Ropesville Homecoming is Friday Night

Dedication Set at Plains Baptist Assembly Sunday, October 28th



The recently constructed dining/conference hall at Plains Baptist Assembly near Floydada will be dedicated at 2 p.m. Sunday, October 28.

The Rev. Mr. Johnny Cartrite, pastor at First Baptist Church, Slaton, will deliver the dedicatory address on the covered porch of the building. Dr. Strauss Atkinson, Superintendent of Missions for the Caprock-Plains Area, will lead the dedication prayer. Mr. J.D. McPhaul of Lubbock, and the Rev. Mr. Doyle Holmes, Area Superintendent of Lubbock Baptist Association, will participate in the ribbon cutting ceremony.

The Women's Missionary Unions of the Lubbock Area and the Caprock-Plains Area will serve refreshments in the new dining hall from 2 to 4 p.m. Mr. Ron Lowry, Minister of Music, First Baptist Church, Lubbock, and Mr. Ed Wittner, Minister of Music, First Baptist Church, Plainview, will be in charge of music during the two hours of "open house".

The new facility valued at more

than \$125,000 has been built by donations of materials, labor and finances. At the dedication time, it will be completed and debt-free. The large spacious kitchen is complemented by a dining space that will seat more than 400. A six foot, cut-stoned face fireplace was given by the deacons of Highland Baptist Church, Lubbock, as a memorial to Sam Ogle, Sr. who served as a deacon of Highland Baptist Church until his death in January of this year. The building also includes two ceramic tiled restrooms, suspended ceiling, glass across the front and the end to provide a view of the canyon, and tiled floors.

The Woman's Missionary Unions of the two Areas furnished new chairs and tables, and Mrs. J.D. McPhaul of Lubbock has given new stainless steel eating utensils. Mr. J.D. McPhaul, Associational Brotherhood Director of the Lubbock Area, led in the construction of the facility.

A new piano has been donated by the adult choirs of the churches. The public is invited to attend.

The Wind From The North
Is Strong and Proud
And He Pounds On My Door

November, ninth month of the old Roman calendar, is the birthday month of five U.S. Presidents and the month in which President John Kennedy was assassinated (the 22nd in 1963). It's also the month in which the Allies invaded North Africa (the 7th, 1942) in World War II and in which World War I ended in 1918 (November 11th).

The 2nd is the birthday anniversary of both James Polk, 11th President, and Warren Harding, 29th President. Harding, a relatively recent President, was born in Morrow County, Ohio, in 1865, the oldest of eight children. He was first a newspaper man, buying a Marion, Ohio, weekly for \$300. At his death it was a daily and a valuable property.

He served in the state legislature and as Lieutenant Governor and was then defeated in a gubernatorial race. He nominated William Taft at the Republican convention in 1912 he was nominated by the Republicans and elected President. However, he failed to survive his term, dying after a trip to Alaska, which he had promised to make in his campaign, in 1923.

On the 6th, in 1789, the Pope appointed the first American Catholic bishop, John Carroll of Maryland. At that time there were no Catholic schools in the United States and Carroll was educated in France and consecrated bishop in England.

On the 15th, in 1777, a committee of the Continental Congress which had adopted the Declaration of Independence, reported out the draft of the Articles of Confederation, the first Constitution of the new nation; it provided for a perpetual union. This draft was changed, in 1787, and there was controversy until the Civil War whether or not States were in a perpetual union under terms of the 1787 Constitution.

James Abram Garfield, 20th President, was born in Cayahoga County, Ohio, on the 19th in 1831, descended from Massachusetts ancestors. He was elected President as a Republican in 1880, and was assassinated in 1881.

Franklin Pierce (pronounced purse), 14th U.S. President, was born on the 23rd in 1804, at Hillsborough, N.H., and served his state in various capacities, resigning a U.S. Senate seat because the pay was insufficient. He was nominated and elected as a Democrat in 1852. He attempted to annex Cuba, tried to pacify North and South, but was not renominated by his party. He became very critical of Lincoln during the Civil War.

