Dry, Severe Weather Prevails

Change In Mail Service

Mrs. Otto Sims, postmistress, announced Tuesday that there is a change in the mail service serving Ropes proper and the route.

For awhile, mail came in twice a day, but that has been changed, and there is now only one mail truck in Ropes per day. This mail

comes very early, and is up by 8:30 a.m., and the rural carrier leaves at approximately 8:30 each morning.

So, if you get your mail out of the post office in the morning, there will be no more for that day, and rural mail will usually be all delivered by shortly after noon.

Severe weather over the Plains is becoming more and more common. Tuesday was another one of "those" days—and yet it remains as dry as the Mojave desert.

We saw a giant whirlwind Tuesday that passed from the northeast to the southwest. We noted that it had pieces of wood and other debris in the whirling dust. It came behind the Nazarene Church and turned south to the John Kimberlin home. Mrs. Phillip Kimberlin reported that at that place they lost shingles off their house, and the rear window was knocked out of a station wagon parked in back of their home.

The giant mass of sand then turned southeast and came through our back yard and north of our residence. Here it threw a garden hoe up into a tree, twisted a few branches off and scattered wood all over the yard and into the street.

This occurred about five minutes before the heavy sand hit Ropes from the east. When this hit, you could not see across the street.

Winds moved contrary to all rules on Tuesday when the tornado that hit close to Welch moved southwest to Andrews. We think this should prove tornados are entirely unpredictable, and will move any direction they choose, although, of course, usual movement is to the northeast.

AGAINST OTHERS

Nothing is so certain in this life as anger. Sometime, almost daily, we find situations in which anger rises up in us. And, no one is excluded from our anger—children, parents, friends, neighbors, ourselves.

Anger is dangerous for Christian people because it separates men one from another and pits them against one another. The Christian faith is aimed at breaking down the bonds that separate men from each other. Anger creates bonds that separate us one from another. Thus how do we handle our anger against others?

First, let us become conscious of our own faults. Nothing so melts our own anger as the realization that we too, the angry ones, also have a sin of our own.

Perhaps all husbands and wives have experienced this. Suppose that one, the husband or the wife, nags at the other because the other is always late. Then one day when one mate is angry at the other for being late, the one who is late says, "Well, don't you remember? You were late yesterday." Nothing so melts our own anger as our consciousness that we too have sin on our side.

This is one of the constant focal points of Jesus's preaching. How can you be angry at your brother for his faults, when you too have faults? Maybe your faults are not the same as his, but they are faults nevertheless.

Anger, which separates us one from another, can be conquered when we become conscious of our own sins.

Secondly, there is a misconception about that people cannot help their anger. People say, "I can't help it. They make me angry and so I treat them cruelly."

Now a person who is not a member of the Jewish faith or of the Christian faith might be able to say this. But, the Old Testament and the New Testament speak about man's freedom. God has created us as free men and women. We can choose to love or to curse God. The choice is ours. The same is true with our anger. We can choose to allow ourselves to become angry. Or, we can choose to do battle with our anger and keep ourselves from becoming so angry. For the Jew and the Christian, who adhere to the Old and New Testaments, God has created men free and therefore men can control themselves and their anger. It is man's choice as to whether or not he gets angry.

Anger sets us against others. Christians are those who are living in harmony with one another. And the demand First Peter put to his readers is the same demand upon us today:

...all of you, have unity of spirit, sympathy, love of the brethren, a tender heart and a humble mind. (I Peter 3:8)

Word has just been received by the Local Navy Reserve Training Center that young men, who are still Juniors and Seniors in High School may apply for appointment to the U. S. Naval Academy if they enlist in the Naval Reserve on or before July 1, 1965.

These are the three dates the high school students should remember:

JULY 1, 1965 - Must be a member of the Naval Reserve before this date to be eligible to enter next years class in July, 1966.

OCTOBER 1, 1965 - Must complete your application by this date and submit it via your commanding officer to the Chief of Naval Personnel.

MARCH, 1966 - Scholastic exams for the Naval Academy consisting of tests of the college entrance examination board will be conducted.

To qualify you must be a U. S. citizen. Must be not less than 17 and not more than 22 years of age on July 1 of the year in which you enter the Academy. Must not be married and never have been married. Must be a member of the Naval Reserve Unit in good standing and recommended by your Commanding Officer. SANTA FE NEWS

A major change representing a simplified and expanded arrangement to pay commission to travel agents has been announced by Santa Fe Railway. Effective September

1, 1965, the road will allow commissions on all regular tickets routed via Santa Fe. Previously commissions were allowed only when all-expense features, such as hotel, sight seeing, etc., were part of a package that included the rail fare.
