### WOLFORTH STATE BANK HAD BIG OPENING

The Wolforth State Bank had their formal opening of their new building Sunday, January 20, 1963. Area residents were invited to attend Open House between the hours of 2 and 5 P.M.

The new brick building, located across from Frenship High School, contains approximately 3500 square feet of floor space. Total cost of the building, furniture and fixtures will be about \$60,000. The spacious lobby features walnut panelling, terrazo floor, and accoustical ceiling. The walnut panelling extends into the president's office, which is draped and carpeted. A community room at the front of the building has a kitchenette, four tables and 16 chairs, providing a place for club meetings and other community gatherings. The complete banking facilities include a drive-in window, four teller windows, safety deposit boxes, and off-street parking. Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation insures all deposits up to \$10,000.

The Wolforth State Bank received its charter on September 6, 1962, and opened for business in temporary headquarters on last September 11th, with a capital structure totalling \$200,000. Despite the late cotton crop, the bank showed \$766,692.53 on deposit on December 31, 1962.

Officers of the bank are Wallace Barnett, President; R. G. Stapleton, Inactive Vice President; and Hugh L. Lackey, Cashier. Bank Directors include Wallace Barnett, Estes Burgamy, Herman Bush, Myles L. Collins, G. A. Edwards, Jr., Hugh L. Lackey, James S. Moore, Don Snowden, and R. G. Stapleton. James S. Moore is Board Chairman.

### Mrs. Bob Burks Funeral Service Held Last Friday

In His infinite wisdom God has seen fit to call home our only sister, Mrs. Afton DeLores Morris-Burks, 58, who passed away Wednesday night in a hospital in Abilene. Death came as a climax to years of suffering and invalidism.

Funeral services were held from the Church of the Nazarene in Ropesville with the pastor, Rev. Bill Johnson, officiating, assisted by Rev. Jesse Young, pastor of the Ropes Methodist Church. Interment was in Ropes Cemetery beside her mother.

She was a member of the Baptist Church. At the services Mrs. Betty Whitehead, accompanied by her mother at the piano, sang one special. A. C. Balch of Big Spring sang two songs which had been requested by Mrs. Burks.

Many friends of another day attended and others called by phone who were not able to attend—the telephone ringing almost constantly all day Thursday with out of town calls. She was remembered by these folks not only as a friend but also as a great musician. While the piano was her specialty she played and taught all instruments, both stringed, reed and brass until her health failed. In O'Donnell she trained a prize winning band and orchestra: in McAdoo she taught pupils who are now outstanding musicians; in Sudan she is remembered for her music; and in Shallowater many remembered and loved her.

She was born in Stephenville, Texas, the daughter of William Henry and Florence Doris Morris. A sister-in-law said to me, "I believe she was the bravest woman I've ever known." Others spoke of her kindnesses to them—all had pleasant memories of her.

One of the songs she selected for her funeral was, "The End of a Perfect Day", but was not sung because Ace Balch could not find a copy of it. Even through the haze of suffering which dogged her footsteps almost

since she was an adult, she could say: "It is the end of a perfect day. Near the end of a journey, too, When the sun goes down in a flaming ray And dear friends must part." My wife said to me, "There will never be another like her." And, perhaps, there never will be. She came from a family spotted with great musicians, she was high strung and nervous, yet irritation seldom showed. Even in her time of greatest suffering she was able to smile and say: "I feel very well." Her death was not unexpected — we had been warned years back that she would live but a short time—but outlived the predictions of physicians.

In 1938 she was married to Robert S. Burks of McAdoo, and to this union one child was born, Bobby, who is now almost eighteen years of age. That we change but never die is a thought we love to entertain—though the path of life is beset with clouds and rain there is joy to offset the strain—Death touches us all, even the thistles and the grain, those in health and the halt and the lame—there is a time to laugh and a time to weep and a time to die, but when we die we but gain.

It is these thoughts that make it possible for living man to bear the sorrow of the passing of a loved one. We try to see this, though our eyes are blinded by tears—standing beside an open grave everything seems so final—the beloved face so cold and still, the eyes closed forever, yet the spirit has gone back to the God who gave it. We can remember them in life—but to remember them in death would unseat the mind and unhinge the reason. As we write this we remember the promise of eternal life—life beyond the grave where a benevolent God awaits us—it is grief, in these moments of grief, which we try to remember.

