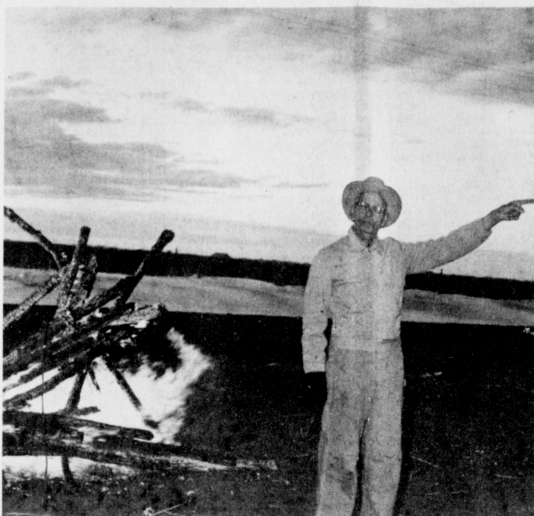

McQueen Speaks To Bula FFA Banqueters

Horace McQueen, public relations director for Plains Cotton and noted farm editor, was guest speaker at the Friday, March 15, Bula Future Farmers of America banquet held for parents and sons.
McQueen, who recently returned from an extended visit to Australia compared the governmental policies of the United States to the policies of Australia and New Zealand. He stated that his conclusion was "America is still at the top of the heap in spite of the hippies, treasonous politicians and weak kneed patrons who are afraid to stand up for the principles which have time and again snatched our great country from the fires of apathy and shame."
He concluded this oration with a challenging appeal to each person present to take stock of his personal attitudes and then move into the firing line in the defense of the "land of the free and the home of the brave".
McQueen also sparked his talk with bits of humor and some beneficial agriculture notes.

Area Men Face Murder Charge

Four area men face murder charges at an examining trial which will be held in the County courtroom in Littlefield Monday, March 25, at 10 a.m. The examining trial will be conducted by Justice of the Peace, J. N. Bowen.
John Everett Knox, 71, of Sudan, died Sunday night, March 3, while enroute to a hospital following a robbery - beating. Knox was robbed of an estimated \$400.
Last Tuesday, Peace Justice received an autopsy report which stated that Knox "passed away shortly after being delivered severe head and facial trauma."
According to the autopsy report, Knox also had multiple contusions over the body, with the right side of his face receiving the most severe ones.
A partial description of two of his assailants was given to Deputy Sheriff Homer McLauray, Sudan, by the victim shortly before he died, Texas Ranger Razz Rentrow of Lubbock assisted McLauray in the apprehension of the four young men. Being held without bond in the case are Richard Duain Rush, 22 and Odell "Pee Wee" Howard, 19, both of Muleshoe; Cecil Lee Mooney, 23, Sudan and John Wayne Hall, 18, of Needmore, who was released on a \$5000 bond.
John W. Clark, of Littlefield will represent Rush, Howard and Mooney as a court-appointed attorney and Hall will be represented by W. G. Street of Littlefield.

Smoke Sign Denotes Top Crop Year

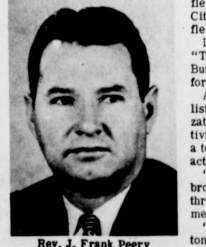
"Folks, its time" Indian John Crim announced at sunrise, Friday, March 22.
And it was time for the pioneer's annual weather-crop prediction, Indian style, which has been made at the same time and place for the past 43 years with Friday making the 44th.
As the smoke from the teepee-shaped ceremonial fire began to streak off skyward, a crowd of about 35 people were quiet to lend an ear to what this man who learned this lore from the Indian back in Indian days.
"This will be the best crop year since 1941" was the first sign Indian John read in the fire and smoke. "Those irrigation wells will get more rest than they have in 18 years," he added.
"This year's crops will be in the category with those of 1947, 1941, 1931 and 1913. Crops were fair in 1961 and 1962."
At sunrise this year, the wind was from the north-northeast which according to legend is "top for crop year."
Along with the moisture prediction, was one which said we would have wind this year, however nothing showed in the signals to indicate heavy storms or excessive amounts of hail.
"All in all," he concluded, "it will be a pretty good year."
People who live in this area and have been keeping up with 'Indian' John's weather forecasts say they are not far from right and they have come to depend on them, and come back year after year to see, first hand, the reading of the smoke and the mutterings of the crackle of the fire which too means something to the reader of the forecast.
This annual gathering of the Crim family and friends has been a custom long before the present John Crim began his practice of this old Indian legend.
He was taught the reading of the smoke signs by his father who learned from the originators of the forecasting, the Indians themselves.
Crim's father came to live in

