Bread In The Wilderness

God's eternal Word of meaning for our lives always has a way of shining through in the familiar Bible stories of the Old Testament. Since childhood, we have heard the story of how God fed the wandering Hebrews in the wilderness with manna from heaven. Regardless of how we wish to interpret this story or of what we wish to believe about it, the story of the manna is little more than an interesting miracle story unless we dare to ask the crucial question which must be asked of every Biblical text: What does this text mean for my life in today's world? It is one thing to know what the Bible says; it is quite another matter to know what it means.

Seeking not to offend anyone's doctrinal views, let me suggest three ways in which this ancient story of the manna speaks to us anew in this day: First, the text points to the truth that there is bread in the wilderness. In Biblical terms, the wilderness is always a symbol for the stage on which the drama of human life is played out. Life is a journey through a wilderness of suffering, disappointment, failure, loneliness, and death. All of us know the power of these forces as did the Hebrews in their trek through the wilderness. Life is an arena of temptation. We know this force as did Jesus in the wilderness of temptation. Faced with a lifetime in such a wilderness, one could easily develop an extremely pessimistic view of human existence. But God's Word to us is this: There is bread in the wilderness! Bread is the Biblical symbol of full and meaningful life. God has equipped us through trust in Him not only to endure our journey through the wilderness but also to find it full of joy and meaning.

Second, the bread in the wilderness is bread to meet our needs. In Exodus 16:18, the text of the manna story says, "He that gathered much had nothing over, and he that gathered little had no lack." God does not come to his people on the basis of our estimates of our needs or on the basis of our desires. We cannot tune God in on our terms; God comes to us on His terms; He comes to us on the basis of His estimate of our needs. In other words, the bread, the life we receive in the wilderness is life on the terms God wishes to grant it, not always as we would wish to have it. Jesus taught that God 'knows what you need before you ask him' (Matthew 6:3). Sometimes our prayers sound like schedules for God to follow in meeting the needs we lay before Him. The manna story teaches the uselessness of such praying. He knows our needs. He will meet them, and we shall have no lack nor anything left over.

And, third, the bread in the wilderness is daily bread. Immediately after Jesus taught his disciples that God knows our needs before we ask, he taught them to pray: "Give us this day our daily bread." The Hebrews in the wilderness learned the hard way that the manna was daily bread. Although Moses warned them not to gather additional amounts for the following day, some did and found that it rotted and was not fit to eat. Tomorrow, today's bread will be yesterday's bread and there fore not adequate for the needs and demands of life in the present. The bread of the past always becomes stale. Yet we so often attempt to

retreat into the past. The Hebrews tried to return to Egypt when they got hungry in the wilderness, but God gave them manna on that day. Our Biblical faith in both Testaments is insistent upon the fact that all there is to life is today. "Today is the day of salvation" (I Cor. 6:2). "This is the day the Lord has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it" (Psalms 118:24). There is no life in the past; there is no guarantee of the future; but God has given us bread for living today in the wilderness, bread to meet the needs of today. Jesus said, "I am the bread of life...." (John 6:35)