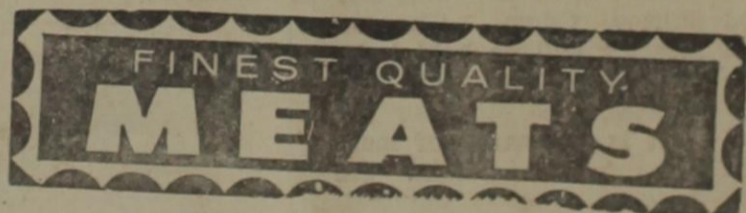

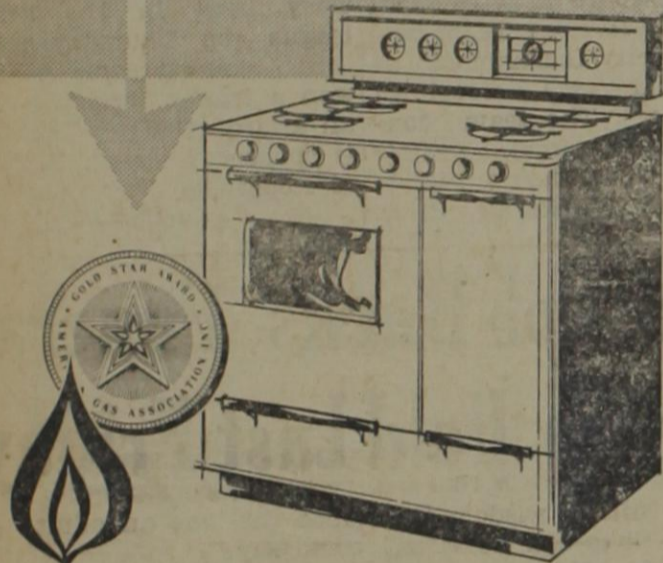

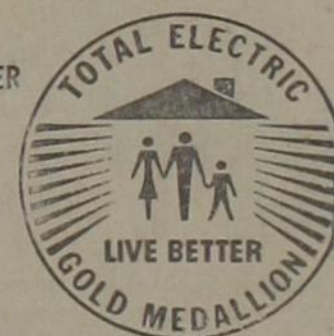

The president said he already has in hand petitions bearing the necessary 250 signatures requesting the election, and he added that other petitions still are in circulation throughout the junior college district.

Included in the signers are residents of all district communities.

Meanwhile, the Levelland chapter of American Association of University Women of-

ficially went on record Saturday as favoring the bond vote.

Regents have indicated they favor Feb. 16 as date of the election.

If the issue carries, a five-cent increase in the bond retirement rate will become effective. The funds would be used to construct a new science building and add facilities to other existing buildings to accommodate 750 students by 1967.

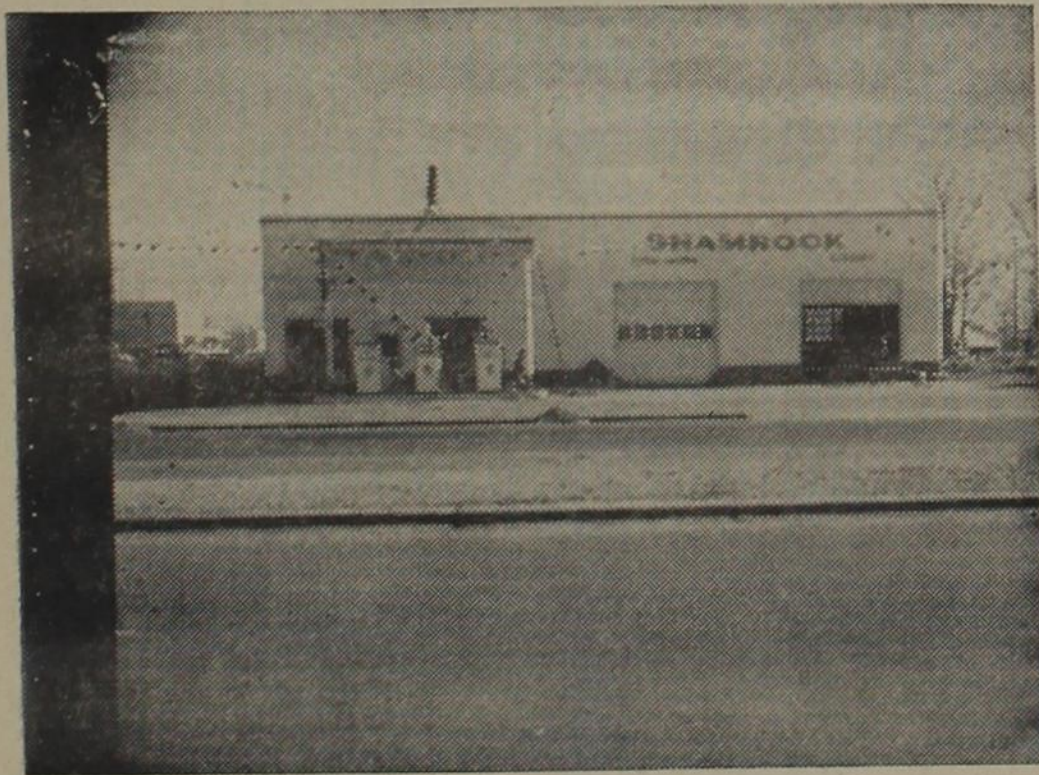

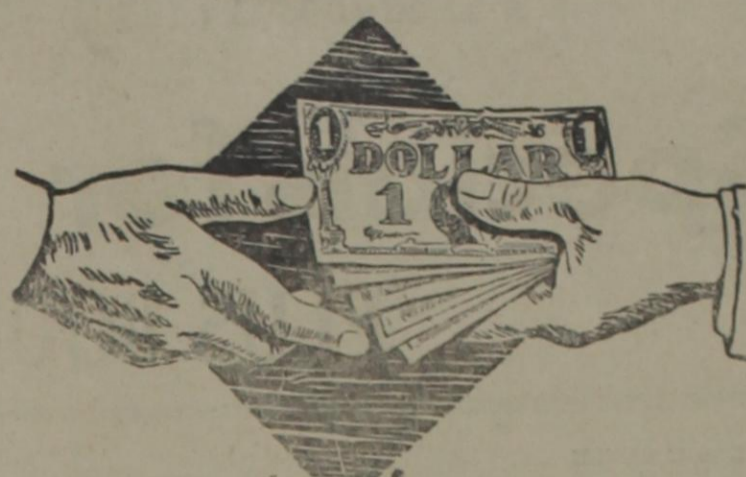