Zachary Taylor, 12th U.S. President, was born in Orange County, Virginia, on the 24th in 1784, preceded Pierce as President. He was a military hero in the Mexican war, son of a Revolutionary War officer of Virginia, grew up in Louisville, Kentucky (then Virginia), and won a great victory over the Seminole Indians in Florida, dying in office in 1850.

Thanksgiving, a truly American observance, falls on the 22nd this year.

Austin, Tex.—Future development of major Texas water projects will come to a halt unless new standards laid down by the National Water Resources Council are reversed, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby says.

Hobby, joined by State Sen. Max Sherman of Amarillo, and serving as spokesman for four Texas water advisory councils, urged President Nixon and Texas congressmen to alter the regulations.

"Unless this policy is reversed," said Hobby, "Texas stands to be harmed very substantially."

The new principles and standards for planning water and related land resources are effective October 25.

While acknowledging that they have merit, Hobby said, they would destroy "the long-established partnership between federal and state governments for development of water resources. For all practical purposes, the thrust of 'principles and standards' wipes out the present-day mechanics for use and control of water, and falls short of practical substitutes."

A proposed "discount rate" feature, claimed Hobby, precludes federal participation in traditional development of water projects. The standards, he maintained, would further force impractical planning for projects on an in-state basis.

In the last five years, more than \$850 million have been invested by the local, state and federal governments in Texas water projects. About a fourth of that was federal money.

Refusal by the federal government to finance in the future "non-reimbursable features" such as fish and wildlife, recreational benefits and flood control provisions would ban parts of water projects that "tend to enhance the environment," said Hobby.

Double Header Convention Planned—Legislators are being polled on a proposal to split next year's constitutional convention into two sessions, one from January 8 to April 6 and the second after mid-June.

Sen. Bill Meier of Eules offered the suggestion, contending that the convention may be poorly attended just before May and June primary elections. Many legislators, who are delegates to the convention, will face opponents for re-election.

The recess, as proposed by Meier, would give legislators nearly a month to campaign before the May primary and another month before the June runoff.

Meanwhile, House Speaker Price Daniel Jr. urged lawmakers to set a 90-day flexible and extendable timetable for the convention and try to finish the job of rewriting the constitution by early April. He said legislators can do it by making use of the research of the Constitutional Revision Commission as a beginning point. Daniel said taxpayers will be saved nearly \$2 million if the convention winds up in 90 days rather than extending over the full 170 days allowed.

Courts Speak—A three judge federal court in Dallas adopted the so-called "Plan B" for Texas congressional reapportionment, which will require some readjustment of existing boundaries. Attorney General Hill said he has no plans for further appeals. Motions to intervene in the case were rejected as not "timely."

A Corpus Christi district judge set an October 26 hearing on a state motion to cite Roloff Evangelistic Enterprises for contempt in operating two youth care facilities without state licenses.

The Court of Criminal Appeals upheld four convictions, including two life sentences, of a Dallas man in the shooting of three.

A.G. Opinions—Counties may use federal revenue sharing funds to contract with private non-profit corporations to construct recreational facilities for the aged, Atty. Gen. John Hill held.

In other recent opinions, Hill concluded:
•There is no authority and no appropriation for paying state employees who resign or are dismissed (except in case of death) in lieu of accrued, unused vacation time.

•Status of an area from dry to wet can only be accomplished by a "for" vote on a legalizing proposition, and transformation of a wet area to a dry area can only be accomplished by an "against" vote on prohibitory proposition. A city prohibitory election which does not result in a vote unfavorable to the sale of alcoholic beverages has no effect at all upon the status of the city or any party.

