## A DANISH VIEW

"... whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these Ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its Foundation on such Principles, and organizing its Powers in such Form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness."

—from A Declaration by the Representatives of the United States of America, In General Congress Assembled, July 4, 1776.

Revolutionary words by a revolutionary people! These words indicate that if a ruling body is destructive of the equality of men or their rights—Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Happiness—that same ruling body is to be altered or abolished.

What is destructive of our equality, our rights, in this day and age? Is there any Citizen of the United States who is denied Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Happiness?

Not long ago I studied theology with a young Lutheran theologian from Denmark. I noticed that he was interested in American politics. He followed every move of the Congress and of the President of the United States. I inquired of him as to why he was so interested in our politics. After all, he was from Denmark and to be in this country only one year. He replied by saying to me that for Europe the United States is much like a toy store window is to a young child who looks in the window and is sure that is the finest place in the world. Denmark, he indicated, looks to America, to the United States, because she is so perfect, so great a leader, and Denmark would follow such a leader.

In the conversation that followed I attempted to discover exactly what it is that makes the United States a leader among nations for this young theologian. He offered to me ideas like—equality of all men, the value and worth of all men, and the rights of all Citizens of the United States to freedom.

Then, we walked past a lunch counter that was refusing to admit certain Citizens on the basis of their color.

My Danish friend looked at me in such a way as to ask why.

I hung my head and we walked on by.

## BUSTER WRIGHT SUFFERS BROKEN JAW

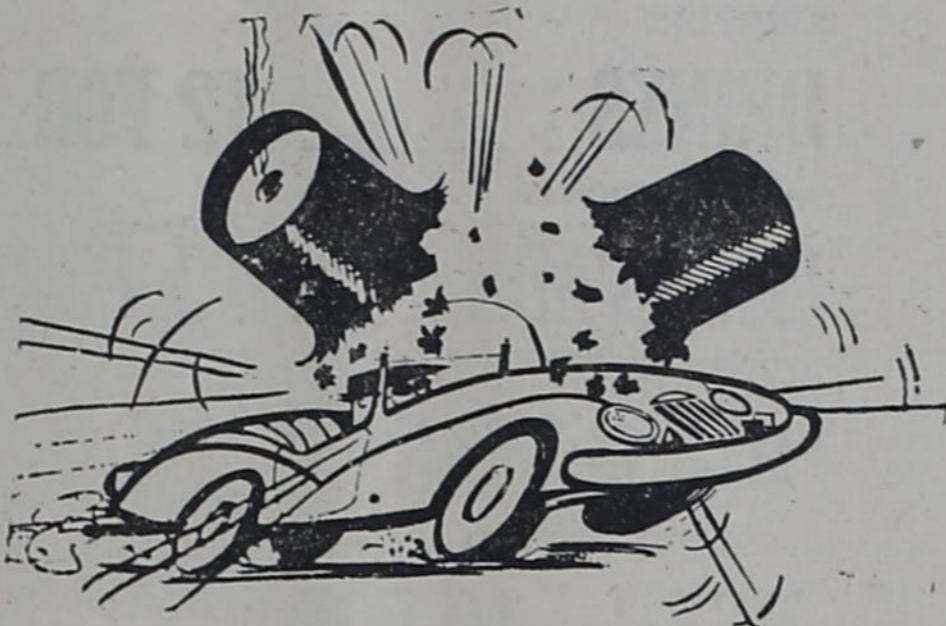

## Death on the Highway

While the drivers of Texas are making plans for 4th of July trips, the Texas Department of Public Safety is getting ready for Operation Motorcade, a three day vigil of tabulating all traffic deaths in the State. Major Harry Hutchison, Regional Commander of this area for the D.P.S., reported the State is approaching the mid-point in the year amid definite indications that traffic deaths will hit an all time high again in 1964.

"If we continue to take lives at the present rate, 1964 will become the most deadly year in Texas history for traffic fatalities," he said. "Motorcades at this time are over 150 more than at the same time last year, and considering the trend of increased accidents and casualties, we have every reason to expect that traffic deaths will exceed the previous all time high in Texas of 2,729 in 1963."

"Only 271 more deaths in 1964 than in 1963 will make a total of 3,000 lives lost on our streets and highways in one year, an increase for the year of ten per cent over 1963." Deaths in traffic this year have consistently been in excess of fifteen per cent over 1963, an indication that the 3,000 mark will be surpassed.

