Fix-It-Festival Set for Next Thursday, the 13th

The programs presented will be aimed at beating the high cost of home maintenance and repairs by showing us how to do them ourselves. Programs will be conducted beginning at 9:30 a.m., 2 p.m. and 7 p.m. The registration fee is \$2.00.

The Fix-ItFestival is sponsored by the Lubbock County Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System.

Life Saving Course is Scheduled to Begin Monday at South Plains College

A senior life-saving course will begin Monday, March 10, at South Plains College.

The class will meet from 6 to 9 p.m. Monday through Friday for two weeks. Classes will be in the SPC Natatorium. Cost is \$10 for SPC students and \$15 for all others.

Interested persons should be 15 years of age or older and have completed the ninth grade. Eligibility requirements for the course include the following:

1) performing standing front dive in reasonably good form.

2) swimming 440 yards continuously, demonstrating some ability in using a stroke on the front (hand over hand), a side stroke utilizing a scissor kick and a stroke done on the back using an inverted scissor or breast stroke kick.

3) diving from surface to minimum depth of six feet an swimming 15 feet underwater.

4) treading water one minute with hands beneath the surface for use as auxiliary supports.

In order to qualify for a certificate, each student must satisfactorily complete all the skills and knowledge requirements in the course content. An outline of requirements will be given at the first class meeting.

Levelland Boxing Club Fighters Capture Regional Championships

Four Levelland Boxing Club fighters captured regional boxing championships last weekend and won the right to compete March 6-10 in the Texas Golden Gloves championships at Fort Worth.

They were Levelland's only contestants in the open division of the Lubbock regionals, and all four won. That accounted for almost half of the nine slots decided.

Mark Martin won 2nd round TKO over Efren Duran of Lubbock in the 119-pound classification.

Mark Murphey decisioned Raymond Amalla of Lubbock in the 139-pound bracket.

Truett Murphey decisioned Bob Waters of Lubbock in the 147-pound class.

And Joe Martin won by default when Steve Manahan of Lubbock decided against appearing for his 175-pound bout.

It will be the second trip to the state tournament for Truett Murphey and Mark Martin.

Mark went to the state tournament last year in his first year to box. Murphey went in 1972.

"Truett looked good but lost a close decision at Fort Worth. But that was three years ago," team coach T.J. Watt said. "Truett laid out of boxing a couple of years,



and it has been awful hard for him to get back in shape and sharp again. But he's capable, in good shape, of really doing good."

Mark Martin lost his second bout last year at the state tournament, but it was to the fighter who went on to win the state championship. Mark Martin's 119-pound class may very well be the toughest class at State this year. Mike Ayalla will be in this class. He has just returned from a boxing tour of Europe, boxing with the Pan-American team. Mike won state three times, the National Golden Gloves and National A.A.U. twice. He was selected for the 1972 Olympics, chosen for the A.A.U., Pan-American boxing teams.

Mark will have to win over Mike Ayalla and win over the present State Champion, Tommy Young. If anyone can do it, Mark Martin can.

Mark Murphey has been fighting all year in the high school division, but switched to the open division just before the regional tournament.

"We just finally talked him into it," Watt said. Mark then lost some weight to get into the 139-pound class and went to Lubbock, where he won.

"You don't want to go to state any heavier than you have to be," Watt said. "Everybody is trying to fight in the lowest category they can."

Joe Martin has come down with a light case of pneumonia, this will hurt his chances at State. Joe has been fighting two weight divisions heavier than he should.



SUMMARY

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION APRIL 22, 1975

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. No. 3)

Repealing Sections 48a, 48b, 51e, and 51f of Article III and Sections 62 and 63 of Article XVI of the Texas Constitution, Article XVI of the Texas Constitution is

amended to: Provide for the revision and consolidation of provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and to provide that all general laws that have established retirement systems and optional retirement programs for public employees and officers in effect at the time of the adoption of this constitutional amendment will remain in effect, subject to the general powers of the

Legislature.

Provide that the amount a participating officer or employee contributes to the employee retirement system or the teacher retirement system shall be established by the Legislature but may not be less than 6% of current compensation and providing further that the amount contributed by the state may not be less than 6 nor more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to participating persons, except that in an emergency, as determined by the Governor, the Legislature may contribute more than 10% of the aggregate compensation paid to persons participating in state retirement systems.

Provide that the Legislature shall provide for local retirement systems created by any city or county for its officers and employees and shall further provide for a state-wide system of benefits for officers and employees of counties or other political subdivsions of the State which may voluntarily participate, and

to further provide that a state-wide system of benefits shall be provided for officers and employees of cities which may voluntarily participate.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment revising and consolidating provisions relating to state and local retirement systems and programs and providing for a maximum state contribution to state systems of 10 percent of the aggregate compensation paid to individuals."

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. No. 6)

Amending Article III, Section 24 of the Texas Constitution to:

Provide an increase in salary for members of the Legislature from \$400 per month to \$600 per month.

Provide an increase in the per diem rate for members of the Legislature from \$12 to \$30 for each day during each Regular and Special Session of the Legislature.

Provide an increase in the transportation allowance for members from \$.10 per mile to the rate prescribed by law for employees of the State of Texas.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

"The constitutional amendment setting the salaries of members of the legislature at \$600 per month and setting a per diem of \$30 per day during legislative sessions and a mileage allowance at the same rate provided by law for state employees."
