DEAN'S HONOR LIST SPRING SEMESTER 1964 SOUTH PLAINS COLLEGE

To be eligible for the Dean's Honor List at South Plains College a student must be a full-time student enrolled in at least 15 semester hours of college work and attain a grade point ratio of 3.25 or more. Grade points are calculated as follows: A to be rated 4 points for each semester hour; a grade of B rated 3 points for each semester hour; a grade of C rated 2 points for each semester hour; a grade of D rated 1 point for each semester hour. The point score is computed by dividing the total number of semester hour points by the number of semester hours enrolled in by the student.

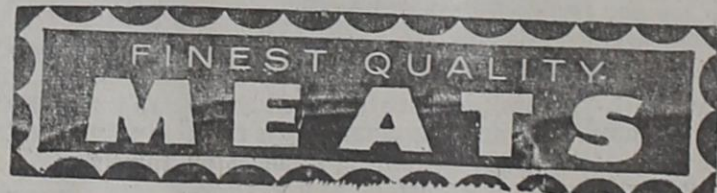

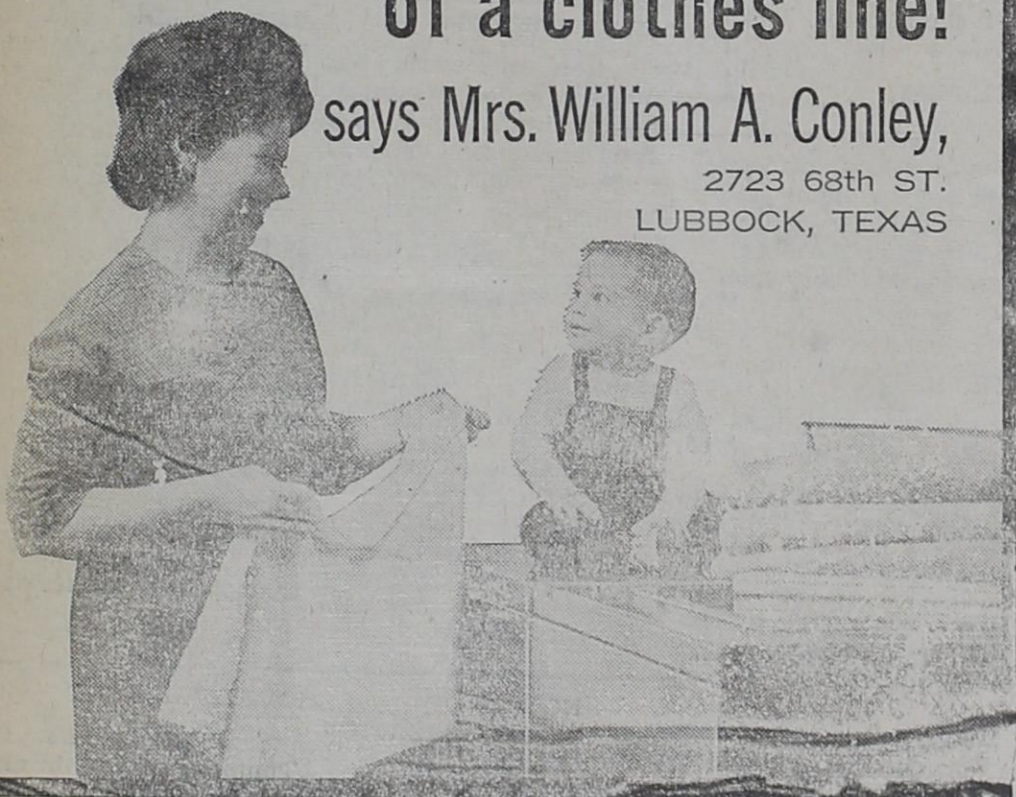

CLINIC TO BE CONDUCTED IN LUBBOCK JULY 9

A clinic for the examination of cerebral palsied patients will be conducted from 8:30 A.M. to 12 noon Thursday, July 9th, at the Lubbock Cerebral Palsy Treatment Center, 3502 Avenue N. Parents are requested to

bring children to the Treatment Center at least a week before the clinic for a case history to be taken. The Treatment Center is open on Monday through Friday from 8:30 A.M. to 12:00 and 1 to 5 P.M. Although treatment of the cerebral palsied can be started at any age, it is most effective if started in the first few months of life.

Present to examine patients in the July 9th clinic will be a neuropsychiatrist, two orthopedists, an eye, ear, nose and throat specialist and a pediatrician.

The Treatment Center is open to any cerebral palsied child. To date cases have come from nine states.

TEXAS DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC SAFETY

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated ten accidents on rural highways in Hockley County during the month of May, according to Sergeant A. E. Roberts, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These wrecks accounted for eight persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$8,140.00.

The rural accident summary for Hockley County from January through May of 1964 shows a total of 36 crashes resulting in one person killed, 26 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$37,940.00.

The Sergeant expressed serious concern over the increase in fatal motor traffic accidents and deaths throughout the state.

"For the first five months of 1964, 1025 persons have been injured in traffic accidents, compared to 871 for the same period of 1963," the Sergeant stated. "This 18 per cent increase is very alarming and when you

realize our heavy volume traffic months are still ahead, we must anticipate increasing problems in the accident picture. There is an increase in all types of accidents throughout the state and it is something that merits our greatest concern," he said.

"The driving public must assist in the reduction of this trend if we are to turn it downward. Otherwise our death count at the end of the year will far exceed the record number of 2,729 deaths in Texas traffic during 1963. If you are driving, your life literally is in your own hands, so won't you help yourself and others by resolving not to become one of our statistics?" the Sergeant asked.

The Fourth Reunion of the Pioneer family of Texas, whose forefathers immigrated from Amsterdam, Holland, and settled in New York in the year 1640, and later removed to Elizabethtown, New Jersey (currently Elizabeth, N. The descendants of the immigrant John Winans (and variant spelling) and Susannah Melyn of Staten Island are scattered all over America. With the push westward about 1825, some of the descendants settled in Carrollton, Green County, Ill., and then in 1835 came to Bastrop, Texas. Genealogical data is being collected and compiled for our heritage. Any information unknown to us will be greatly appreciated. No reservations will be necessary for attendance but each family is asked to bring a basket lunch which will be

served buffet style. Iced tea and coffee will be furnished on the grounds.
