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Plans For School Building Being Drawn

The firm of DeWitt & Spencer, architects of Lubbock, are preparing data that will determine the size and cost of the proposed new school building in Ropes.

This building will take the place of the junior high building which was originally the high school. It was erected approximately 38 years ago, and has long been outmoded. It is in such condition that the time is not far distant when, if not replaced, will be condemned.

At the time it was erected it was a complete and modern school plant—today the floors are gone, the roof in bad shape and the arrangement not up to standard. It is so constructed it cannot be made modern so the only alternative is a new building.

NEWS REPORT

Legislative action was little, but committee meetings were many this week in Austin. As the 58th Legislature moves into its second month, the prospects of floor action looks better as many bills are beginning to come from the committees. There have been 393 bills filed.

One of the bills of most interest is the Small Loan Bill, which was heard by a committee in the Senate this week. Another bill that was heard in the Senate was the Bill for Equal Rights for Women.

The House of Representatives State Affairs Committee has heard several bills which Junior Colleges want full four year status. These include San Angelo, Odessa, Laredo and Edinburg. Also, a House Committee has heard the bill concerning Padre Island.

The Appropriations Committee is continuing its hearings on State Agencies. The section concerning the appropriations for Higher Education has pretty well been completed. The Appropriations Committee heard the request of Texas Tech College as well as the request for Texas Public Junior Colleges, which includes South Plains College.

All the committees are having hearings each day and so we'll look for more legislation to be considered by the House of Representatives next week.

As these bills are beginning to come before us in Committees as well as in the House of Representatives itself, we will be looking for solutions and answers to these bills. So we again call upon you to let us know your feelings concerning legislation that confronts our state as well as our area.

We appreciate the opportunity to keep you informed through this newspaper and we hope that you will let us know your views concerning the important pieces of legislation that are before us. We look forward to hearing from you.

WEEK MARCH 4 TO 8

John Conally, Governor of Texas, issues the following Official Memorandum:
Austin, Texas

GREETINGS:

Special observance of increased emphasis on our education system has been marked annually for 13 years by a Public Schools Week in Texas.

During this period, parents are encouraged to visit the public schools, and all citizens are urged through special programs to recognize the tremendous importance of our system of education. Our goal is to make Texas public schools the finest in the Nation, and to achieve this our citizens are urged to take an active interest in the school systems and to cooperate with their school board, superintendents, principals and teachers.

Never before in our history has there been a greater need for educated leadership. As we rush to train young people in science and technology to keep pace with world events, it is also important to remember that our public schools will furnish our leaders tomorrow with the basic human, moral and spiritual foundations necessary for more advanced training and knowledge.

Therefore, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the period of March 4-8, 1963 as Public Schools Week in Texas.

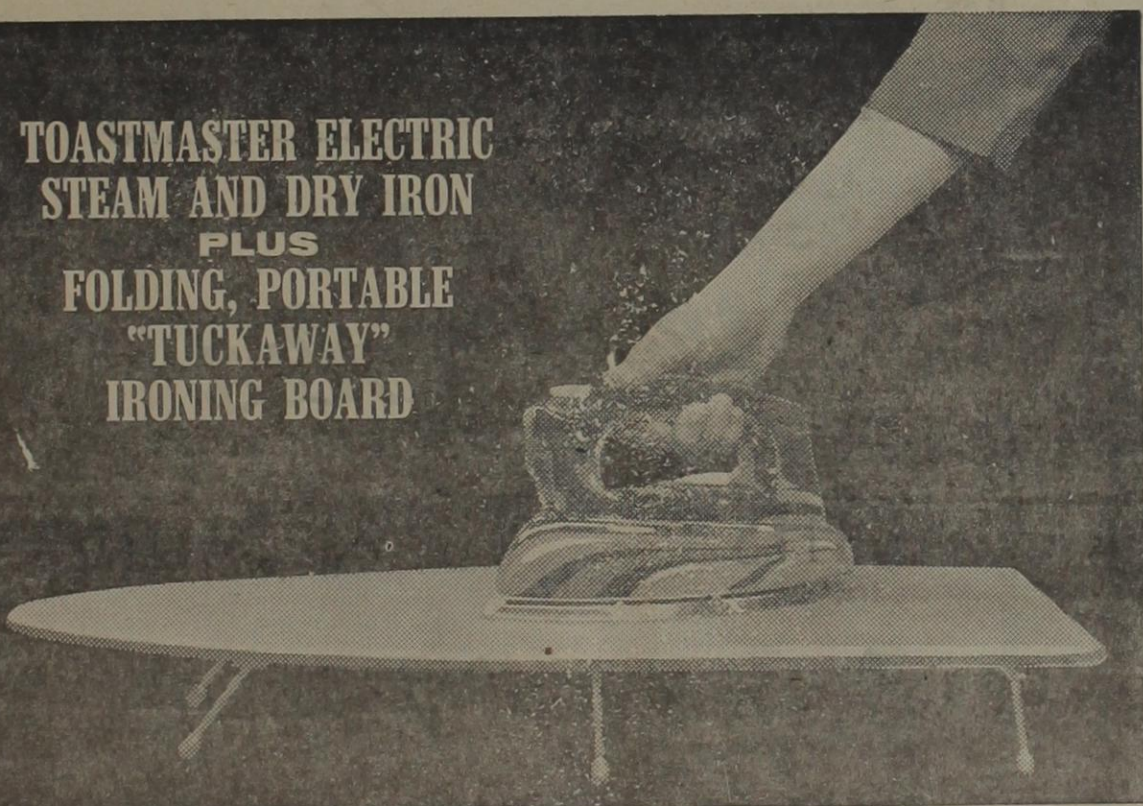

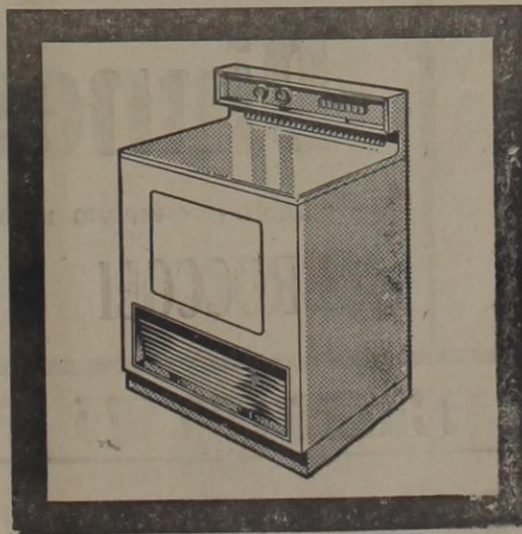
