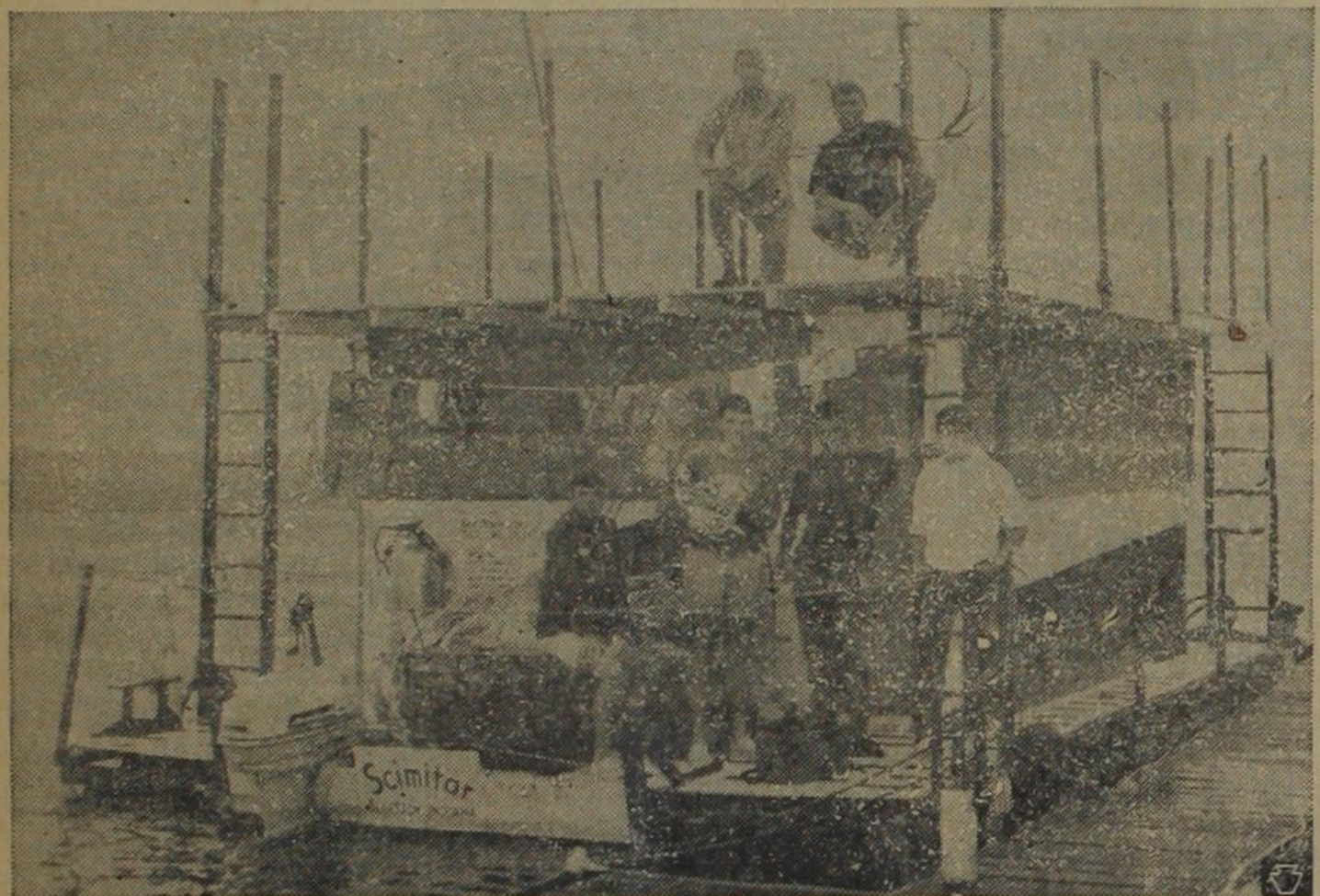

Newsman Leads Scout Explorers River Trip



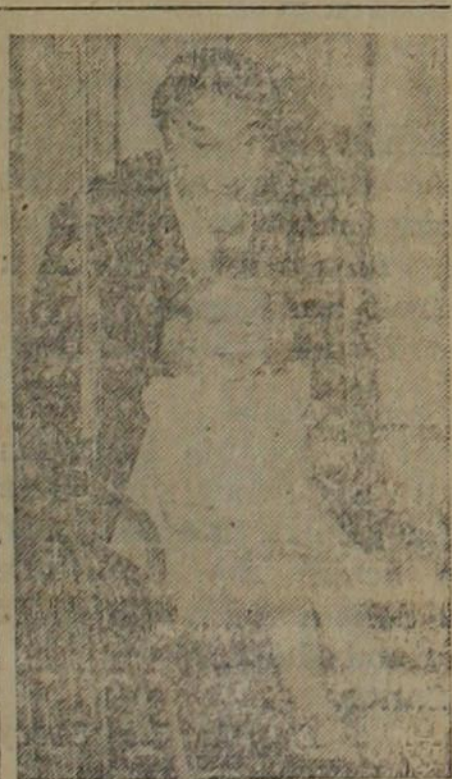
BLUFFTON, INDIANA — They're remodeling and refurbishing the "Scimitar", whose home port of Bluffton is some 150 miles inland. The land-locked raft-houseboat, built by the Scouts of Bluffton's Explorer Post 2144, is being readied for its 1969 trip down the Ohio and the Mississippi to New Orleans. Last summer the 3½ ton raft took its crew of 18 Scouts and their four adult leaders to Tiptonville, Tennessee, on the Mississippi — a trip of approximately 600 miles. An abandoned rock quarry near Bluffton, flooded by rains and seepage, is the testing basin for the 16 by 30 foot craft, on which the Scouts erected the enclosed galley, storage area and pilot house. The forty-four 55-gallon drums which provided flotation, are being replaced by steel pontoons, according to Explorer Advisor Mike Thoele, of the news staff of the Bluffton News-Banner.