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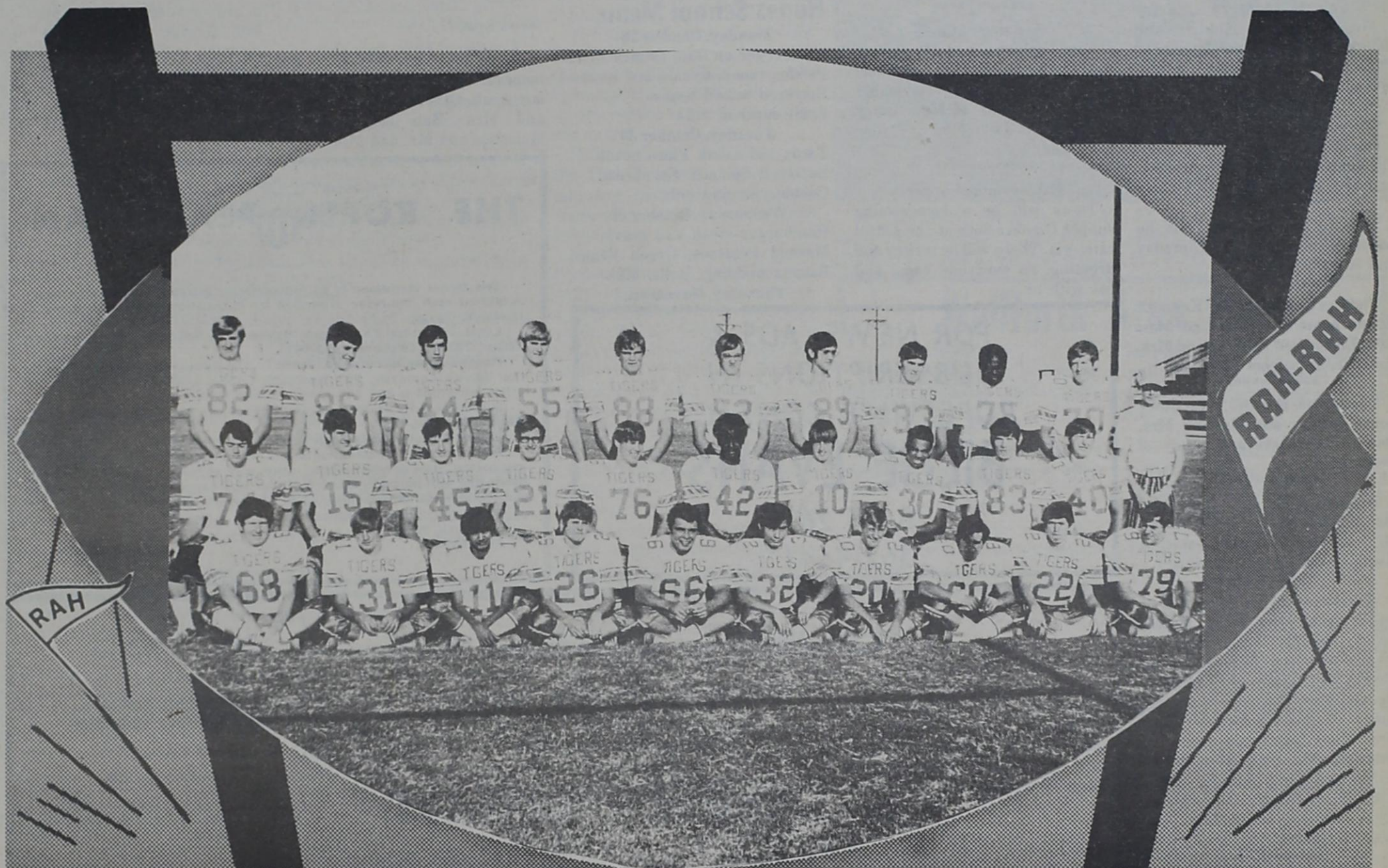

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the legislature, effective in January, 1975.

The constitutional amendment to include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.