Hutchison said that Operation Motorcade will be placed in effect from 12:01 AM Friday, July 3rd and continue through 11:59 PM Sunday, July 5, 1964. In order to focus attention upon the added dangers of holiday travel when traffic is at a peak and as an integral part of the operation, which calls for maximum enforcement, additional personnel from other uniformed services of the D.P.S. will augment the regular Highway Patrol force. These patrolmen have been instructed to be extra alert for and direct their enforcement efforts toward those violations that are most often caused factors in traffic accidents. In addition, every effort will be made to remove drinking drivers from the highway.

"Since police traffic supervision cannot cover the entire street and highway system in the State every minute of the day, the big hope for safe driving and accident prevention rests with the individual motorist," Hutchison concluded.

Bill Edwards, who has been on crutches for several weeks, received x-ray pictures of his hip Monday. The picture showed that the bolt or screw which had been holding the bone in place had worked entirely loose and was seen in the flesh of his leg. The doctor stated that it might be necessary, later, to remove the 'steel pin', but expressed the belief that the hip bone will probably continue to heal without it. Also, Bill was told that he may soon be able to get around without the crutches.

It will be remembered that Mr. and Mrs. Edwards were in a car accident. She received a broken arm and other injuries, which have healed nicely.

## CAMP TIME FOR THE ARMED FORCES RESERVE

To those who have not been a member of the armed forces or of the reserve forces, the thought may come as to why they are on the highways going to or from camp during the summer. Some go because they have an obligation to fulfill for the time they belong to the armed forces. Some go because they wish to be a part of the reserves. Some look forward to retirement benefits after serving 20 years or more.

A large percentage of these men are good citizens of their local communities and leaders in these areas. They are members of the churches and civic organizations who do their share of the work and accept the responsibilities of these institutions.

The price they pay for being a member of the reserve forces is one night a week away from their family while they train to keep up the training necessary to be a member of the ready forces. Many of them sacrifice their vacation to attend summer camp. Many business and professional men in the reserves actually lose money while away for the two weeks.

The leaders of America have never found it feasible or possible to maintain a standing force large enough to counter any enemy attack. The citizens have always had to rally to the cause to support every major military effort in history. Korea was becoming a lost cause until enough reserve forces could be called to stop the advance of the North Koreans and the Chinese. Patriotism is bound to play some part in the make-up of a person who will don the uniform of the United States knowing full well that he could be called to face the armed might of another nation within 30 days, if such an emergency should arise. Many of these reservists wear rows of ribbons on their left breast, showing that they have faced enemy fire before and know what can happen if they must face it again. They have seen other men die in the foxholes of foreign soil. They do not want to see them die on our own soil. Our potential enemies know about these men, and they know how long it will take them to arrive at any point on the face of the earth to stop any move of aggression that our National Leaders deem advisable to use force to stop.

The next time we are held up by a convoy of trucks taking our reservists to camp, or home from camp, let us remember that they are citizens who love their country and wish it to stay safe for the rest of our citizens. If we will do this, we will not become impatient with the delay by the convoy causing us to lose a few minutes of our time.

## Scouts to National Jamboree

Tuesday, July 7, 1964, will be a big day for scouts of the United States of America. At least that is the day that the contingent from the South Plains Council of Boy Scouts of America leaves for the National Jamboree to be held at Valley Forge, Penn. The trip will be by chartered bus and will take a total of 21 days. While on the tour, the scouts will visit several points of interest on the way to the Jamboree. They will stop at some State Universities and shrines along the way. They will see Niagara Falls, go to Canada, the World's Fair in New York, Washington, D. C., and many other interesting sights on the journey that will take them over 5,000 miles before returning home.

The highlight of the trip will be the week spent at Valley Forge at the Jamboree. Here Scouts from all over the U.S.A., and some other countries, will meet for a week of scouting fun and demonstrations of many skills and be introduced to customs of many lands. This trip should be the

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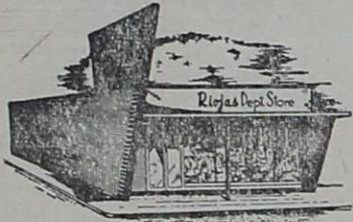
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### BILL FOSTERS RETURN HOME

A clinic for the examination of cerebral palsied patients will be conducted from 8:30 A.M. to 12 noon Thursday, July 9th at the Lubbock Cerebral Palsy Treatment Center, 3502 Avenue N.

