## Freeze, Frost And Rain Visit The Plains

A welcome freeze visited the South Plains on Sunday night, killing all vegetation, and will likely cause all unopened bolls of cotton to pop open.

As the majority of cotton in this section is gathered by "strippers", the delayed frost and freeze has also delayed the harvest. Now it will start in earnest as soon as it is dry enough.

On Monday night the weather moderated and rains were reported all over the South Plains. In the Ropes

community an average of one inch fell. This broke a drought of long duration. However, since it came in the fall it was welcome, and the dry warm weather has made it possible for the grain to be gathered, and the cotton to mature and open. Heavy rain through this season of the year does heavy damage to crops.

From all indications we will gather a bumper crop of cotton, and we have already gathered a large crop of grain.

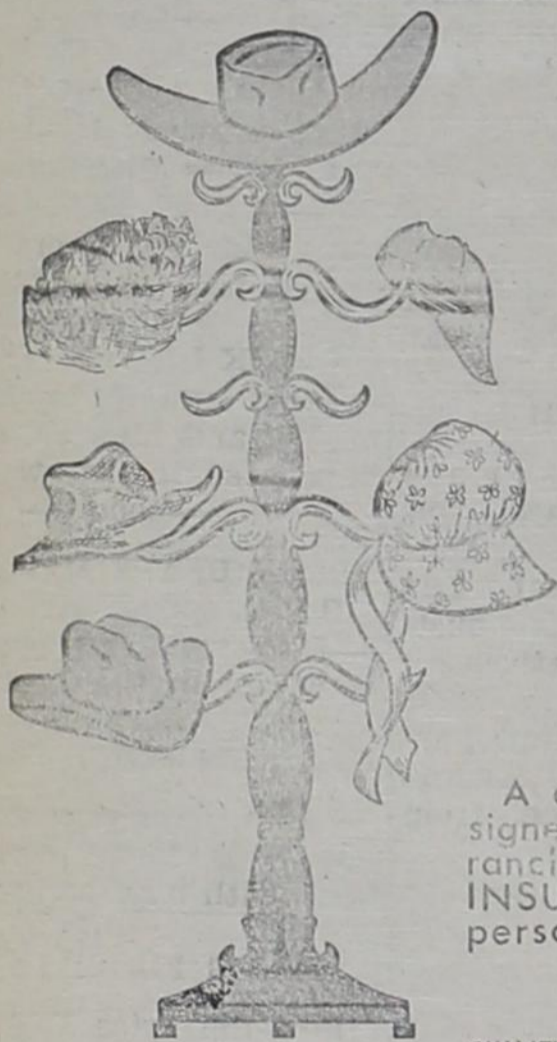

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NEWS RELEASE FROM  
3500th PILOT TRNG WING  
REESE AFB, LUBBOCK

Reese Air Force Base officials investigating Wednesday night's crash of a T-38 jet training aircraft near Plains, Texas, today indicated that the cause of the accident probably will be listed

as "unknown". They said that although the supersonic jet landed in "very good shape" after its pilot had ejected, someone had tampered with the wreckage and caused it to burn before the investigators could reach the scene. Actually, they said, some-

one had "experimented" with instruments in the cockpit, all of which apparently were in good shape. The persons who were looking around, it was said, worked a mechanism which caused a rocket on the remaining empty seat to eject and caused a fire which destroyed parts of the plane vital in determining the cause factors of the accident.

Reese officials said that the fire destroyed important evidence essential to the investigation and reduced possibility that a definite cause of the accident will be found.

They also pointed out that persons poking around the wreckage before investigators arrived endangered their own lives, since aviation fuel in the aircraft was a hazard and the fire which was started could have brought on an explosion.

The fire also proved costly to the government, it was stated, because thousands of dollars in parts from the damaged craft could possibly have been used on other jet trainer aircraft at Reese.

The T-38 cost about \$860 thousand and investigators believe damage was relatively low, prior to the fire.

One of the purposes for investigating aircraft accidents, said the officials, is not only to discover what caused the mishap in question, but also to uncover information which may assist in preventing future accidents with that type of aircraft.

Said Colonel Joseph E. Payne, Reese acting Wing Commander, "It is vitally important that persons locating any aircraft wreckage not disturb the remains in any way. This is essential for several reasons. First, it is quite possible that an explosion or fire could occur, resulting in either death or injury. Also, it is essential for the investigators to find parts of the aircraft exactly as they landed, since much valuable information can often be obtained this way. We do, however, request that any one who should find wreckage of Air Force aircraft notify Reese immediately in order that we may get to the scene as soon as possible."

News Release

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 4 accidents on rural highways in Hockley County during the month of August, according to Sergeant A. E. Roberts, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for four persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$1,900.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county from January through October of 1963 shows a total of 84 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed, 69 persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$51,045.00.

The Sergeant said, "Don't walk yourself to death," that is a slogan we would like for you to remember for the rest of the year. November and December are noted as dangerous months in traffic and especially for pedestrians. During these last two months of 1962 in Texas there were 65 pedestrians killed and 768 injured in collisions with motor vehicles. There are many reasons for this: longer hours of darkness, bad weather, pedestrians not visible to drivers, holidays and lack of concentration.

The veteran patrol supervisor stated some tips to aid both the pedestrian and driver.

If possible, carry some kind of light, walk on the left side of the road facing traffic day or night so that you can see approaching traffic.