4 AGAINST

It was a good world series, maybe not great, maybe not one of flawless fielding gems, maybe not one of overwhelming power ball hitting, but a good series.

In the end, the team that really should have won did win. Oakland had depth in quality pitching. It had better hitting power. It had better fielding. The New York Mets got to the classic primarily because they apparently wanted to get there more than the other clubs.

I'm still impressed with John Matlack, the southpaw rookie, more or less. The Met lefty has a smooth, deceptive delivery, and he throws hard. He was, I thought, more impressive than Tom Seaver.

But you can't ignore Catfish Hunter. When the chips were down, he came through, as did Darrell Knowles and Rollie Fingers.

In the end, though, Oakland power and Bert Campaneris proved to be the difference. That Campy is something else.

I see where Dick Williams is touted as the next manager of the Yankees, a team that usually stays within its own ranks. If so, they have great potential in Elston Howard, who could become the first black manager. Want to bet that he's overlooked?

As this is being written, the national rankings have not been made public for this week and I hope that Texas Tech, as much as it may deserve it, doesn't get in the top 20.

Getting in the top 20 has been the kiss of death for the Raiders. They promptly go out and lose, thereby destroying much of the good gained by national ranking. If they could go through the next five games without a loss, they'd get national rating, and winning the next five games is the most important thing.

Speaking of Dick Williams, as I was, the thought occurred to me during the series that, with all the exposure on camera that he got, I'd just as soon sit and look at a walrus.

Jim Carlen at his Monday press conference: on Arizona. "It was the best offensive game of the season for us. A word about the Arizona game. Until the fourth quarter, when Tech shut down the Wildcats, it sounded as though the defense was only half ready to play. But gosh, it deserved a letdown.

On the otherhand, the offense cranked up and did the best job of the year. Tech started moving with authority and, except for the first two possessions in the third quarter, moved steadily. But once again it was the "big play" defense that made the difference.

You can hardly go wrong with four fumble recoveries, a blocked punt, and an intercepted pass.

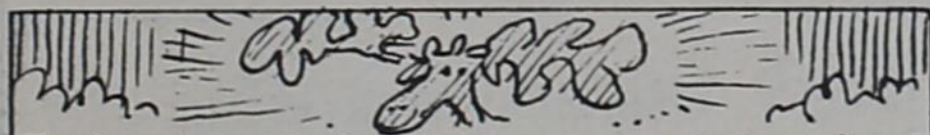

Fullback Larry Van Gilder got the first Frenship points on a two-yard smash at the line and Davie Booher added a pair of extra points.

