## COMMUNITY

What is a community? One of my dictionaries defines a community as a "group of animals living in the same environment." Well, we are a group of animals. We live in the same environment. Yet, there is much more to being a community. One of the best things about a community is that the whole tries to help bear the suffering of one.

Just look at a funeral. Look especially at the funeral on Tuesday of Don Michael Powell. The community of Ropesville was at work. People of various church denominations went to Amarillo to help Don's family bear the load of suffering. This is when a community IS a community. When it seeks to give aid and comfort, then we have a community.

It is only when people, when communities, GIVE that they are bound together in strength. For when each person is out to GET the community is divided because the wants of each member of the community are selfish.

The same is true about us as individual persons. When we are giving, we are growing increasing God's talents, being the Lord's own people. But, when we are striving after our own selfish desires we are dying, we are not using God's talents, we are not being the followers of the Christ. This is why it is so important for us people to give specific gifts. We must give money, kind words, good deeds. You cannot give abstract words and flowery phrases and good intentions. To grow, to develop, to be the Lord's own, you must give specific gifts.

This is the witness which Don Powell has left us. I have heard the young men of the community—the football players—say that he worked them hard. Good! This is a gift he made in discipline. And, if one is to live this life, he needs much discipline. It would have been easy for Don to make things soft on the players. If he had done this, he would have given them a gift of sloth, of slackness, of indifference.

Don pointed to the importance of giving even in his dying. Each time I visited him, he was concerned about my time, about my having to drive to Amarillo, about my work load. Now that was a gift, which he made to us all. He had plenty of reasons to complain, to cry, to moan, to curse God. And yet, the last words we had were Romans 8:38-39.

If we are to be persons, if we are to be a community, we must learn to give specific things. And I would remind you that a gift is only a gift when you know you have given it, when it costs you some thing.

Thanks be to God for the life of Don Michael Powell. He has taught us little about giving. Let us not forget.

## KATHY McNABB NAMED AS BETTY CROCKER HOMEMAKER OF TOMORROW

Kathy McNabb has been named Ropes High School's 1965 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow. She scored highest in a written home making examination taken by senior girls Dec. 1, and is now eligible for state and national honors.

Test papers of all school Homemakers of Tomorrow in the state are currently being judged. The state's highest ranking girl will receive a \$1,500 scholarship from General Mills, Inc., sponsor of the annual Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow, with the state runner-up to be awarded a \$500 educational grant. In addition, the school of the State Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive a complete set of Encyclopaedia Britannica from Encyclopaedia Britannica, Inc.

Later this spring, the State Homemaker of Tomorrow, together with a school advisor, will join first-place winners and advisors from each of the 50 other states and the District of Columbia in a tour of Colonial Williamsburg, Va., Washington, D. C., and New York City. Climax of the week-long tour will be the naming of the Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow. To be chosen on the basis of original test score and personal observation and interviews during the tour, she will receive an increase in her scholarship to \$5,000. Second, third and fourth place winners in the nation will have their grants raised to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 respectively.

The Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow was initiated by General Mills in 1954 to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career. Including this year's record enrollment of more than half a million senior girls in more than 14,000 high schools, the total number of participants during the program's 11-year history stands at four million. Scholarship grants exceed \$1 million.

## JEHOVAH'S WITNESSES HOLD CONVENTION

(The following article was mislaid last week, and so left out of the paper.)

Alfred Ferguson announced today that the Levelland congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses is invited to attend a mid-winter convention in Hobbs, New Mexico, January 22-24, 1965.

Mr. Ferguson, presiding minister of the group, in discussing the announcement to the congregation, pointed to the challenge of "obedience to God amidst a wayward world."

"The seminar's purpose is to more effectively prepare the preaching fellowship of Jehovah's Witnesses to use the Bible in building up the spiritual morale of people in our community," Ferguson said. "Speak the Word of God with Boldness" is the convention theme.

The convention is one of three arranged each year by the Watchtower Bible and Tract Society for Jehovah's Witnesses all around the earth. In over 23,400 congregations in 194 lands, the Witnesses also have five training classes each week to aid them to apply Bible principles in daily living.

The Sunday climax will be district supervisor Harry A. Fetzik's lecture on the subject, "Our Divided World..... Is it Here To Stay?" Mr. Fetzik, well known Bible teacher and lecturer out of the group's headquarters in Brooklyn, New York will arrive the week prior to the assembly.

Announcement of the full program schedule is to be made in a few days. It will include among the featured speakers, Mr. Ferguson, a minister of the Levelland congregation.

## LAST RITES HELD

The Ropes community received a distinct shock Sunday morning when it was learned that J. W. Berry, 79, had passed away in Lubbock.

Funeral services were held Monday at 2:00 at Rix Chapel and interment was in the City of Lubbock Cemetery.

Rev. Wayne Perry, pastor of the Ropes Baptist Church, delivered the oration, assisted by Dr. Dudley Strain, pastor of Lubbock First Christian Church.

J. W. Berry was a pioneer of Hockley county, moving here soon after the county was organized. It was here he and Mrs. Berry reared their family.

He was a considerate father, a loving husband, and a helpful neighbor.

Almost from the time Mr. Berry moved to the Ropes community he was connected with the schools, acting as secretary for many years. His every effort and his every dream was to see the schools were improved, while at the same time he left no stone unturned to make the town and community a better place in which to live.

At one time he made the race for county judge.

For many years he owned a farm just west of the Ropes city limits, selling it several years ago and bought the Ropes Drug Store which he operated until his health failed.

There are few men who are of the same caliber as Mr. Berry. There has not alone been an irreparable loss to his family, but a place left vacant in the community which cannot be filled. He was a man who numbered his friends by those who knew him; he was always a helping hand; he was gracious and courteous, giving freely of the services he had to offer—most of the time not charging for his service as notary public. His long experience in dealing with the public made him tolerant and forgiving. He lived by the Golden Rule.

For some 26 years this writer was associated with him in different way—we never knew a better man. He left behind an image which will live in the memory of those who knew him as long as life shall last.

He has put aside his overcoat of clay and the benevolent spirit has fled to the God who gave it, yet, his spirit is still among us.

Heaven has been enriched and the world made poorer by his passing.

Yet, as we sit here this morning, his image is very plain to us. Death, whether of the young or old, is a sorrowful occasion, yet, it is but the beginning of life eternal, of happiness for the spirit, of the fulfillment of the Christians hope.

So, we say to the family, in these dark hours, when the ebony winged angel of death has touched your loved one, he was a Christian, and the Book which guided him contained this message to the living, "Oh, grave where is thy victory; oh, death where is thy sting."

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Mary Berry of the home six sons, Bill and S. B., Ropes, Bob, Levelland, Mike, Bellview, Wash., Dan, Eunice, N. M., and Shelton, Lubbock; a daughter, Mrs. Clay Barger, Lubbock, a brother, D. C. Berry, Lovington; 15 grandchildren and 6 great grandchildren.
