Three Important Elections Will Be Held Next Month

There are two important elections coming up before another issue of the Plainsman, and we would like to remind you to be sure and go and vote.

These two elections concern the school system and the city government. There will be board members for the school, and aldermen for the city on the ballots coming up.

The first election is Saturday, April 1st, and will be held at the school house. The second election is Tuesday, April 4th, and will be held at the City Hall.

You may not realize it, but voting your opinion is a rare privilege, as there are not many nations in the world where you can vote as you please.

We do not attempt to tell you how to cast your ballot, but wish to remind you not to forget the elections, and to be sure to vote.

Election for the Ropesville Public Schools Board of Trustees will be held Saturday, April 1, in the High School Library. Everett Wallace will be Election Judge.

Absentee balloting opened March 13 and will continue through March 28th, from 9 to 5 Monday through Friday at the School Tax Office. Absentee voting may be done only during regular working hours.

There are eight candidates: H. Joe Schwartz, Charles Shannon, Erlan Gresham, Crate Snider, R. W. Richardson, Preston Reeves, W. J. Shockley, T. J. Redman, Jr. Trustees whose terms are expiring are H. Joe Schwartz,

Charles Shannon, and Erlan Gresham.

You are urged to cast your ballot in this election, and if you are not going to be in Ropes April 1, you are asked to please cast your absentee ballot.

Election for Aldermen for the City of Ropesville will be held Tuesday, April 4th at City Hall.

Names on the ballot will include:

- Place No. 1: B. J. Thomas
- Place No. 2: W. E. Burks
- Place No. 3: W. C. Patman
- Mansfield Thomas
- Place No. 4: T. J. Littlefield

The ballot will also include blank lines for write-in votes.

Another important election concerning Hockley County is coming up April 15th. This is a called special election to try to vote in bonds for the remodeling of the Courthouse in Levelland, and to build the roadway from Levelland to the Lubbock County line into a modern four-lane affair.

If you have ever traveled on this road, I am sure you will agree it is dangerous, as it is not quite three lanes, and anyway, it does need rebuilding. As we understand it, the State pays part, and the County pays part.

Absentee voting is now in progress in Levelland at the office of County Clerk Raymond Dennis. Mr. Dennis informed us this week that the absentee voting started March 27, and will continue through April 11. The bonds will amount to some \$395,000, but are separate on the ballot. We understand that \$195,000 of these bonds will go for

remodeling of the courthouse. There will be nothing done to the outside of the building, but the inside will be remodeled and made more convenient, with more spacious offices.

If we are not mixed up as usual, it will take a two-third majority vote from residents of the county who are qualified voters and taxpayers to pass the bonds on the roadway, but on the court house it will be ruled by a simple majority.

The election in Ropes will be held at the Community Building, with S. B. Berry as County Judge. This will be on Saturday, April 15th, so mark your calendar now, and don't fail to vote.

The ballot will be similar to the following:

Proposition Number 1: "For the issuance of bonds and the levy of ad valorem taxes in payment thereof" (Road Bonds)

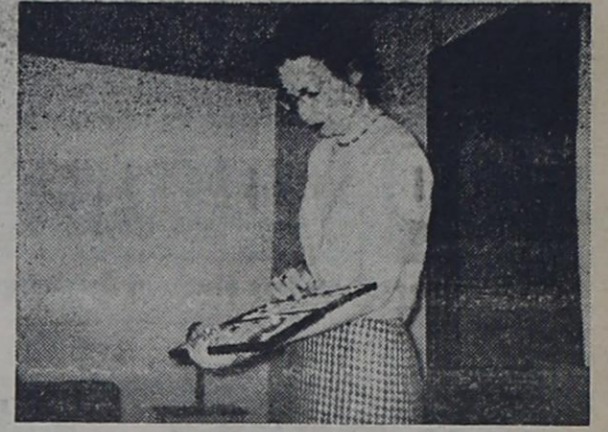
"Against the issuance of bonds and the levy of ad valorem taxes in payment thereof" (Road Bonds)

Proposition Number 2: "For the issuance of courthouse bonds and the levying of the tax in payment thereof"

Your job is to merely cross out the one you do not wish to remain on the ballot. If you are for these bonds, you cross out the 'against' paragraph in full. If you are against these bonds, you mark out the 'for' paragraph in full. Just don't forget to go and vote.

An Editorial . . .

As we start to write this article, we feel very much our inadequacy to do so. All we can do is give a layman's opinion, and one that is not very well versed in the Scriptures, but we do feel that the following subject should be discussed, brought to the attention of everyone, and should be given due consideration.

We will state to begin with that we are a member of the Methodist Church, but if and when they do join into the united churches, we will place our affiliation with another denomination.