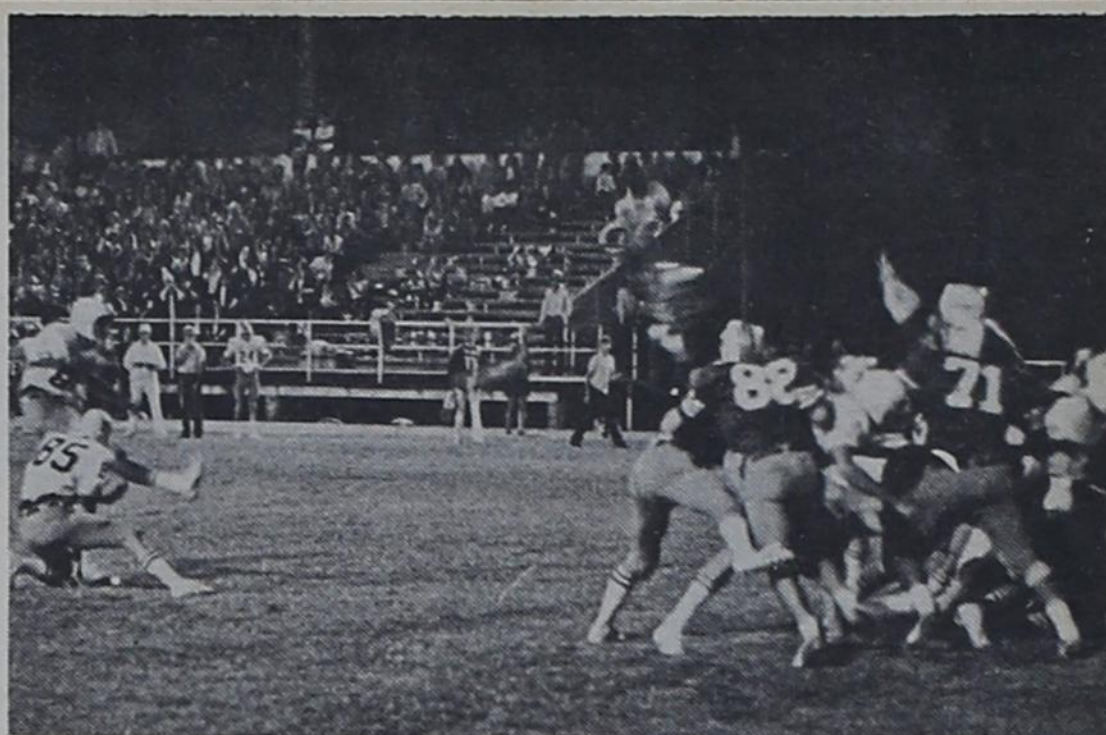

Pep Rally

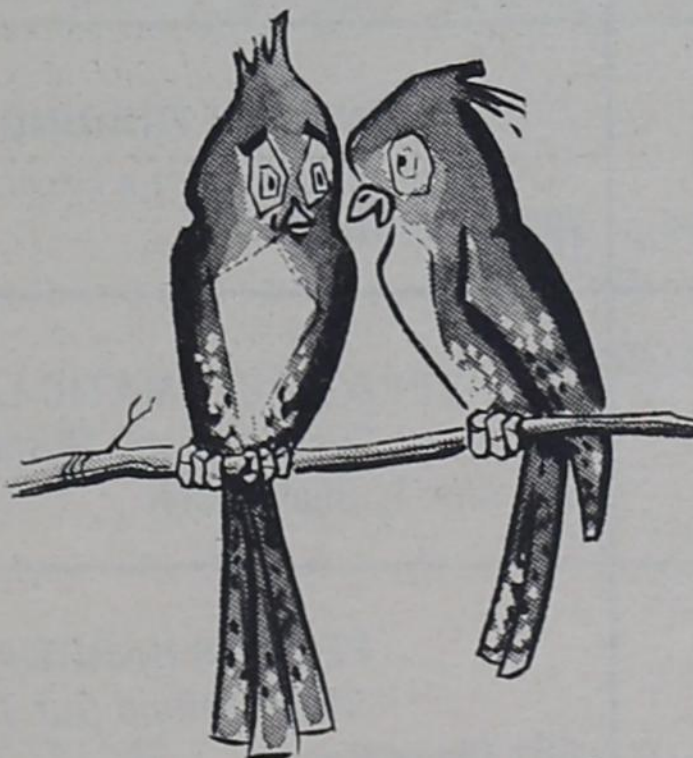

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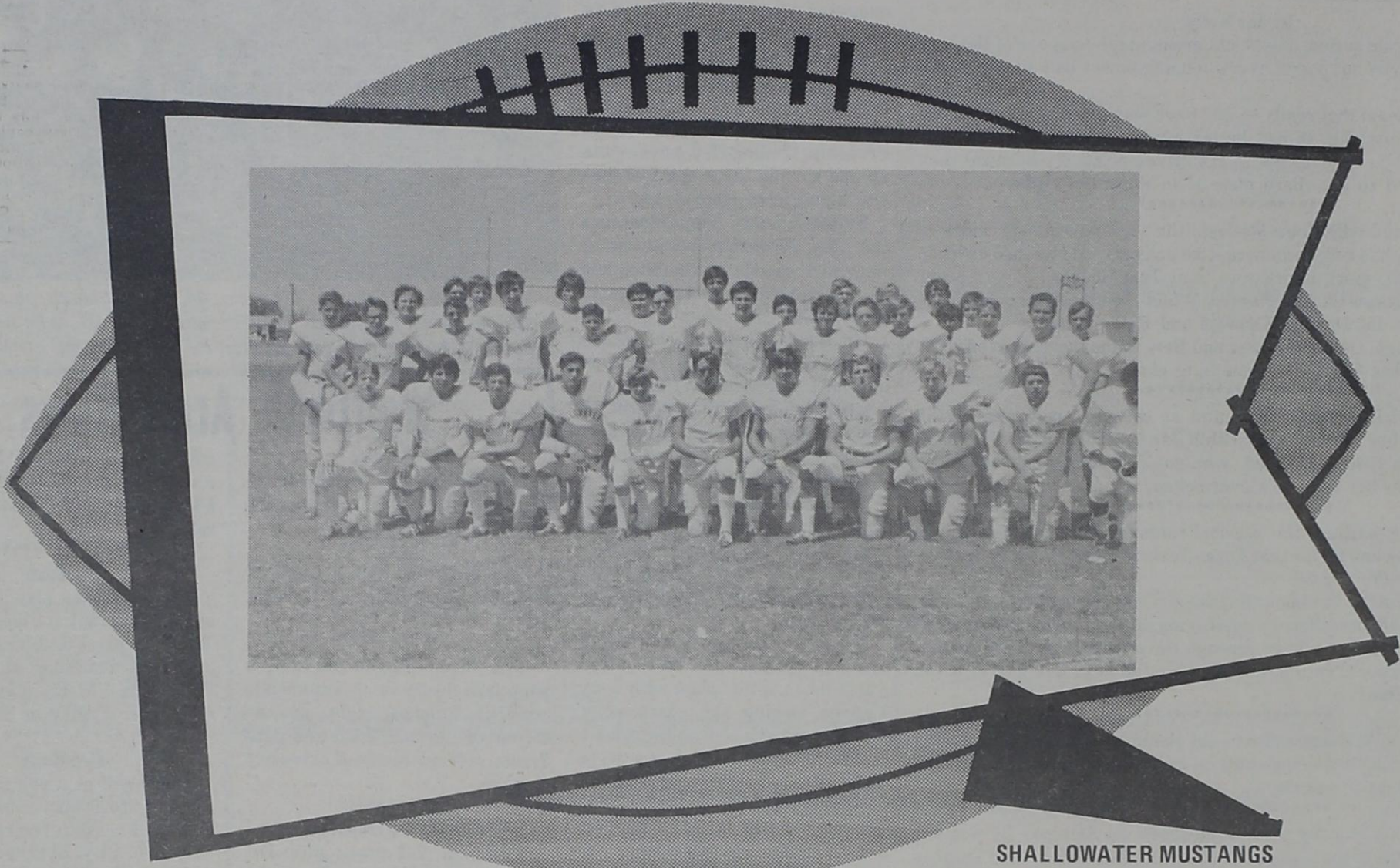

Home Highlights

Frozen Ingredients

Recipes often call for chopped, grated, diced or minced ingredients. Do this time-consuming work ahead of time—then freeze the various ingredients until needed.

For example, grate cheese a pound or two at a time. One pound makes about four cups grated cheese. Measure it in one cut units—or in the amount wanted most often. Place cheese in air-tight containers or wrap in moisture-vapor-resistant plastic wrap, and freeze. American process cheese freezes well.

Chop a pound or two of onions at a time, either with a knife or in a blender for finely chopped pieces. Wrap in 1/2 cup or 1/4 cup units in air-tight plastic wrap. Place packages in a glass freezer jar that can be tightly closed, to keep the onion odor from escaping, and freeze.

