RUM CAKE

2 cups sugar
 1 cup shortening
 4 eggs
 3 cups flour
 1-2 teaspoon baking powder
 1-2 teaspoon soda
 1 cup sour milk
 1 1-2 teaspoons rum extract
 Cream sugar and shortening. Add eggs one at a time beating after each is added. Add dry ingredients and milk alternately. Bake in a tube pan for one hour at 350 degrees.

SAUCE
 Combine 1-2 cup sugar, 1-2 cup water, 2 tablespoons butter and 1 1-2 teaspoons rum extract. Boil for one minute. Pour on warm cake.
