## FAMILY PROBLEMS

Have you ever known a family so large that one member had difficulty remembering the names of all the others? A lady in a church I once served had ten children, twenty-three grandchildren, forty-two great grandchildren, and seventeen great-great grandchildren. She spent countless hours trying to keep up with all these direct descendants, not to mention the many aunts and uncles and cousins and so on. She used to worry because she could not keep up with their welfare. Though they were her closest living relatives, she often did not know when they were sick or in need.

All of us live in a family just that large, and we too have difficulty keeping in perspective the needs of our many relatives. Our family is the human family. In 1960, the number in our family, the population of the world, reached the three billion mark and has been increasing that time by over fifty million a year. How do we keep up with all our family needs? Many of us believe in the brotherhood of man under the Fatherhood of God. All of us realize man's dependence upon man and each man's need of every other man. But when we begin to talk about the entire human family, the tremendous numbers seem to impersonal for real concern. Yet we know that some of our brothers are hungry, some are oppressed, some are forgotten. They need us.

At a study session on the problem of poverty, one of the discussion leaders introduced the following scheme for keeping up with our family. Hoping not to violate any copyright laws, I pass it on for your thoughtful consideration: "If the world were a thousand people, there would be 60 Americans and 940 people in the rest of the world. The 60 Americans would receive one half of the world's total income. There would be 330 Christians, 100 of them Protestants, and 670 non-Christians. 80 would be members of the Communist Party; 370 would live under Communist influence. 500 would never have heard of Jesus Christ but would have heard of Karl Marx, and vice versa. 260 would be well off, including Americans, West Europeans, Africans, and South Americans; 740 others would be poor, ignorant, hungry, and sick. 60 would be well fed while 940 would be undernourished. 303 would be whites; 697 would be non-whites. The 60 Americans would spend \$850.00 a year for military purposes and only \$4.00 a year for the sharing of their religious faith."

Our Biblical faith teaches in both Testaments that our allegiance to the head of the human family is best carried out when our responsibility to members of the family is met. "No man has ever seen God; if we love one another, God abides in us and His love is perfected in us" (1 John 4:12). Getting to know our family better gives us a deeper understanding of our responsibility to the head of the family and of our obligations in the family.

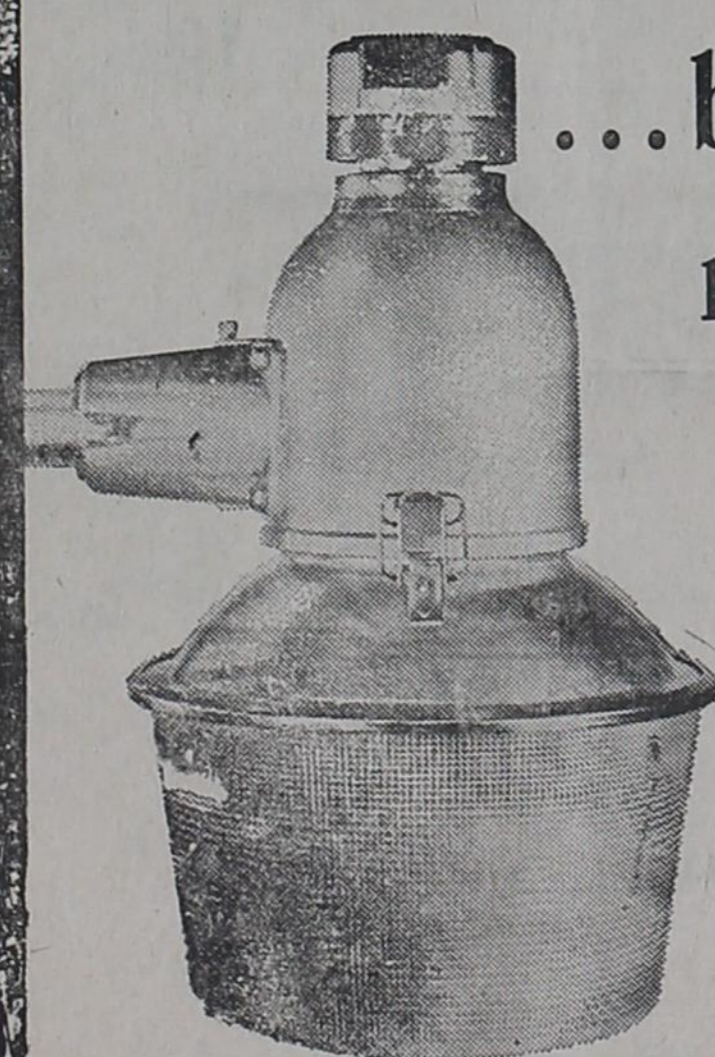