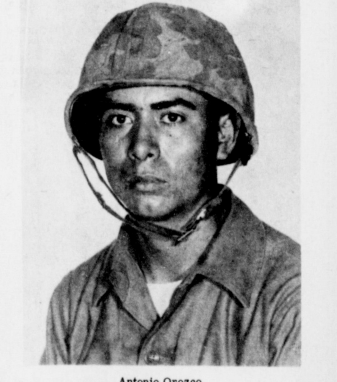

April 1 Loan Option Deadline

Can Muleshoe and surrounding territory really afford to lose the Farm Labor Housing Project.
In view of pertinent facts of the progressive nature, members of the project's steering committee do not think so.
One of the major factors concerning the committee, who have made a thorough study of the situation, is the fact that our area will continue to need farm laborers in increased numbers.
The increased numbers will stem from the fact that more and more acres of land are being planted in vegetable crops of different types.
Some \$16,000.00 must be raised before April 1 in order for the housing unit to be completed here.
Irvin St. Clair, explaining the April 1 deadline for raising the remainder of needed funds on the local level said: "An application has been approved by the Federal Housing Administration in the amount of \$550,000.00 to go with the \$20,000.00 Bailey County is to provide and if the money is not accepted by April 1, it will go back into the FHA."
"Then," St. Clair continued, "a new application would have to be made and the Federal Government would again have to re-appropriate the money which would be in the 1969 budget, should area people decide that the unit should be constructed here."
St. Clair said "With such a unit in Muleshoe, a better class of farm laborers would be available as a better place for them to live would be available. Although farmers would have priority over the units for laborers, should they be vacancies, other laborers could occupy them until they are needed for farm laborers."
Dimmitt has recently held dedication ceremonies for such a housing complex as their needs for such housing became evident.
Plans call for the loan to be repayable on a 33-year, five percent interest basis, Clinton Kennedy, FHA office manager said.
The complex plans call for a 100-family structure with rent for the partially furnished units set at from \$15 to \$20 per week.
Several individuals and firms have contributed to the funds needed here within the county to secure the option on the land for the building complex.
Both banks, First National Bank and Muleshoe State Bank are taking deposits for the fund. Many have committed themselves for the \$200, stock in the project who have not made their deposits.
Reports show that contributions and shares are running about equal between farmers and merchants as the benefits of such a project will be of great benefit to both.
"These deposits are placed in escrow at both banks and will be returned to the depositor's account should the local funds not be raised by April 1" steering committee chairman Jimmy Dale Black said, "and the project will be discontinued."

Antonio Orozco War Casualty

The Vietnam jungle war, one with an already long history of heartbreak, not only for that torn land, but for America, has again thrust it's dart to Bailey County.
Marine Private Antonio Orozco became the second casualty for Bailey County as he was killed in action Wednesday, March 13, presumably somewhere between Da Nang and Quang Tri in guerrilla warfare.
The 20-year-old Marine had been in service less than one year and was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Phillip Orozco, Muleshoe.
His parents received the last letter from the youth dated March 10, three days prior to his death.
He spoke little of the war in the letter, however, he wrote of the weather and his location.
Marine Private Orozco was in the weapons Divisions of the Third Platoon.

this area when the Redman was an inhabitant, along about 1887 and worked on the Southern Pacific Railroad. It was during these years that he became curious about the fires scattered over the prairie at dawn each March 22. Asking questions, he learned that it was an Indian custom or practice to forecast the weather in order to prepare for the times ahead of them.

In this section of Texas, he learned from the Indians how to read the signs in the smoke and passed the information to the present day 'Indian' John Crim.

The legend is that a fire burning at sunrise on March 22 will give signals for a good or bad crop year in wind direction and the way the smoke carries. If the wind is from the north or northeast and carries the smoke south or southwest, the crop will be average, but wind from the west, south or southwest, means a "very poor" crop. A bumper crop is indicated by the smoke carrying west or southwest.

"This forecast could only be for dryland farmers, nowadays," Crim said. "The Indians, when they practiced this custom did not have the irrigation wells we have today to substitute for rain. Only the water from above could be depended on for assurance of prosperity."

The Crim children all congregate for the forecast whenever possible, bringing the "prophet's" grandchildren who enjoy being up before dawn and helping to gather the wood and get the fire going for the big event.

As last year, the sky was filled with broken clouds as the prediction was made, but unlike last year, there was snow on the ground and a snowbank across the road from the old Crim homestead located 1 mile west and one and one-half miles north of Clay's Corner in Parmour County, formed a backdrop for the picturesque blazing fire and forecast.

Coffee, rolls and sausage rolls were served by Mrs. Crim to those attending.

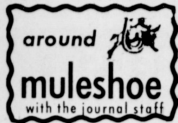
