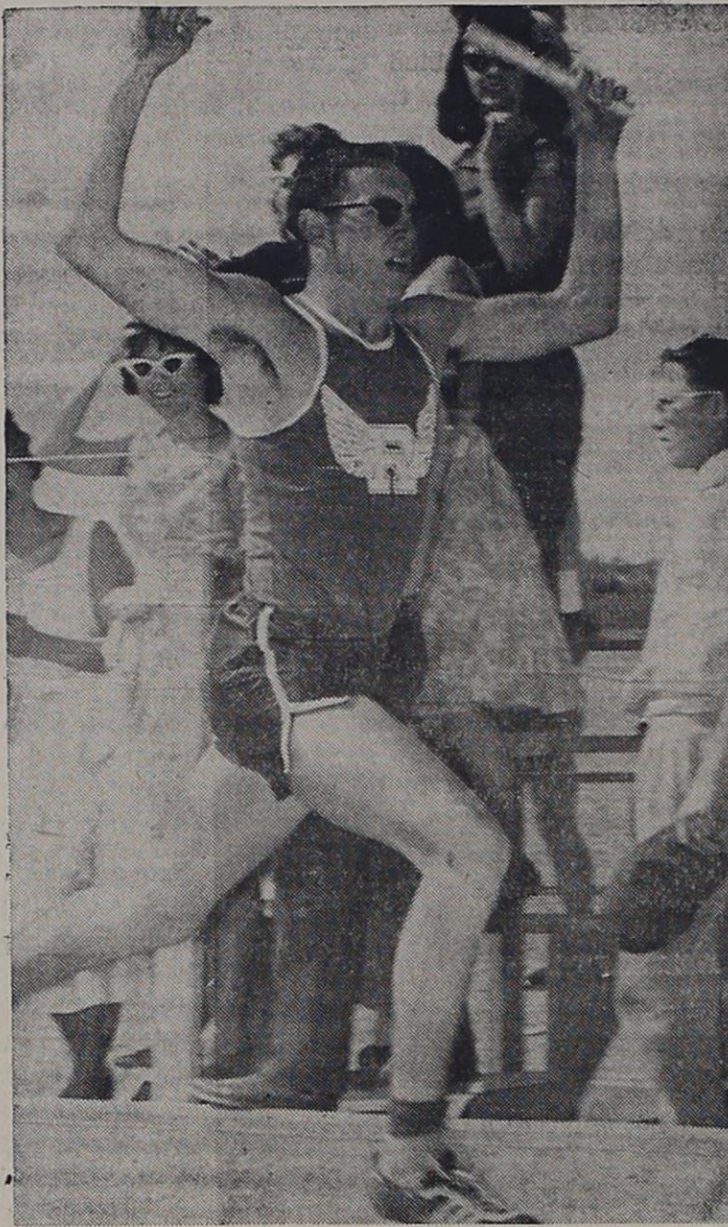