The twin outboard motors are being replaced by an inboard power plant, and paddle wheels. And, Thoele said, he hopes to add an LP-gas refrigerator to the galley equipment, which already consists of a full-sized LP-gas kitchen range, including an oven. "Chief" of the galley was Bob Spaulding, a former Navy quartermaster and veteran camp cook, and one of the four adult leaders aboard the Scimitar. The Scimitar, after its "maiden cruise" on the quarry pond, was disassembled and trucked to Marion, Indiana, where it was launched on the Ohio. Next year, said Thoele, it is planned to truck the raft to the Ohio river at Evansville, Indiana. The LP-gas equipment was furnished by the Blue Flame Gas Corporation of Bluffton, which also trucked the Scouts' vessel from Bluffton to Marion, and from Tiptonville back home. - A There is no specific known medical management which alters the natural unpredictable course of the disease which is one of worsening, followed by periods of improvement achieving a plateau where no change takes place. Robbery, Assault Charges Filed Saturday

A 27 year old Negro and ex-convict, Billy Charles Wood, of Ropes is in Hockley County Jail charged with robbery and rape of Mrs. Flossie Peterson of Ropes about 1:30 a. m. Saturday. Mrs. Peterson told Sheriff Weir Clem and Marshall Neal Fox she was awakened about 1:30 Saturday morning when an intruder clamped his hand over her mouth and throat and growled, "If you scream I'll kill you." After finding the telephone dead from wires being cut. Mrs. Peterson managed to drive her car to her daughters home in Ropes, and Marshall Fox and Sheriff Clem were called. An ex-convict from Huntsville State Prison, born at Crockett, the 170 pound, 5 foot 11 inch suspect is currently under bond for burglary and matches that had been struck and thrown down in the darkness. By flashlight they could see clear tracks all around the house, but lost them in the darkness. Resuming their investigation after daylight, boot tracks were clearly visible traveling to the north. Walking about a quarter of a mile, the officers noticed a bit of yellow polka dot material protruding from a shallow hole that had been covered with dirt. Mrs. Peterson had earlier described such a piece of material that had covered the attacker's face and head. Woods was taken before District Attorney E. W. Boedeker Saturday and bond was set at \$5,000.

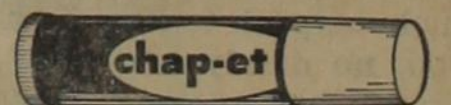

A Few Hints For Christmas Mailing

Christmas stamps are now on sale at the Post Office for use on your Christmas cards and letters. Pad your gifts securely so there is no rattling and there is sufficient support for other packages. The sack carrying your glass cup may have two or three bowling balls in parcels riding on top of it.

Here are a few ideas about how Christmas can be made merrier:

Visit the Post Office while the crowds are small.

Buy all the extra stamps you'll need.

Stock up on enough boxes, tape, stuffing, string and wrapping paper to see that your packages are wrapped solidly and well.

The time of mailing is especially important (the earlier the better).

Always write or print addresses carefully and use zip code in both return and mailing addresses.

Postage on Christmas cards this year is 6c sealed or unsealed. It will help a lot if you will seal your envelopes and put your return on them. This will enable the cards to be returned if they cannot be delivered.

Wrap your packages neatly and well.

A loose piece of wrapping

may get caught and ripped. There is no rattling and there is sufficient support for other packages. The sack carrying your glass cup may have two or three bowling balls in parcels riding on top of it.

A card or piece of paper inside the package carrying your name and address and that of the person to whom the parcel is addressed will insure delivery in case the wrapping comes loose.

A list of the contents will help postal "re-wrap" clerks in the event your package is poorly wrapped and bursts.

Please place the address and return address on only ONE side of the parcel. Postal employees who are working at top speed to meet transportation connections for mail do not have time to check other sides. They assume that postage is due if the address side is without stamps.

The important thing is to MAIL EARLY; also mail early in the day to avoid congestion at closing time.

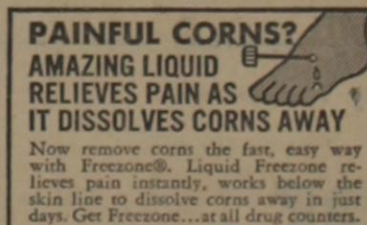