Parents are requested to bring children to the Treatment Center at least a week before the clinic for a case

history to be taken. The Treatment Center is open on Monday through Friday from 8:30 A.M. to 12:00 and 1 to 5 P.M. Although treatment of the cerebral palsied can be started at any age, it is most effective if started in the first few months of life.

Present to examine patients in the July 9th clinic will be a neuropsychiatrist, two orthopedists, an eye, ear, nose and throat specialist and a

pediatrician. The Treatment Center is open to any cerebral palsied child. To date cases have come from nine states.

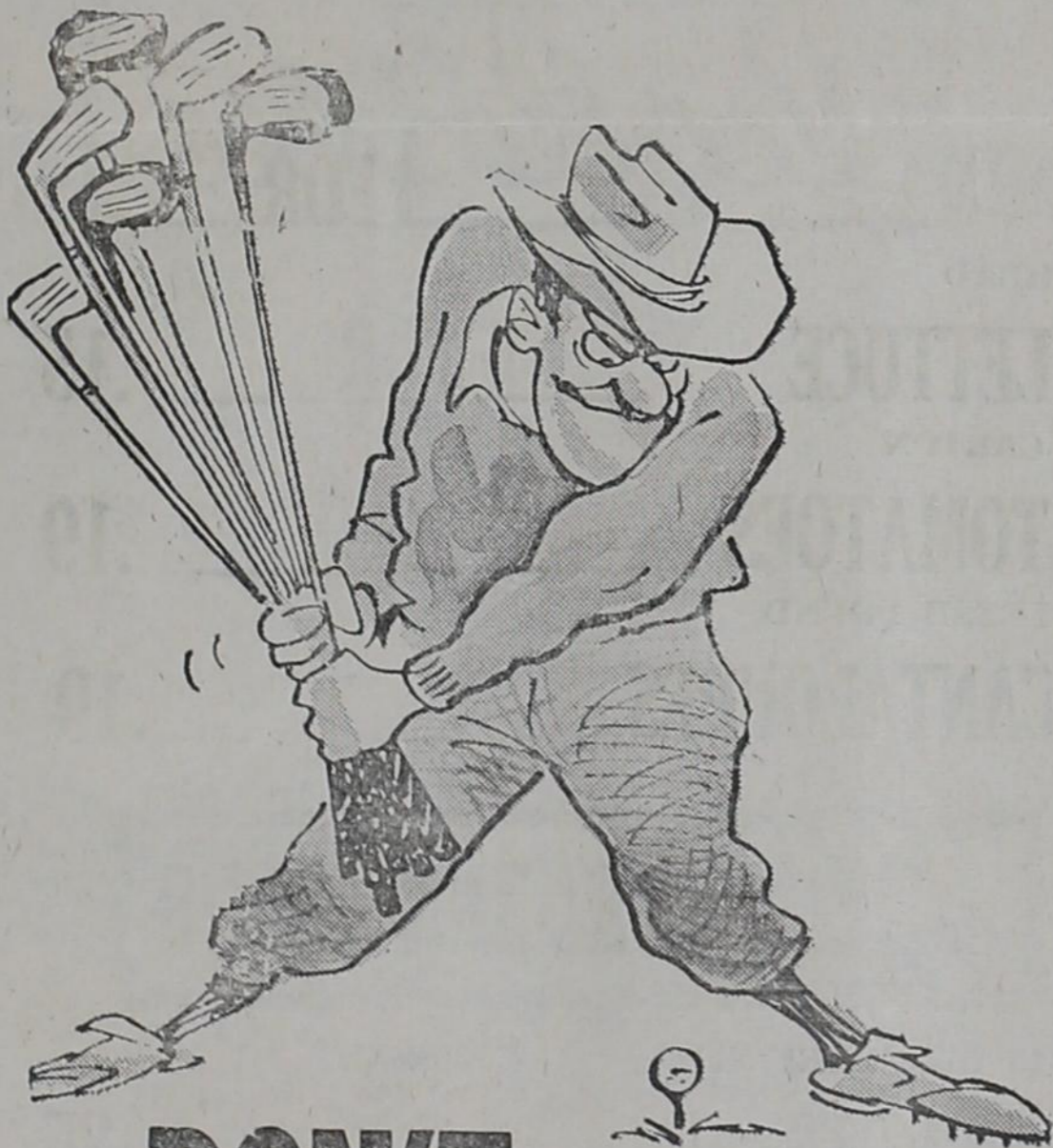