Green peppers also can be chopped and frozen. Mince parsley and then put in the freezer. Both should be packaged in convenient

sized units, then placed in air-tight containers.

Keep bread crumbs on hand in the freezer, too. Save bread heels until you have several. Crumb them in the blender, or between two sheets of wax paper with a rolling pin. Store in an air-tight freezer container. If preferred, lightly butter the heels before crumbling to make buttered crumbs.

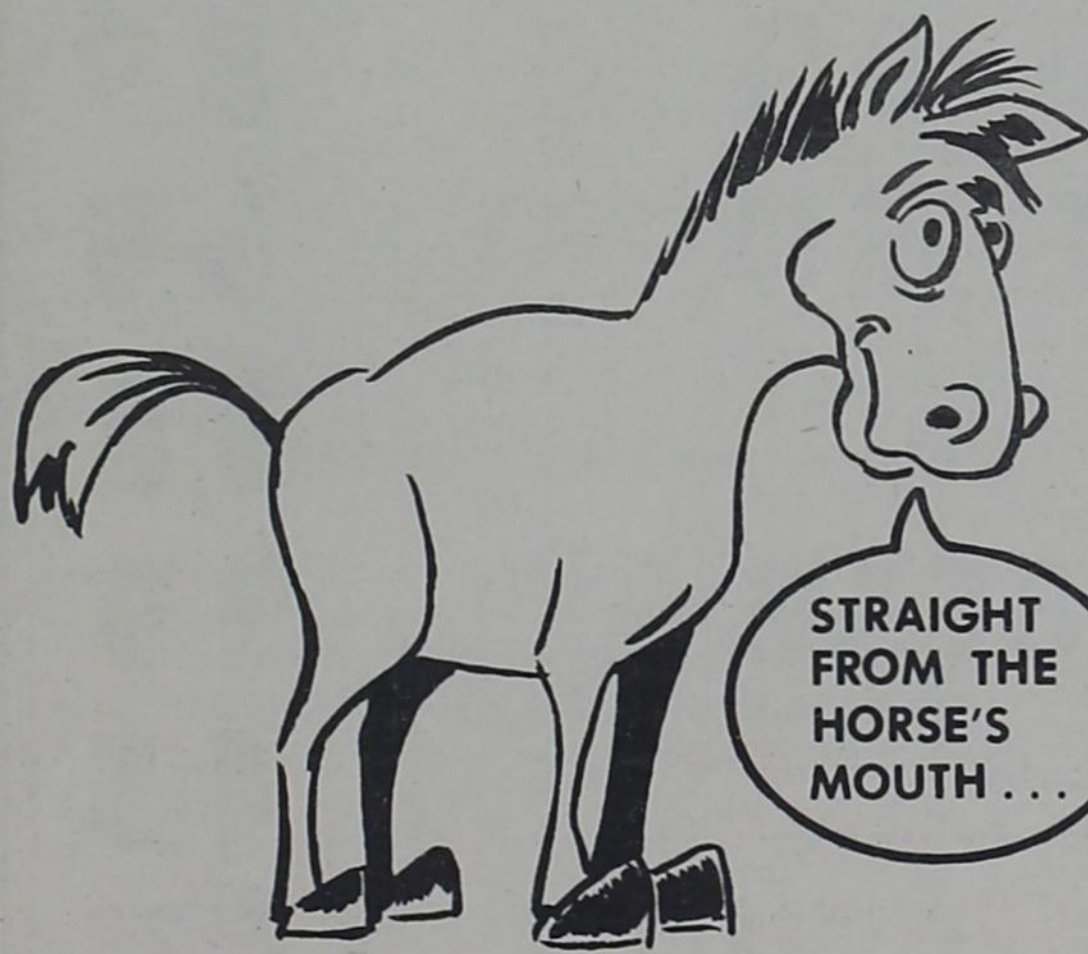