In the column this week "C.O.C.U.", three paragraphs of the Preamble of the document for Consultation of Church Union are given.

Early American history very plainly states that the pilgrims left England for freedom of religion, to go away from the one ruling religious body, the Church of England; to come to a new land where they could worship as they chose. We see no point in throwing this precious heritage down the drain. There is no place left in this well explored planet to escape to, so we must try to preserve this most important freedom.

We consider God's gift to each man individual, he is to have the freedom of choosing which church he wishes to belong to, which church most

more effective service, than is the case where separated ministries in separated churches are expected to give priority to the institutional interests of those churches. Thus we, humbly and penitently, seek to create the conditions for a fuller expression of the faith, the worship, the ministry, and the mission of the one Church of Christ."

suits his convictions, and also where he serves his personal God best. We consider religion a personal thing.

When one or more organizations are combined, someone has to sacrifice something and we believe in this case it would be their personal religious beliefs.

If this church becomes a reality, it will have power, and we don't necessarily mean spiritual power. We mean power to rule everyone's religious convictions. We are mighty afraid that some people would have to sneak off and praise the God that they worship, for we think they would be unable to find His presence in a meeting of this type.

We also notice that there are several denominations that are not listed in the roster of churches planning this great unity. We wonder if eventually they would be so outnumbered that they would be forced to close their doors, and either worship at the one church, or else worship in secret at home.

We are of the faith that God is there whenever you seek Him. We believe that His power is so mighty that the least voice is heard. Whether it be one person, or many, His strength is attainable to all. All you have to do is ask. It makes no difference if you are gathered in a huge group, or alone. We do not believe that God would be partial to this particular group because its number is larger than the so-called separate congregations. Nor, for that matter, an only person calling on Him. We just do not believe our God is impressed by numbers, but by deeds.

We have never felt isolated because of our belief. Rather, we have felt safe and secure

knowing that there is one God regardless of people's beliefs, and He is available to everyone.

We do not believe that separate traditions obscure the common inheritance.

We are always accused of being old-fashioned, but when it comes to religion, we say that if it is made any more modern, there will be no religion that we can rely on. Any time it comes to religion, we say, "Yes, we are old-fashioned, and we believe yet that the old-fashioned religion is the best kind."

With the 60th Session half over in terms of days, bills are beginning to pour out of the various committees for floor action.

The Governor's proposed tax measures, which if enacted in total would produce around \$145 million in additional State revenue, appears to be in some difficulty in the Revenue and Taxation Committee. Speculation that parts of his proposal will not be passed this Session means that legislators may begin looking to other sources of taxation.

Included in the Governor's tax package are increases in the natural gas production tax from 7 to 8 percent of the wellhead value, the motor fuel tax from 5 cents to 6 cents per gallon, and 2 percent sales tax on alcoholic beverages, which are presently exempt under the selective sales tax act.

The most controversial portion of the tax package hinges around the Governor's recommendation to open the door to legalized liquor-by-the-drink, and to levy a tax of 5 cents per ounce on the liquor. This particular proposal would add approximately \$15 million to the General Revenue Fund.

In his original address to a joint session of the Legislature, the Governor recommended repeal of the Colson-Briscoe Act commonly known as the farm-to-market road program. Repeal of the measure would add \$30 million to the General Revenue Fund during the biennium. The farm-to-market road program is extremely beneficial to our West Texas Area and total repeal would be detrimental. Since his original recommendation, the Governor is now advocating that the repeal of the Colson-Briscoe Act not be done, but that the source of the \$30 million merely be transferred from the General Revenue Fund to the Gasoline Tax Fund. This transfer, if enacted, means that our important farm-to-market road pro-

gram would remain in effect.

Various tax measures in addition to those advocated in the tax package have been introduced and others are being considered if the need necessitates. Bills have been introduced to raise the beer tax and to raise the college tuition fee, a measure advocated by the Coordinating Board, College and University System, but not by the Governor in his remarks to the Legislature.

There is considerable comment that the selective sales tax may be raised one-half a cent or even to 3 cents with the possibility of making the tax an across-the-board tax, removing present exemptions.

Because of the importance of the taxation measures, I have sent material on the subject to the Secretary of the Hockley County Legislative Council, Mrs. Inetha Cooke, Levelland, in order that the tax measures might be further discussed at the next Council meeting. Also included in the package mailing to the Legislative Council Secretary is material on the proposed traffic safety program, education, and the controversial daylight-saving time.

Heated discussion on major state issues is beginning to dominate legislative activities. In later columns I will discuss the minimum wage proposal, revenue bonds issued by local governmental entities for industrial development, annual sessions of the Legislature, prohibition of eavesdropping by electronic devices, and the traffic safety program.

Please continue to express your views and your suggestions on these critical matters.

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
